DOUGLAS COUNTY MINES

Extensive Work on Rainbow—H. J. Pullen's Interests.

Portland Journal, Oct. 18.—Pending erection of a concentrator and perhaps a leaching plant, Manager H. J. Pullen of the Rainbow Mining, Milling & Smelting company, in Douglas county, has suspended underground development. H. J. Pullen, son of the manager and superintendent at the time, came to the city yesterday and is registered at the Imperial. His mission when he left the mine was to Denver, but developments since his departure recalled him there a few days before continuing to the Colorado city.

Mr. Pullen says that the total development now completed on the Rainbow aggregates more than 5,000 feet. This work has been concentrated on one location, and on a plan of permanent operations. Six adit levels 100 feet apart have been established, and drifts extended on the Rainbow main ore shoot.

Mr. Pullen says that blocking has been quite thorough, and that the reserve in sight is ample for the work of a large mill.

A force of eight men was engaged underground until last Thursday. They were in the lower level, where the vein is widening materially. The face of this drift gives backs of approximately 1,000 feet, and as the drift extends into the hill, increases depth rapidly. Under the apex of the hill beyond present work the depth will be 1,200 to 1,500 feet.

The Rainbow has essentially a copper ore, gold values being present in most copper and improving with depth. For the first 200 feet oxidation is very thorough, and in this zone excellent values

of both gold and copper were opened. Sulphide and copper pyrites come in on all the lower levels and show marked uniformity. Vein filling is a schist impregnated with quartz, the latter carrying the metal content. Several mining men have examined the Rainbow of late, which is the pioneer in its immediate vicinity, and Mr. Pullen says they pronounce it one of the largest copper propositions opened in the state.

The group consisting of nine claims, is situated on Drew creek, a tributary of the South Umpqua. The Umpqua offers abundant power, estimates indicating that 5,000 horse power may be had within five to six miles of the mine. There is water in Drew creek for a concentrator.

Mr. Pullen, Jr. believes all will be arranged for this improvement early in the spring, at which time it is the purpose to re-open full blast, mining and milling on a large scale.

MR. PULLEN INTERESTED.

H. J. Pullen, the mining engineer who spent several weeks looking over western Oregon and made headquarters here during that period, has taken a mining property on the South Umpqua, Douglas county, 16 miles above Pendleton. Mr. Pullen is in charge, and is understood to be arranging for thorough development. Relatively little work has been done on the group, but the surface prospecting shows a large vein 40 to 60 feet wide, with a quartz gangue and free values. The effort of the new manager will be to open this big vein at a depth, after which equipment will be in order if values continue as they show up in surface work.
