Weather for February.

Monthly meteorological summary for Roseburg, Oregon for the month of February 1905.

Mean atmospheric pressure 30.02, highest 30.40, date 8th; lowest 29.56, date 5th. Highest temperature 63, date 28th; lowest 17, date 12th; greatest daily range 24, date 15th; least daily range 3, date 1st. Mean temperature for this month 44. Mean of this month for 28 years, 43; absolute maximum for this month for 28 years, 74; absolute maximum for this month for 28 years, 3; average daily excess of this month as compared with mean of 28 years, 16; accumulated excess since January 1, 113; average daily excess since January 1, 19. Total precipitation this month 94; snowfall 0.2 inches; greatest precipitation in 24 hours 18, date 22nd. Average of this month for 28 years, 4.83; total from September 1, 1904 to date 18.72; average from September 1 to date 24.97; deficiency from September 1, 1904 to date, as compared with average of corresponding period, 6.25; average for 27 wet seasons, 33.57. Prevailing direction of winds w; total movement 1745 miles; average hourly velocity 2.6; maximum velocity (for five minutes), 18 miles per hour, from southwest on the 19. No. of clear days 9; partly cloudy 7; cloudy 12; on which .01 inch, or more of precipitation occurred 12; hours of sunshine 109.7. Fog 1st, 3rd, 7th, 24th, 18th, 22nd, 25th, 26th and 27th. THOS. Death of a Pioneer.

Coquille Herald: Stephen Bean was born in Muskingum county, Ohio, March 21, 1829. He moved with his parents to Indiana in 1839. Removed to Ohio in 1841, where he lived until the fall of 1843, when he started with his parents for Oregon. The winter was a severe one and the roads were so bad they had to winter at St. Joseph, Missouri. They left St. Joseph on the 10th day of March, 1844, to resume their journey to Oregon. On and on they urged their weary oxen until they reached the John Day river in Oregon. The river was so swollen that they came near starving to death before they could cross, having sent their provisions down from The Dalles on a boat, only retaining a small amount. They finally crossed the John Day and crossed the Cascades amid snow and rain, and arrived at Oregon City on the banks of the Willamette river, in the beautiful valley of the Willamette, on the 15th day of November, 1844, being the second train of immigration that ever crossed the plains. He lived over 35 years in Douglas county, moving to Coos county in 1901, where he lived till the time of his death. He was a devoted Christian, having joined the Missionary Baptist church in 1867. He was married to Martha Ann Allen August 13, 1854. He was the father of eleven children, nine of which survive him, and was a loving husband and a kind father. He leaves a wife, five sons and four daughters to mourn his late demise, his wife, Mrs. S. Bean, Lampa creek, Oregon; W. S. Bean, Harrisburg, Oregon; W. A. Bean, Coquille, Oregon; A. S. Bean and Mrs. Mary Hazard, Drain, Oregon; Mrs. Clara Burns, The Dalles, Oregon; Mrs. Myrtle Randall, Tacoma, Wash.; Jas. L. Bean, Edgar Bean and Mrs. J. H. Timmon, of Lampa creek, Oregon. He was sick four months, but he bore his suffering with Christian resignation and patience. His devoted and loving nurses during his sickness were his wife and J. L. Bean, E. M. Bean and Mrs. J. H. Timmon. They rarely left the sick room, even to secure rest, and were by his bedside when he expired. His remains were laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery at Coquille.
