HOGE PLEADS NOT GUILTY.

Alleged Confederate of H. W. Miller and F. E. Kincart.

PORTLAND, April 20.—Martin G. Hoge, indicted jointly with Charles Nickel, Harry W. Miller and Frank E. Kincart, for alleged subornation of perjury in connection with alleged fraudulent land transactions in Southern Oregon, entered a plea of not guilty to the charge in Judge Bellinger's court this morning.

Hoge is an attorney of Medford, Jackson county, and is accused of having accepted commissions from the firm of Miller & Kincart for lending disinterested support to their schemes. It is claimed by the government that both Miller & Kincart were strangers in the community when they first went there, and adopted this method of getting acquainted, the presumption being that Hoge, who was well known in Jackson county, was in a position to aid the firm by inducing alleged fraudulent operations in obtaining about 100 locators to take up lands in that vicinity for some mythical New Zealand corporation, Miller and Kincart profiting to the extent of the location fees, ranging in extent from \$25 to \$100 in each case.

State Senator George C. Brownell, indicted for subornation of perjury in having induced two witnesses to swear falsely before the grand jury, and George Sorenson, indicted with Senator Mitchell, will appear for arraignment tomorrow morning.

POLITICS TO BE IGNORED.

Chairman of Panama Canal Committee Will Have Free Hand.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—When Theodore P. Shonts took hold of the building of the Panama canal he stipulated that he should not be bound down to let politics interfere with his work. This made wrathful several hundred congressmen whose names appear as indorsements on thousands of applications made by men throughout the United States for jobs under the canal commission.

Chairman Shonts stands in line with the president's views of the federal government and it took them about two minutes to arrive at a complete understanding of the question concerning the hiring of employees.

Shonts told the president that he wanted a free hand and the president told him he should have it and that settled the matter. As a result a big pile of applications will be run through by the new chairman, who disregards all political indorsements.

If he strikes a man capable of filling a vacancy he may have in mind, that man will get the job despite political indorsements.

Sir Mortimer Durand, the British Ambassador, today informed Secretary Taft that the British Government had, at the Secretary's invitation, selected Chief Engineer Hunter the builder of the Manchester ship canal to act as one of the consulting engineers of the Panama Canal Board. Mr. Hunter has signified his willingness to serve.

Minister Barrett May Go.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The report is published in Washington papers that John Barrett, United States Minister to Panama, anticipating removal, has resigned. The State Department has not received and knows nothing of Mr. Barrett's resignation. It has been understood for several weeks that Mr. Barrett would ultimately be relieved when Judge Magoon should reach Panama and enter upon the duties as Governor of the canal zone. It is understood that Magoon will be both Governor of the zone and Minister of Panama. Magoon does not approve of Barrett's methods, and there is much friction between the two men.

If Barrett is relieved at Panama it is doubtful if he will be tendered any other diplomatic position. Barrett has had considerable experience in the diplomatic service, and some of his work has been of much more than ordinary merit. He is a resident of Portland Or., and has attained a high position in public life entirely by his own efforts.

Mr. Markeson is a native of Russia and served for six years in the Russian army. He was also a member of the 35th U. S. Infantry and served in the Philippines, being awarded a gold medal for his services there. In the present war in the Far East, Mr. Markeson is a strong sympathizer with Japan and tried to enlist in her army



but their laws will not admit any foreigner in that capacity. He believes the overthrow of the present Russian monarchy is the only hope for the Russian people, of whom he says, only 10 per cent have any education at all, being kept down and in ignorance by the government officials and the church which works in conjunction therewith. He says the people of this country do not seem to realize the great blessings and privileges which they daily enjoy, and with the opportunities afforded, a person can learn as much in one year here as they could in 20 years in Russia. He may lecture on this subject while here.
