FIRE IN NORTH ROSEBURG

Incendiary Causes Destruction of Mrs. Ira Genger's Cottage.

Between the hours of 11 and 12 o'clock Monday night, fire of incendiary origin completely destroyed the cottage of Mrs. Ira Genger, in the northern portion of North Roseburg. That the cottage was deliberately set on fire is well established by the fact that it had not been occupied since six weeks ago, when Mrs. Genger and her children moved into another house about one-half mile distant, taking all of their household effects with them, save a few articles of furniture for which they had no room. These articles were destroyed in the fire.

The loss is about \$100 covered by \$250 insurance. There is no clue to the identity of the incendiary. The only motive ascribed for the deed is that the cottage may have been considered by the incendiary as a menace to the health of the community from the fact that two deaths from consumption had occurred on the place, one of them quite recently. Mrs. Genger's object in moving out was to have the cottage thoroughly overhauled and renovated.

"Flyer" Makes Great Run.

CHICAGO, June 12.—On its initial run from New York, the Pennsylvania's 18-hour "flyer," the fastest long-distance train in the world, arrived in this city at 8:52 o'clock this morning, three min-

utes ahead of schedule time. In order to accomplish this feat, extraordinary achievements in the way of fast running were necessary.

The fastest time was made near Ada, O., where three miles was covered in 85 seconds, or at the rate of a mile in 28 1/3 seconds, breaking all records. This is at the rate of 137.3 miles an hour. A delay of 15 minutes was entailed on the journey in order to allow a "hot box" on the tender to cool.

Already the Pennsylvania Railroad officials are discussing the possibility of reducing the running time between Chicago and New York to 16 hours.

MITCHELL LOSES

Demurrer to Indictment Overruled by DeHaven.

TRIAL SET FOR JUNE 20

Jury Panel Now Being Drawn In Presence of Defendant's Attorneys Upon Their Request.

PORTLAND, Or., June 13.—Judge DeHaven in the United States' court this morning overruled the demurrer of the defense and sustained the indictment of the federal grand jury, charging Senator Mitchell with violating the federal statute by receiving fees for departmental work while United States senator. It is specifically alleged that the senator was a member of the firm of Mitchell & Tanner, attorneys, and that money was paid them by Frederick Kribs for the purpose of expediting claims to land patents.

The trial of the defendant was set for June 20, and the jury panel is now being drawn in the presence of the attorneys for the defense who have been accorded this privilege upon request, although it is an unusual proceeding.

It was contended in the demurrer overruled by Judge DeHaven that Senator Mitchell, who was a member of the firm of Mitchell & Tanner, might have accepted the sum which it is alleged Kribs paid him for expediting land entries, as money belonging to the firm, and not as a personal matter. It was also claimed the indictment does not specifically set forth that the indicted man was at the time of the alleged transaction, a United States senator, without which there could be no crime.

Bloody Wyoming Fight

BLACKFOOT, Idaho, June 12.—Four outlaws and two ranchers have been killed in a running fight of six miles between cattle rustlers and cattle raisers at the edge of the wild Jackson's Hole country in Western Wyoming. Several horses were killed during the fight, five being shot down in one spot. The cattle rustlers, it is stated, rounded up about 90 head of fine steers and started toward the most favorable railroad point, the intention being to gather more cattle enroute. The ranchers to whom the cattle belonged organized a posse and pursued.

Reports Repulse of Russian Attacking Columns.

BUT LITTLE NEWS TODAY

TOKIO, June 13.—Marshal Oyama reports that on June 11, some mixed columns of Russian troops attacked his positions in the vicinity of Yingoching, Eashlipo and Shufang Tai. All these attacks were repulsed with some loss.

FOR MONROE, June 11.—At 3 o'clock this morning a battleship and three other vessels appeared off the fortress and were "sunk" by the vigorous fire of the coast artillery guns. The smaller vessels were sent up the Potomac river, the heavier ones making a demonstration against the fort.
