CHANGE BACK

Reserve Land to be Restored "Within a Short Time"

SHREWD POLITICAL MOVE

Roosevelt Said to be "Convinced That Withdrawals Were Recklessly Made."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—Within a short time the Secretary of the Interior will restore to entry additional lands in Oregon that have been withdrawn temporarily for former reserve purposes. In addition to the lands recently eliminated from the Blue Mountain and Wallowa withdrawals, the proposed eliminations will embrace an aggregate of 582,910 acres. These are lands found not suitable for forest reserve purposes. A large part of the lands soon to be restored to entry are included in the Rogue river withdrawal in Southern Oregon.

There will be further eliminations in Washington, making the aggregate area restored to entry in that state 225,000 acres. In Idaho even greater restorations are to be made, aggregating 1,420,800 acres in all. All these eliminations are made under the order of President Roosevelt, who has become convinced that withdrawals recklessly made are withholding from settlement large areas of lands that might otherwise be taken up. In all 5,107,500 acres of such lands are soon to be thrown open to entry in various states.

(This reported change of policy—no actual orders having yet been made—will tend to make the timber men more skeptical than ever as to the administration's policy, coming as it does just prior to the national election. While they may agree that the "withdrawals were recklessly made" having vigorously protested at the time, they do not feel reassured that the administration will not again reverse itself after the campaign is over.)

WILL RETIRE

Entire Japanese Front Preparing to Fall Back.

SMALL FIGHT THURSDAY

Russians Surprise Japanese Battery—Review of The Struggle Near Yental.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 21.—A semi-official dispatch from Mukden says the Japanese are preparing to retire along their whole front.

Another dispatch from Mukden states that a force of Russians yesterday surprised a Japanese battery, killing the gunners and capturing three cannons.

According to an official announcement today, the number of officers killed or wounded in the fighting from October 11 to 13, inclusive, totals 172, including one major-general and 17 field officers. The number of soldiers in lower ranks killed and wounded has not yet been compiled but it thought it will reach nearly 25,000.

REVIEW OF THE BATTLE.

MUKDEN, Oct. 20.—The seven days' battle north of Yental was the heaviest blow yet struck the Russians by the Japanese, so far as loss of life is concerned. The left Japanese army during the week buried 400 Russian dead left in front of its lines. A village in front of the left wing contains many Russian dead, but the shellfire of the retreating Russians prevents the Japanese from reaching them. Conservative estimates place the Russian casualties at not less than 25,000. Probably many more dead are on the field in places not yet searched.

The Japanese report their total casualties at a little over 3000 killed and wounded. The principal Russian casualties occurred in determining counter attacks against each village captured by the Japanese. The Russian attacking parties were in many cases entirely annihilated. For the first time the Russians have met the Japanese on an equal footing, not having strong defensive positions to depend upon, and for the first time they attacked the Japanese in their own trenches. The Russians everywhere fought bravely, but they were unable to drive the Japanese out or to hold their own positions against fierce charges. Almost in every case the Russians retired from their positions at the first charge; then made repeated attempts to recapture them.

The Japanese left army, with a front of nearly 10 miles, moved forward about five miles, fighting over every inch of ground. The final retreat of the Russians was almost a rout, the Japanese extreme left advance driving the remnant of Russians ahead. The Russians covered their retreat well with artillery and carried away much baggage and many wounded.

JAPAN MEANS BUSINESS.

ROME, Oct. 20.—The Italia Militaire has a dispatch from Tokio stating that 90 transports left Hobeo yesterday with 74,000 men and 200 guns, with ammunition and clothing, bound for Manchuria. The second army will consist of 400,000 men and 1000 guns.
