LOSS HEAVY

Russia Hears of Heavy Defeat to its Arms.

RELEASE CAPTIVE STEAMER

Russians Torpedo a British Vessel—British Fleet Now Enroute to the Orient

ST. PETERSBURG, July 21.—It is reported here on good authority that a large detachment of Kuropatkin's army was disastrously defeated by the Japanese in one of the mountain passes near the scene of his operations. The Russian loss is said to be very heavy.

"ACCIDENTALLY."
NEW CHIWANG, July 21.—The commander of a Russian torpedo boat reports having accidentally torpedoed a British steamer in the Gulf of Pe Chilli. It is believed to be the Hensang, a merchantman.

BRITISH STEAMER RELEASED.
PORT SAID, July 21.—The British steamer Malacca was released by the Russians today and sailed for Cherbourg, France.

WHAT MALACCA HAD ON BOARD.
LONDON, July 21.—A prominent French diplomat is authority for the statement that Russia ordered the capture of the steamer Malacca because it was claimed that the vessel had on board a large quantity of ammunition and an immense crane intended for the naval dock at Mojl.

BRITISH WARSHIPS ENROUTE.
MALTA, July 21.—Six British warships consisting of three cruisers and three destroyers sailed today to join the Mediterranean squadron at Alexandria. A dispatch from that place says two other British cruisers have just arrived there. The whole fleet is destined for the Orient.

CAPTURE OF THE MALACCA.
PORT SAID, July 20.—The captured Peninsular & Oriental steamer Malacca, bound for Liban, on the Baltic, has arrived here, manned by a Russian naval captain, four officers, 45 sailors and firemen. Members of the Malacca's crew were declared prisoners and no communication with the shore was permitted. An armed guard blocks the gangway of the vessel.

The British captain and passengers complain of the Russian treatment. The former carried his protests to such length that he was threatened with arrest unless he desisted.

The Malacca is declared to have on board no contraband articles for Japan. Her cargo of 3000 tons includes 40 tons of explosives for Hong Kong.

The crew and passengers of the Malacca have been landed here. The ship is detained by the authorities, who are awaiting instructions before taking further action.

EXCITEMENT IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, July 20.—The further details of the capture of the Malacca are being discussed in the House of Commons.

tails received from Port Said today, describing the situation on board the Malacca, fail to give any reason for the seizure, and only serve to inflame the British feeling. The officials of the company reiterate their denial that the Malacca was carrying contraband of war, and reassert that the explosives on board were British government stores consigned to the naval commander at Hong Kong.

In official circles apprehension is felt at the increasing excitement in the country. There is no likelihood, however, of any precipitate action. It is officially pointed out that the very fullest information must be obtained before the government decides on its course.

The talk of poisoning the Red Sea by British warships meets with no support in official quarters, where it is pointed out that the commander of a warship would have to satisfy himself that a merchant ship desiring convoy was not contravening the neutrality regulations.

ENGLAND FILES A PROTEST.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 20.—Sir Charles Hardinge, the British Ambassador to Russia, this afternoon, in behalf of his government, presented a strong protest to Russia against the seizure in the Red Sea and the detention of the Peninsular & Oriental steamer Malacca, which was carrying 30 tons of British government stores for the naval establishment at Hong Kong, cases containing such stores being marked with the broad arrow, which is the government stamp.

The Ambassador also presented a general protest against the action of the Russian volunteer fleet steamers in the Red Sea.

New Armored Cruiser.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—The new United States Armored Cruiser, South Dakota, will be launched here this evening with elaborate ceremonies in which the Governor and other prominent citizens of South Dakota will participate.

Walla Walla Wheat Sold.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 20.—The first wheat of the 1904 crop was sold in Walla Walla yesterday. It consisted of 42,000 bushels of bluestem and ob. The price, while not given out by the local grain dealer who purchased it, is said to have been 55 cents for the ob and 60 cents for the bluestem. The wheat was raised on the Drumheller farm, about three miles west of Walla Walla. The Drumhellers had 40 acres in wheat, and when threshing was completed last night the returns showed that it had yielded an average of 42 bushels to the acre.

Harvest is well under way and the yield is turning out better than was anticipated. In the foothill section an average of 40 bushels is being cut per acre for the fall-sown grain and about 30 for the spring wheat. Harvest in the Eureka Flat country will be commenced next week. The farmers in this section estimate that they will get a yield of at least 30 bushels per acre.
