INSULTS UNITED STATES

Pres. Castro Defies Whole American Army and Navy.

CARACAS, Venezuela, April 12.—"President Castro will not withdraw the New York & Bermudez Asphalt Company case from Venezuelan courts and will not submit the Olcott case to arbitration if the whole American army and navy come to Venezuela."

This emphatic statement of the Venezuelan Secretary of Foreign Affairs, reflects the spirit of the reply which Castro made to the recent proposal of the American State Department for the arbitration of the Bermudez and Olcott cases.

It was generally rumored throughout Venezuela that the demand of the United States was little less than an ultimatum to General Castro and the reply of the Venezuelan President was awaited with interest. Nearly two weeks have passed since Castro made this reply and, as no action has been taken by the United States and no further demands have been made, the last demand of the United States has gone the way of many previous requests for arbitration and the incident is practically closed as far as discussion in Caracas is concerned.

Hubbard Creek News.

EDITOR REVIEW: Having visited the good people of Hubbard creek, I thought maybe a few words about that prosperous locality would be of interest.

That valley was first settled some time in the '70's by three men who, attracted by the fine cedar timber, went there to manufacture shingles. One of those men, B. W. Spague, still lives there on a fine ranch, on which he raised the first crop of clover on the creek. He also has a fine orchard.

W. B. Clarke will start his saw mill for the spring run about the 12th of this month. He will cut about 400,000 feet of lumber this year. Churchill and Van Dyke are his loggers. They have secured a fine lot of good logs.

Mr. F. M. Black, who lived on Hubbard creek for a number of years, is a prosperous farmer. He raised a large family and seems to be enjoying life splendidly for a man of his age. Mr. Black makes a success of raising onions and other garden truck.

Mr. B. B. Sutton is in the sheep-raising business. He has a fine flock of sheep which he will commence to shear right away. He will have a superior crop of fine wool for which he has been offered a good price. Mr. Sutton has also a fine lot of lambs.

The Germond boys who are in the timber business, deal in boards, posts, stakes or any thing in the timber line. Charley Germond is our Deputy Assessor. He is the right man for the place, doing his work well and without fear or favor.

The Briggs mill has changed hands. It is now owned by Howard & Co., practical mill men. The mill is now in operation, sawing several thousand feet of fine clear lumber a day.

This valley is a great fruit valley and strange to say the fruit pests have never appeared there. The lands are peculiarly adapted to the raising of the finest quality of apples, samples of which will probably be sent to the Lewis and Clark fair.

The people of Hubbard creek are highly elated over the prospects of a railroad survey from Oakland to Coos Bay, through that valley. They claim they have the shortest feasible route between the points named by at least 30 miles and the lowest pass through the Coos river ridge by 500 feet. They have induced some capitalists to run a preliminary line through from Coles valley to tide water on Coos Bay. The proposed line will be run about the first of May.

The people of Coles valley are all

busy making gardens. Mr. Kamp's hop pack is in fine condition. The young vines are growing nicely and are at least three weeks ahead of their length as compared with corresponding periods of former years.

Horace Deardoff was over in this valley last week with his fine thoroughbred horses. To say they were fine is putting it very mildly. Mr. Deardoff shows good judgment in getting the best that money can buy and deserves great credit for his energy and enterprise. He should be liberally patronized as he is doing more than any other man in this community to induce the farmers to raise better horses. We learn that Mr. Deardoff intends to visit the valley once a week during the season. He is going to take his German coach horse to the Portland fair. He will make it very interesting for those who compete with him for the prize.
