This permits of wider and higher berths. Length has also been added to berths, so that comfort is found in them which is lacking in ordinary sleeping cars.

These large cars are in service on practically all of the lines of the St. Paul road, and are very popular with the traveling public.

HUNTING THE SHY COYOTE.

Drives of Western Ranchmen Often Result in Death of Scourge.

There is a deal of coyote hunting in the west that is not attended by the theories of the club hunt. Ever since the first pioneers pushed their way across the great plains the coyote has been an outlaw, looking for no mercy at the hand of man. His predatory habits have made the animal the bane of the ranchman, and his howl has made him the exasperation of the camper and the terror of the tender foot. Then, too, his habit of skulking just within rifle range has always made him a tantalizing target for the man with the rifle.

In spite of his unpopularity with all classes of men, however, the coyote has managed to hold his own better than any other animal in the great west. The animal is a survivor of foot mayhap, but not having the cunning of the coyote has been almost exterminated in many states. The ranchman's lust for fresh meat, the western tourist's desire for antlers and elk teeth and the native who slays for the market have depopulated Colorado and several other states of their best game. The bear, cougar and bobcat have felt the same blighting influence, but the coyote still figures in the sky line of the average western picture. Sometimes he is unwise enough to eat of poisoned carcasses of cattle, but this is seldom. Again he falls a victim to a coyote "drive," organized by ranchmen and participated in by townspeople, tenderfeet, newspaper correspondents, and amateur photographers. These coyote "drives" are held annually, or oftener, in nearly all western communities where the prairie post flourishes. An average "drive" participated in by several hundred individuals will yield something twenty coyotes and sometimes more at all. A good deal depends on the wind, and more depends on the coyote's cunning and ability to sprint. Minneapolis Journal.

Thermometer Shows.

Although the process of infecting paraffin under the skin was at first hailed with delight by persons desirous of removing the defective shape of their noses, it has now been found to have its drawbacks, says the Petit Parisien. At the last meeting of the Academy of Medicine, M. Lacroix drew attention to some of these.

The least pressure, he stated, was fatal to the symmetry of the organ thus beautified. Paraffin is also very sensitive to heat, and a more admirably modeled by the aid of the new process is as responsive to atmospheric changes as a thermometer.

More serious is the danger of blood poisoning caused by the absorption of particles of paraffin into the system. Blood poisoning sometimes ensues, and the results are frequently very grave.

STRIKE TAKES SERIOUS TURN.

Will Become General Over the Country—Rioting Continues.

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—President Donnelly, of the butchers' union, declared this morning that the refusal of the packers to listen to any plan for mediation means that the strike will be fought out to the last ditch. He says the men will make no concession from the stand taken and the strike will be extended to cover every class of labor handling any of the packing house products, not only in Chicago but all over the United States. Threats made of boycotts will now be ordered and every possible measure taken to hinder the packers from running their plants on a non-union basis.

Considerable rioting is accompanying the delivery of meat in the down town district today. Large crowds of strikers and sympathizers surrounded non-union wagons and hurled missiles at the drivers. Serious results were averted by large detachments of the police. The police are dispersing crowds which gather at the markets. The temper of the strikers is ugly since the decision of the packers not to accept mediation became known. Disturbances are becoming more general.

A crowd of 400 strikers attacked the Lake Shore train which was carrying 60 non-union negroes from Pittsburg and threw stones at the cars, breaking many windows. One negro drew his revolver and fired several shots into the crowd, which scattered rapidly. The police failed to find the man who fired the shots.
