LEAVING HIS SEAT

Cong. J. N. Williamson Coming Home For Trial.

MITCHELL IS ALSO ABSENT

From His Place in the Senate Since Judge Tanner's Confession in Portland.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Congressman J. N. Williamson, of Oregon, in relation to his indictment by the federal grand jury for complicity in the government land frauds, said this morning:

"I will leave shortly for home to prepare for trial and shall hereafter keep away from my seat in the House of Representatives until this matter is settled. I have high ideals as to what members of the House should be, and believe it would be an affront to my fellow members for me to appear on the floor while this cloud is hanging over me."

Senator Mitchell has also absented himself from the Senate since Judge Tanner's confession.

RIOTING IN WARSAW.

Over 100 Strikers Were Killed Or Wounded.

WARSAW, Feb. 11.—In the rioting at the Katharine Iron Works at Sosnowic Thursday over 100 strikers were killed or wounded. The death of Governor-general Tcherikoff, of the province of Warsaw, is reported, caused by a wound in the leg in an earlier encounter with strikers.

The Warsaw leather factories will re-open next week giving the workers a nine-hour day and a 15 per cent increase in wages.

BURY RUSSIAN DEAD.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—Baron Hayashi, the Japan minister, reports that Gen. Oyama states that up to Feb. 10, the Japanese had buried 2000 Russian corpses killed in recent battles near Mukden.

ANOTHER HILL TAKEN.

TRUKO, Feb. 11.—The hill south of Chang Chai was captured by the Japanese on Feb. 9th, two companies of Russians being driven off.

LEGISLATIVE WORK

Summary of the Bills Recently Acted Upon.

A LIST OF APPROPRIATIONS

Shows the Expenditures Will Be Very Heavy—Bills Meritorious and Otherwise.

Following are the bills which have passed either the House or Senate in Salem last week:

BY THE HOUSE.

By Ritchie—Prohibiting the sale of cigarettes and cigarette materials to youths under 21 years. Fines and imprisonment are specified for violation. To anyone under 10 years of age no tobacco in any form whatever shall be sold. Habitual use of minors under 16 years shall bring them under the provisions of the Juvenile Court law, for which a bill is now awaiting action.

By Smith—Creating a state bureau of mines and creating the office of commissioner of mines with a monthly salary of \$250, and two assistants with salaries of \$150 each.

By Malarkey—Providing for the payment by the state of \$84 a year for each wayward girl kept in a charitable institution.

By Senator Smith—For the regulation of veterinary practice. The bill aims at improvement of the present law so that any person "who has good, practical knowledge of the treatment of the ordinary diseases common to animals" shall be granted a permit to practice "in any locality remote from a duly licensed veterinary surgeon" on petition of "15 reputable stockmen residing in such locality."

By Senator Booth—For the protection of hotelkeepers against dead beats. The bill provides that any person who shall surreptitiously remove his baggage from a hotel without first paying his bill shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by fine of not less than \$20 nor more than \$100, or be imprisoned not less than 10 days nor more than 50, or be both fined and imprisoned.

By Senator Holman—To establish juvenile courts and to regulate control of neglected, delinquent and dependent children under 18 years of age, in Multnomah county.

By Senator Coshaw—That the authority of guardians to sell real estate by private sale may be confirmed and made sure.

By Hermann—Prohibiting the operation of bucket shops and all other forms of stock gambling in Oregon.

BY THE SENATE.

By Rand—Granting miners permis-

sion to cut timber on the public lands in Oregon.

By Siebel—Prohibiting the sale of property by means of coupons for trading stamps, or other device by which the sale of the property depends upon some chance. The bill prohibits all sales where the selection of the property to be sold depends upon chance.

By Kuykendall—That after 1907 all the state institutions shall be governed by one board, composed of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, and that supplies for all the institutions shall be purchased in pursuance of bids called for in one advertisement. The board is to employ a clerk.

By Tuttle—Appropriating \$5000 for the purchase of a first-class, speedy launch for the master fish warden, and \$3000 for the expense of operating. This will enable the warden to pursue any persons suspected of catching fish in the Columbia out of season.

By —Requiring each hunter to pay an annual gun license fee of \$1. The bill exempts farmers and their families hunting on their own land.

By Rand—Permitting a majority of the directors of a mining corporation to reside out of the state. At least one officer or director, upon whom service of summons can be had, must reside in the county where the company's chief place of business is located.

Mayor Defies Ring.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 11.—A fight to the death has been declared between the republican ring ruling Philadelphia and Mayor John Weaver. Yesterday the mayor began at the instigation of the clergy, a fight against the grafting tactics of the police. He sent out an order transferring every police officer in the tenderloin districts and dismissing every bluecoat interested in giving shelter to vice. The shakeup of the police is the preliminary to a general investigation of that department.

More than 800 policemen were affected by last night's order.

MITCHELL IS GAME

Still Denies Guilt and Will Stand Trial.

LEGISLATURE PERPLEXED

New Batch of Indictments Involve Congressman Williamson and E. D. Stratford.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—In spite of Judge Tanner's confession and corroborative testimony by other important witnesses, Senator Mitchell persists in his profession of innocence of any wrongdoing in connection with the Oregon land frauds.

