## GETS MANY PRIZES

Oregon Exhibits Awarded Premiums at World's Fair

STATE EXCELLED BY NONE

Won a Total of Three Grand Prizes, 67 Gold, 150 Silver and 71 Bronze Medals.

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 20.—President Jefferson Myers of the Lewis and Clark Fair, says the prizes coming to Oregon from the Louisiana Purchase Exposition at St. Louis are greater in number than those awarded to any other state in comparison to the amount of money that the exhibit cost. The following is the list of prizes awarded in each department:

Department of Agriculture—(including one gold medal for dairy.)—1 grand prize, 43 gold medals, 50 silver, 22 bronze.

Department of Horticulture—2 grand prizes, 7 gold medals, 84 silver, 34 bronze.

Department of Fish and Game—1 gold medal, 9 silver, 1 bronze.

Department of Mining—2 gold medals, 1 silver medal, 10 bronze. (Petition pending for grand prize.)

Department of Forestry—5 gold medals, 2 silver, 2 bronze.

Department of Education, groups one and two—1 gold medal, 3 silver medals, 2 bronze.

Department of Livestock—86 head of sheep sent by Baldwin Sheep & Land Co. won 31 premiums, divided as follows: Rambouillet, 18; Delaine, 7; Spanish, 6. Oregon exhibited the largest and heaviest shearing Spanish ram ever seen in this or any other country, but was refused a prize as the judges called him a freak. The value of the exhibit was about \$12,000. Chas. E. Ladd received on a herd of twelve Shorthorn cattle, 21 first prizes, 1 second 1 third, 2 fourth, 2 fifth. Wm. Riddle, of Polk county, was awarded second prize (\$100) on five head of Kent sheep, and 1 first and 1 fourth on four Angora goats.

The total number of prizes, outside of the stock, was: Grand prizes, 3;

gold medals, 67; silver medals, 150; bronze, 71.

### Waddle Fights Prohi. Law.

J. A. Waddle, the well known traveling salesman for the W. J. Van Schuyver liquor house, will contest the result of the election in Junction City, Lane county, which went "dry." The Eugene Guard says: "J. A. Waddle, owner of the saloon conducted by J. C. Branstetter, at Junction City, late this afternoon, through his attorney, Geo. B. Dorris, of this city, filed a suit in the circuit court against the Lane county commissioners' court asking for an order restraining the effect of the order of the court that prohibition shall exist at Junction City on and after January 1, 1905.

"The order is asked for on the grounds that the bill to propose local option, the law as passed, the filing of the petition for a prohibition election in Lane county, the order of election, the election itself and the order declaring that prohibition shall exist in Junction City are all unlawful and contrary to the existing laws of Oregon, and in conflict and contrary to the constitution of the state."

## BRITT THE WINNER

"Battling" Nelson Stays Limit of Twenty Rounds

## DECISION UNSATISFACTORY

Dane the Master at Close Quarters, but Britt Excelled at Long Range.

### Special to Evening Review.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21.—Jimmy Britt, of this city, light weight champion pugilist, was given the decision over "Battling" Nelson, of Chicago, at the end of a scheduled 20-round bout in this city last night. Opinion as to the justice of the decision varied among the people that crowded the pavilion, and mingled cheers and hisses greeted the words of Referee Roche declaring Britt the winner.

Britt fought Nelson like he fought "Young Corbett." Falling to gain ground by in-fighting, he resorted to straight-away tactics and foot work in both of which he has proven himself, superior to any man in his class. Nelson fought an almost superhuman battle at times. He proved himself Britt's master at close quarters but after the eleventh round he was unable to draw the speedy Californian into these dangerous mix-ups, and had to content himself with taking a terrible grueling at long range.

Nelson did not land a blow in the opening round. Honors were even in the next eight rounds, but clinches were so frequent that the crowd began to hiss. Rounds ten and eleven were the Dane's, but in the 12th, Britt made a hurricane rally that brought his admirers to their feet. From this round on to the end of the fight, Britt hammered away with alternating jabs and swings, with Nelson always coming back for more. In the 20th and last round only did Nelson fail to respond. Britt rained an avalanche of blows on the gritty Dane, none of which had enough force to send him to the floor.

The receipts of the house amounted to about \$35,000, of which the fighters receive 55 per cent, divided 60 and 40.

### GRANTS PASS QUARANTINED

Reported Epidemic of Diphtheria is Now Under Control.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Dec. 20.—The Christmas holidays will be unusually quiet in Grants Pass, owing to the quarantine the city is now under as a preventive measure against the spreading of diphtheria, of which there are some 12 or 14 cases in town. No meetings or gatherings of any kind are allowed, and hence there will be no Christmas trees or Christmas entertainments, nor church meetings or socials. Four or five deaths have occurred from the contagion, but it is now under control, and no fear of its spreading is entertained. Nearly all those now afflicted are on the road to recovery.

### Togo Confirms Report.

SPECIAL TO EVENING REVIEW. TORIO, Dec. 21.—Admiral Togo reports that the Russian battleship Sevastopol is permanently disabled as the result of the attacks upon her by

the Japanese torpedo boats in Port-Arthur harbor.

Nine sleep guns and a quantity of rifles and ammunition fell into the hands of the Japanese when they captured Keekwan fort.

### The Land Fraud Cases.

PORTLAND, Dec. 21.—The Federal Grand Jury, which has been investigating the land fraud cases since last Monday, will hand in their indictments today. It is rumored that indictments will be returned against Attorney F. P. Mays, member of the Upper House of the Legislature from Multnomah County, Frederick A. Kribs, a well-known local timber dealer and witness at the recent conspiracy trial, and C. A. Smith, a wealthy timberman of Minneapolis, Minn.

Mays is said to have become implicated with the conspirators in the capacity of their attorney, and the timbermen as accessories to the fraudulent schemes against the Government.
