While the official returns of last Tuesday's election in this state have not yet been announced in all the counties, it is evident from the figures at hand that the people of Oregon are not yet ready to adopt prohibition as a general law. Only five of the 23 counties voting upon the measure appear to have a majority of votes in favor of it, and in these the margins are generally small. Of the other 18 counties, some rolled up heavy majorities against the proposed law, Marion county giving nearly 1300 majority against it. Seven or eight counties did not vote at all upon the question. We understand that many persons who voted for the measure did so with the belief that it was a precinct and not a county matter, and thus unintentionally helped to increase the vote in favor of general prohibition. It now seems probable that the legislature will amend the law, making it a precinct instead of a county measure, thus rendering it in fact a local option instead of a prohibition law, and giving every precinct the right to decide for itself whether it shall be "dry" or "wet", and not be controlled either way by the votes of persons living in other precincts, and in many instances long distances away, and having no direct interest in the matter outside of the locality in which they reside.

Larger Sleeping Car Berths.

One of the few railroad companies that owns and operates the sleeping cars in service on its lines, is the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul.

The sleeping cars on this line were formerly Pullman cars, operated by the Pullman Company, but for a dozen years past the railway company has owned and operated the sleeping cars, a departure from the old standard pattern of cars has been made to the extent of adding about six inches to the width and height of the sleepers. This permits of wider and higher berths. Length has also been added to berths, so that comfort is found in them which is lacking in ordinary sleeping cars. These large cars are in service on practically all of the lines of the St. Paul road, and are very popular with the traveling public.
