TEN ESCAPE

Most of Russian Fleet Driven Back to Port Arthur.

NEARLY ALL WERE DAMAGED

Those That Escaped Took Refuge in Neutral Ports, but are Ordered Away.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—The Central Newsagency at St. Petersburg says that an official report of Wednesday's sea fight at Port Arthur has been received there. Among other incidents it says Admiral Wittgert was standing on the battleship *Csarovitch* when, during the height of the battle, he was struck by an exploding shell and blown to atoms. The other casualties resulting aboard the vessel were 210 men killed and 99 wounded. When the battleship was towed to Kai Chow it was found that its steering apparatus had been shot away and most of the machinery of the vessel was so badly damaged as to be useless.

OTHER OFFICERS KILLED.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—Captain Wamoff, commander of the cruiser *Samoff*, reports that besides Rear Admiral Wittgert, several other officers aboard the *Csarovitch* were killed and a number more were wounded.

RUSSIANS DECISIVELY BEATEN.

TOKIO, Aug. 13.—In his official report of the naval battle of Port Arthur Wednesday, Admiral Togo says that nearly all of the Russian ships, which participated in the attempt to escape, were obliged to return to the harbor. Those that escaped are so widely scattered that it is doubtful if they ever realize their intention of joining the Vladivostok squadron. Even if they did at the present time, they would be of little use as fighting machines as they are in urgent need of repairs.

ASKOLD SEEMS SHUTTER.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—The Russian cruiser *Askold*, which escaped from Port Arthur during Wednesday's naval battle, was seriously damaged, as attested by the following cablegram received here today from Mr. Goodnow, the American consul at Shanghai:

"The Russian cruiser *Askold* has arrived here seriously damaged and wants to dock. The Russian consul here has raised the point that a reasonable time must be allowed for the vessel to make repairs."

Shanghai being a neutral port, it would be unlawful for any Russian or Japanese vessel to be harbored there without the consent of other nations. Hence Consul Goodnow's cablegram to Washington, simultaneously with word sent to the nations by the respective

LIAO YANG IMPREGNABLE.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 13.—A member of the Russian general staff states today that the Russian position at Liao Yang is impregnable owing to the work of Korotkin's engineers. The wall about the city has been utilized for the mounting of heavy artillery. In addition to this an elaborate system of trenches has been built. Thus, asserts the official, the city, with its vast amount of stores and ammunition, is capable of enduring the most vigorous assault for an indefinite time.

RESULT OF PORT ARTHUR FIGHT.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Dispatches from various points today indicate that the attempt of the Russian Port Arthur squadron to reach Vladivostok failed, and the vessels have become widely scattered. One torpedo boat destroyer put in to Chefoo, where she was boarded and captured by the Japanese. The battleship *Csarovitch*, the cruiser *Novik* and a torpedo boat have arrived at Tsing Chou, at the entrance of Kiao Chou Bay, the German concession on the southern shore of the Shan Tong Peninsula.

According to the other dispatches, the cruiser *Askold* is also at Tsing Chou, but advice to the German Foreign Office do not include her.

Another Russian cruiser and a torpedo boat destroyer are reported as near Shanghai, and four battleships are off the Saddle Islands, about 75 miles southeast of that port. Chefoo reports say that one Russian torpedo boat was captured off the Chinese coast, and Tokio hears that a number of vessels of the squadron have returned to Port Arthur.

The German Foreign Office has given instructions that the uninjured warships at Tsing Chou must leave port within 24 hours.

The Japanese system of communication has heretofore been so perfect that there can be little doubt that the government is thoroughly informed of the position of the various vessels of the escaped fleet, and will be able either to drive them into neutral ports or attack them with overwhelming forces.

JAPS CAPTURE RUSSIAN CRUISER.

CHEFOO, Aug. 12.—Two Japanese destroyers sailed into this harbor under cover of darkness at 3:30 o'clock this morning, and attacked the dismantled Russian destroyer *Ryushitsei*, lying here. After a brief fight the Japanese vessels captured and towed away the Russian warship.

The Russian crew jumped overboard when fired on and swam for their lives.

RUSSIA PROTESTS.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 12.—Russia has already formally protested to Japan through France against the action of the Japanese torpedo boat destroyers in attacking the Russian torpedo boat destroyer *Ryushitsei* at Chefoo and towing her away from that port, and that the protest has been communicated to the powers.

This prompt action is based upon the official report of the Russian Consul at Chefoo, which is very explicit on the subject of dismantling the *Ryushitsei*, saying that not only were the breech blocks of her guns and all her small arms removed, but her engines were rendered useless.

