Bodies Recovered Total 746.

Special to Evening Review.

New York, June 21.—With the additional bodies recovered this morning, the number of victims of the General Slocum disaster whose remains have reached the morgues, now total 746. A heavy thunder storm early this morning caused many bodies to rise and float on the surface of the water.

The fund for the relief of those made destitute by the disaster now amounts to \$53,000.

The first damage suit growing out of the affair has been filed by Mrs. Kate Mattler, who lost four children in the disaster. The amount asked is \$50,000.

Expedition to Mount Scott.

On Saturday, June 11, a party of over twenty pleasure seekers set out for the summit of Mount Scott. According to previous arrangement the party met at Mr. Alexander's store at Glendale, on the North Umpqua, about 18 miles east of Roseburg.

It was an interesting sight indeed, the twenty or more horses circling Indian style up the rugged mountain side. After about three fourths of the distance had been gained, the horses had to be abandoned, and the journey pursued on foot. One was reminded of the poor frog in the well, that slipped back two steps for every one taken forward. This was at times literally true, for some occasionally slipped for a rod or more, or until caught by some fellow toper. But after the usual number of hairs and mishaps, and four and one half hours of heroic mountain climbing the grand old summit was reached.

Could the great Byron or Bayard Taylor have been there with his mighty pen, it is possible that he might be able to give you at least some idea of the grandeur of the wild scenery that spread before us—not an object to obstruct our vision for many many miles in any direction. Just in front and facing civilization, hangs a perpendicular precipice, perhaps seven or eight hundred feet in height. One could not look from this awful cliff without thinking of all the grave yards in Christendom and of all the bad deeds of his past life. To the east we could look far into Oregon's most beautiful mountain ranges. There arose like thunder clouds "from the Cascades frozen gorges" the snow crowned and magnificent Cow Horn Peak (Mt. Thielsen), Mt. Jefferson, two of the Three Sisters, and many other points of interest of the almost unrivaled Cascades.

So wrapt was the party in this scenery that it was some little time before any one thought of the baskets containing the refreshments which the ladies of the party had so beautifully prepared. At last some suggested that "We had better eat, and continue the scenery when we get time." So pies, cakes, chickens and all sorts of good things were brought from their hiding places and spread out on the mountain top. Let me add right here, that it is positively marvelous the way those things disappeared and the crowd, too, mostly girls.—Just think of it!

After this feature of the day was over the party continued to enjoy the sights until the sun sinking below us in the west urged the fact that it was time to bid adieu to all this dream of loveliness, and descend again to the prosaic duties and labors of every day life. We were fortunate, in having with us the excellent amateur artist, Mr. E. V. Oden, who photographed the group while on the mountain top. His picture of this group will help us to keep ever in our memory this almost more than mortal vision.

The only event worthy of special mention on the return journey was the discovery of an ice cold stream of pure water, gushing from a monstrous rock, under which the thirsty crowd lingered to refresh themselves after a long half day's journey without even a sight of this nature's most refreshing beverage.
