An Eastern lumber syndicate has bought the lumber mill on Willis Creek, near Dillard, and has contracted with Charles Cheney to move it on his ranch on Cow Creek, south-east of this city. Work has been commenced on the mill, which will be brought to Glendale next week. It has a sawing capacity of 20,000 feet of lumber daily and it will be worked to the limit in getting out lumber with which to build a flume from the Cheney

ranch in this city, a distance of seven miles.

The syndicate will build a mill at The Meadows next spring with a capacity of 200,000 feet daily, it having bought 1,500 acres of timber near the site named. These enterprises mean the employment of large numbers of men, and as Glendale will be the supplying station for employees of both mills and the flume, a boom in business will result as soon as work begins.—News.

Treasury Deficit.

Provo, Utah, Democrat: The little girl who confidently spelled east and called it "dog" made no greater mistake in orthography than the Republicans who would spell b-a-n-k-r-u-p-t-c-y, and pronounced it "prosperity." For July 1 began the new fiscal year and Secretary Shaw presented his report showing that the receipts for the year have been \$541,186,745, and the expenditures \$582,539,071, showing a deficit for the year of \$41,352,325. For the preceding fiscal year there was a surplus of \$52,710,952, showing an adverse balance compared with the year ending June 30, 1901, of pretty nearly \$100,000,000. This shows that the administration has lost money every month of the past year, and if a loss of \$100,000,000 is prosperity, it would be curious to know what adversity is. Mr. Shaw's showing certainly demonstrates that Mr. Roosevelt's successor in the White House will inherit the same sort of conditions that Mr. Cleveland was called upon to inherit March, 1893. Our national poverty then, as indicated by the deficit, was due to the Harrison administration, as our national poverty now shown by the deficit is due to the McKinley-Roosevelt administrations.