The vessel therefore was reduced to the condition of a hulk. The Consul also reported that the Japanese fired upon Russian sailors while they were in the water.

AFFECTS ALL NATIONS.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—The British officials and foreign diplomats regard the action of the Japanese in cutting out the Russian torpedo boat destroyer *Ryushitsei* at Chefoo as raising a serious question of importance to all nations.

The Foreign Office this morning received a dispatch from the British Consul at Chefoo confirming the capture of the vessel. The Consul added that the facts were immediately reported to the Chinese Governor and the foreign diplomats at Peking. The former evinced considerable concern, not so much at the fact that the attack was made on the destroyer as at the precedent established by Japan, which Russia may follow in case of emergency, thereby extending the area of hostilities which Secretary Hay sought to circumscribe.

It is believed that Japan will promptly disavow the action of the commanders of her destroyers, even returning the *Ryushitsei* to Chefoo provided she is confirmed that her officers acted wrongfully.

NEW HOUSES

Show Steady Growth in Roseburg This Year.

BUSINESS AND OTHERWISE

Including Two Fine Temples of Fraternal Orders—Many Residences.

Notwithstanding the unusual quietness of things just now, building operations are steadily progressing in Roseburg. Besides the fine Beards & Salzmann two-story brick, now nearing completion, and the commodious new temples of the B. P. O. E. and K. O. T. M., to be built during the present year, quite a number of dwelling houses have either been recently completed or are now being erected.

Chadwick's Addition is being ornamented with two new, neat cottages, being built by a Mr. Barnum, of West Roseburg, and A. Mattick, the barber. The cottage occupied by Mrs. L. A. Brett, in this locality, is receiving some improvements which greatly adds to the appearance of the place.

C. W. Davis, S. P. section foreman at Drain, is having constructed a commodious 6-room cottage on Mill street, which, when completed, will be occupied by A. E. Sauvain.

R. M. Ryer, the planing mill man, has completed a neat cottage on the property adjoining that occupied by Dr. A. T. Steiner, on Rose street, and already has part of the necessary building material on hand preparatory to the construction of another on the corner of Rose and Douglas street.

D. Jackson, the gunsmith, has about completed his new 7-room residence in North Roseburg.

The building improvements on Hon. Roger Hermann's place, at the head of Jackson street, are well under way and will be finished in a few weeks. Mr. Hermann recently sold a strip of the west side of his property to the Cobb Real Estate Co. in order to enable the latter to make a better connection below Jackson street, in the city proper and the extension thereof in Waite's addition. For this purpose it was also necessary to purchase a strip of land from Hon. D. S. K. Bulek's property adjoining Mr. Hermann's place. This will materially straighten Jackson street at that place.

Among the new residences and cottages erected in the Waite addition during the present season so far are those of Rev. E. L. Pitch, Gutter Bros., (two), W. S. Hamilton, W. H. McCrescen, Jacob Christopherson, Wm. Eggers, Henry Donn. Besides these, W. F. McDaniel and L. Rabat now have houses in course of construction in this beautiful addition. Of course the chief of all the new structures there is the fine \$20,000 high school building, of which extended notice has been given from time to time in these columns.

These and other structures in the town and vicinity, with the improvements at the S. P. R. R. depot and round house show good evidence of activity in our city.

Oregon State Fair Program.

Monday, Sept. 12—Opening day. In the evening addresses will be made by prominent men of the state on up to date topics.

Tuesday, Sept. 13—Woodmen of the World Day. This entire day will be devoted to the Woodmen and their sister order, the Ladies of Woodcraft, in their drills and sports. It is expected that at least a dozen drill teams will be present in uniform to contest for the \$500 in prizes.

Wednesday, Sept. 14—Salem day. This will be a great day for Salem. Business is practically suspended and everybody goes to the fair. This will also be the day for the Greater Salem Stake, a \$2000 purse for 215 pacers, in which there are 31 entries.

Thursday, Sept. 15—Portland day. Usually the biggest day of the fair as the S. P. R. R. runs an excursion from Portland, and \$1.50 pays a round trip and admission to everything on the fair grounds that the Board has anything to do with. On this day will come off the Lewis and Clark Stake for \$2000 purse for 217 trotters.

Friday, Sept. 16—Children's day.

When all the children in Marion County, including the Indian Training School at Chemawa, the Reform School and school children, will be admitted free.

Saturday, Sept. 17—Closing day. The Rural Spirit Stake, \$1000 purse for 211 trotters; also the consolation race in the Lewis and Clark Stake will be run off. Prizes will be paid and in the evening a good program will be on in the pavilion.
