A Herd of 275 Head From Douglas County Must Be "Dipped."

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 12.—A band of 130 head of cattle, about to be shipped from here to a Montana Indian reservation, was yesterday condemned by Government Stock Inspector Hutchinson on account of the "scabbie," and will not be allowed to leave the state until the animals are dipped twice. A drove of 275 head at Oakland and one of 175 head at Halsey were also condemned and all are detained.
