TOWN IMPROVEMENT

SOME VALUABLE SUGGESTIONS BY THE REV. FRANCIS E. CLARK.
What He Saw on a Recent Trip—How Unhappily Towns and Villages Might Be Beautified—Marking Historic Spots in a Community.
In a recent issue of the Christian Endeavor World the Rev. Francis E. Clark contributes an article on village improvement and civic pride that contains many valuable suggestions. He says in part:
As I write this article I am riding on one of the great trunk railway lines of our country, and I am disgusted with some of the ramshackle, filthy, unkempt towns through which I am passing. At the last stopping place a big dump heap of refuse and garbage graced the approach to the railway station. A shallow stream, crossed by several bridges near the center of the town, was beyond expression unpleasant to look at. Broken barrels and shattered crockery and defunct cans and battered tin cans strewn the sides and bottom of the stream. A purring brook which might have been the most beautiful and attractive feature of the landscape was transformed by carelessness and indifference into a foul open sewer, and I began to wonder whether what foreigners say of us is true—that "America is the most untidy nation of the world."
Yet side by side with these unsightly scenes were fine public buildings; cheek by jowl with tumble-down cabins were elegant mansions, evidently the abode of wealth and perhaps of culture.
Then the thought came to me, as it often did before: Have not Christian Endeavorers something to do with cleaning up the physically unclean as well as the morally unclean? Can we not start a crusade for tidiness, for village improvement, for the beautifying of our streets and squares and vacant lots, our highways and byways and hedgerows?
Not all parts of the country are equally untidy. Many New England villages are as neat as a Dutch housewife could desire. Some places in all parts of the country have learned that cleanliness is next to thrift and prosperity as well as next to godliness, but much is left to be desired.
Why not make it one of our good citizenship efforts to beautify and cleanse the outside as well as the inside of the municipal cup and platter?
Why not also arouse civic pride and keep it alive by marking historic spots, even though they be of only local interest, and by holding a meeting once in awhile to hear their story and kindle the fires of local patriotism?
I was reminded of this phase of my subject by a visit to Guilford, Conn., a few weeks ago, when I attended a capital meeting of the Guilford Christian Endeavor union. Guilford is one of the most charming of New England villages. Broad streets lined with magnificent elms and comfortable residences and fertile farms abound everywhere. Here, too, is a town of the most intense historic interest, full of landmarks of the Revolutionary and anti-Revolutionary days, and yet, with a single exception, not one of them is marked, and as a stranger I should never have known how rich Guilford is in memories of other days if my kind host, Mr. Knowles, the president of the Christian Endeavor union, had not been particularly well posted and pointed them all out to me.
Search your town records. Take pride in your own history. Mark the places which are only of local interest.
If your society or union cannot do it alone call a meeting of citizens to secure their interest and financial help. See that the work is done neatly even if inexpensively. Keep records of what is done for those who come after you. Have an occasional public meeting for recounting and emphasizing the history of the past.
If you want an example of the best way of marking historic sites go to Concord and Lexington, Mass., where every road and every old house is made to speak in eloquent language of heroic deeds of yore. But in less elaborate and less expensive ways much may be done to preserve the memories of the past.
Christian Endeavor itself has some memorials of its own. The birthplace of the first society in Portland is already marked by a beautiful bronze tablet. The second society, that in the Old North church of Newburyport, I hope will some time have its memorial. The first societies in all the different states and countries and counties even might well mark the fact in some way.
Christian Endeavor, however, is young and has had but little time to make history, but it can mark history and thus preserve the traditions of the elders, hand down their good deeds to future generations and lead the young people everywhere to emulate their virtues.
All such efforts for good citizenship will be remembered at "Bathesda, 1905," with a beautiful certificate and honorable mention in the "Recognition Book." It is none too soon for societies and unions to consider, record and mark the interesting spots and events in the history of their communities.
At least we can clean up our waste corners, remove our dumps from the sight of every passing traveler, tidy up our lawns and create a public sentiment that will be ashamed of slatternly municipal disorder. Then the citizens of the present and the generations of the future will rise up and call us blessed.
