COUNTY EXPENSES

Clerk Agee Submits His Annual Report For 1904.

GRAND TOTAL OVER \$85,000

List of 200 Names From Which Jurors Will be Drawn For Circuit Court in 1905.

Below will be found County Clerk Z. N. Agee's annual report to the Secretary of State at Salem, showing, in itemized form, the expenses of Douglas County for the year 1904, exclusive of monies expended for improvements of roads, operation of ferries and maintenance of schools. The total sum expended on roads and ferries in the county during 1904 was \$10,030.07; on schools, \$34,205.55, which does not include the school money received from the state or the amounts raised in several county districts by special levy.