While still showing the terrible strain under which he has labored for the past six weeks, the Senator is not depressed by the sensational news from Portland tonight. On the contrary, he appears in better spirits than usual. When shown a press dispatch telling of Judge Tanner's confession he seemed rather amused than worried. He appears to regard today's developments as merely a new chapter in what he designates a "conspiracy to defame him."

Senator Mitchell has no intention whatever of resigning his seat in the Senate. He will make no change in his original plans, but will remain in Washington until March, probably until after the inauguration. He will then go home and prepare to face the jury and the charges which have been brought against him. This he intended to do regardless of Tanner's confession.

WHAT WILL LEGISLATURE DO?

PORTLAND, Feb. 12.—In view of the growing evidence against Senator Mitchell, the Oregon Legislature may not adjourn sine die next Friday, and Republicans of the two houses will probably caucus at Salem this week to decide what to do. Such a conference is suggested by Speaker Mills, who regards Judge Tanner's testimony as having put a new aspect on the case and who leans to the belief that the Legislature may be constrained to set a date for an adjourned session.

Following so closely the resolution of confidence which the Oregon Legislature adopted, against a negative voice, the confession of Judge Tanner amazes the members of that body. Several influential Legislators, who advocated adoption of the resolution, said yesterday they would not have done so had they been aware of what was impending. A sore perplexity now confronts them, and though it seemed bad enough before the resolution was adopted, now it is worse, because reconsideration of rescindment would amount virtually to a declaration that the Legislature believed in Senator Mitchell's guilt and wished him to resign, so that a Republican might be chosen by the Legislature for the unexpired term, and not a Democrat appointed by Governor Chamberlain.

WILLIAMSON INDICTMENT.

PORTLAND, Feb. 12.—Representative John Newton Williamson, Dr. Van Gesner, the business partner of Mr. Williamson, and United States Commissioner Marion R. Biggs were indicted for subornation of perjury committed on June 13, 1902, by the Federal grand jury yesterday afternoon.

It is alleged in the indictment that the men were guilty of having induced 45 persons to file on timber and stone land in township 15 south, of range 10 east, in order to preserve the land as summer range for the Williamson-Gesner Sheep Company. It is also alleged that these claims were taken up under contract to revert in title to Williamson and Gesner at a future date, and the money for the filing and other fees was furnished the claimants by Dr. Gesner.

In addition to the 45 persons secured, Mr. and Mrs. Williamson, Dr. Gesner, two nephews of Mr. Williamson, Commissioner Biggs and a number of harders in the employ of the firm of Williamson & Gesner also filed on claims.

OTHER INDICTMENTS MADE.

Charging conspiracy to prevent and obstruct the free passage over and free use of certain public lands in Wheeler County, the Federal Grand Jury yesterday afternoon indicted the following persons: Winlock W. Steiwer, ex-State Senator, and president of the Butte

Creek Land, Lumber & Livestock Company; Hamilton H. Herdlick, secretary and treasurer of the company; Clarence B. Zachary, Adelbert C. Zachary, Charles A. Watson and Clyde E. Glass, officers and employees of the Butte Creek Company; Binger Hermann, ex-Commissioner of the General Land Office, and now Representative in Congress; John H. Hall, ex-United States District Attorney; Edwin Mays, ex-Assistant United States Attorney under John H. Hall; Franklin P. Mays, State Senator from Multnomah County and attorney for the Butte Creek Company; Edward D. Stratford, an employee of the company.

This is the result of the long efforts of the Government officials to bring to account the Butte Creek Land, Lumber & Livestock Company, of Wheeler County, which is said to have acquired land and done many other things in a manner contrary to law. The first three named are president, secretary and treasurer and general manager, respectively, of the company. The others are named for complicity and for alleged operations in favor of the conspiracy.

The second indictment charged conspiracy to defraud the Government by means of false and fraudulent surveys of Government lands. These surveys, it is alleged, were authorized by the filing of false and fraudulent applications for surveys. The men indicted are the following: Henry Meldrum, ex-Surveyor-General; George E. Waggoner, ex-chief clerk in Meldrum's office; David W. Kinnaird, ex-examiner of surveys; Benjamin F. Minton and Gustave Klaetsch, land surveyors; George Sorenson, Livy Stipp, and Frank H. Duncan, notaries public.

(E. D. Stratford, one of the men indicted on Friday, is a former editor of the Roseburg Plaindealer and an ex-chairman of the Douglas County Republican committee. Later he held a position as special agent of the United States Land Office during the time Binger Hermann was commissioner of that department.)

DIED.

FAIR.—At the Oregon Soldiers' Home on Sunday, Feb. 12, 1905, Phillip Fair, aged 75 years.

Decensed was a native of Germany and served in the Civil War. He enlisted in Co. A, 20th Pennsylvania Infantry on May 6, 1861, and was honorably discharged on June 18, 1864. He was wounded in the battle of Gettysburg and also in the battle of Chancellorsville. He was admitted to the home on Aug. 10, 1894, and had been a member thereof most of the time since. He leaves no relatives here but it is thought some still reside in Philadelphia. The funeral was held at the home cemetery this forenoon with services conducted by Rev. T. O'Carroll.
