General Crop Summary.

During the past week the rainfall in the eastern section of the State has been ample, and in some limited areas it has been excessive and attended by high winds and hail, which has done considerable damage to the crops lying within the tracks of these storms. In the western section of the State drought continues and no rain of consequence has occurred since June 2nd, except in some of the coast counties and in the high level sections of southern Oregon, where local rains have fallen and greatly improved late crops.

Wheat is filling nicely and its harvest will become general this week. Fall barley is also maturing and promises to yield above the average. Early spring grain is ripening and a fair crop will be harvested. Late sown spring wheat in the Willamette valley's very poor some of it has already been cut for hay and some will not pay to cut even for this purpose.

Good rains within the next few days will help some fields of late sown spring wheat, but most of it is too far advanced to be benefited, and this part of the wheat crop, which fortunately, comprises but a small proportion of the whole, is considered a failure. Outcrops heading short and yields below the average are expected. Corn is doing fairly well. Pastureage is drying up. Stock generally keep in good condition, but there is a falling off in the flow of milk among the dairy herds. Haymaking is nearly finished, and the crop, although light, was secured in excellent condition.

Potatoes and gardens are uneven; where rain has fallen they are doing well; where drought prevails they are from poor to good, depending upon their cultivation and the capacity of the soil for retaining moisture.

Peaches are beginning to get ripe and a fair crop will be picked. The cherry season is drawing to a close, and the yields were much better than expected. — U. S. Weather Bureau.

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The Mitchell Cloudburst.

CONDON, Or., July 12.—In a cloudburst which struck the narrow canyon in the mountains above Mitchell, which is 50 miles south of here, at 6 o'clock last night, two lives were lost and 25 buildings, half the houses in town, were swept away.

Of the population of the town of Mitchell—250 people—more than half fled to the adjacent hillside, through fear when the ominous silence came and the heavy bank of terror-inspiring clouds were seen to form. The other half of the population, excepting two persons referred to, succeeded in getting to the hillside after the roar of the waters was heard coming down the mountain.

The drowned people were Martin Smith, more than 30 years of age, and Mrs. Bethune, almost 90 years of age. The wife of Martin Smith, almost as old as he, succeeded in getting to a place of safety.

Eyewitnesses, talking over the long-distance telephone with Condon today, say that the wave of water seemed fully 25 feet in height. Its roar could be heard for several miles.

Above the town some 300 yards two creeks, Bridge creek and Mill creek, join. Each of these creeks has its source in the mountains above the town. Each creek, by the cloud burst, overran its banks, and when the waters joined at Mitchell the mighty volume overflooded the narrow canyon in which the town is situated. The town has but one principal street and every building on the lower side of this street was swept down the valley, while the buildings on the upper side of the creek were but little damaged.

A strange feature of the storm was that not a bit of rain fell in Mitchell. At the same time a fearful torrent was seen falling on the mountain near by, the volume increasing until it looked as if a river were descending on the mountain side.

More than one hour before the wave descended the people were filled with fear and, realizing that their town was in much the same predicament as Heppner had been in, they dispatched an outrider down the valley to warn the farmers near the town.
