A PUMPING PLANT

To be Put in At Once by S. P. R. R. Co.

THEIR OWN WATER SUPPLY

New Livestock Yards and Other Improvements on the Company's Property.

Surveys have been made by the S. P. R. R. Co. for putting in right away a temporary pumping plant at the foot of Houck street in Roseburg, for supplying their locomotives, etc., with water, at their round house in this city. The facilities of the local water company have been overtaxed in trying to supply water both to the citizens of the town and to the railroad company for their engines and cars, and as a result there have been frequent shortages all around. Such a condition has been very unsatisfactory to all concerned, hence the railroad company have decided to put in a plant of their own for operation during the summer. This will be done just as soon as the pump and the necessary mains can be put in place—perhaps within about ten days. The recent shortage of water supply for irrigation of lawns, and in many instances for house use, following a similar condition at frequent intervals last summer, has caused an active revival of the agitation for establishing a municipal water system. Such a system will doubtless eventually be established unless the local company furnishes a more satisfactory service than was done last week. However, as soon as the railroad company's plant is installed, the local company can much easier supply their other patrons.

OTHER R. R. IMPROVEMENTS.
The S. P. R. R. Co. is making other extensive improvements in their yards here. New livestock pens have just been completed and more new tracks are being laid in the southwestern part of the yards. The piling has all been driven for the new coal bunkers and same are now being capped, preparatory for the high line track. Work on the new brick roundhouse is also expected to begin at an early date. A great many thousands of dollars are being expended by the railroad company in this vicinity this year.

THE COOKBOOK.

Salt is not to be added to oatmeal until it has boiled about fifteen minutes.

LAND FRAUD CASE

Williamson's Trial is Nearing End at Portland.

MANY MOTIONS OF DEFENSE

Want Testimony Stricken Out—Ask Also For Court to Enter Decree of Non-suit.

PORTLAND, Or., July 13.—The day was largely consumed in the Williamson land fraud case arguing various motions of the defense for striking out testimony, and also a motion for non suit.

MASS OF EVIDENCE.

A mass of documentary evidence was introduced during the forenoon session of the Williamson-Briggs-Gesner trial yesterday, the effect of which is to show Gesner's acts in furtherance of the conspiracy and Briggs' knowledge of the illegality of the procedure. Correspondence between Briggs, as United States Commissioner at Prineville, and Jay P. Lucas, then Register of the Dalles Land Office, showed that Briggs had sent in all the applications of the timber entrymen; that he asked to have the final receipts all sent to him, and that Gesner had written inclosed checks in payment of final proof for various entrymen, aggregating more than \$4000.

The trial of Williamson, Gesner and Briggs will probably be concluded today, as far as the evidence is concerned. United States District Attorney Honey announced yesterday that he would conclude today. The Government has many more witnesses, but probably will not call more than three or four. Judge Bennett, chief counsel for the defense, said that the course of the defense had not been determined upon as yet, but that it would probably not have more than two or three witnesses. He thought the defense could complete its case by today.

Four witnesses were before Judge and jury against the three defendants this forenoon. Ernest Starr told of his experience in filing upon a piece of land; of the arrangement whereby he was to receive the money from Gesner & Williamson, and of his appearance before Briggs to file. He was rigidly cross-examined by Judge Bennett for the defense, but his story was unshaken.

BAD CASE OF FORGETFULNESS.

Miss Maggie Glaze, who attracted attention as a witness with a peculiarly failing memory, was the second witness in the morning. She could remember nothing more than that she had had a talk with Briggs about filing on a timber claim, and he had told her that there was \$75 in it. Did she remember anything that was said as to who would furnish the money? No, she had forgotten closely, but after a close examination by District Attorney Honey, and a reminder of past testimony and her appearance before the grand jury, she rallied enough to recall that she was told that it wouldn't cost her anything. There was a smile in the courtroom during the examination of this witness. Miss Glaze is said to be a school teacher of Salem.

J. P. Lucas testified concerning the correspondence with Briggs. He identified the signature of the defendant to the communications accompanying the applications and the constant reminders to "please send the receipts to me."

Judge Bennett with Starr during the morning sought to draw out more about the sheepmen-cattlemen range war. The evident purpose of the defense in this is to form the basis for a defense that the prosecution of Williamson and Gesner is in part inspired by the enmity of the cattlemen toward them.

BROWNELL ENTERS PLEA.

When court opened yesterday morning Attorney Dan J. Malarky entered a plea of not guilty in behalf of State Senator George C. Brownell, charged with subornation of perjury.

Offered Crown of Norway.

COPENHAGEN, July 13.—It is understood that Prince Charles of Denmark is willing to accept the crown of Nor-

way if King Christian and the Danish government consent. Some members of the royal family are in favor of his acceptance of the crown, but King Christian is believed to be opposed to it. No decision, however, will be given out before His Majesty returns from Austria next week.

Drowns in Grand Ronde.

LA GRANDE, Or., July 13.—Henry Freshman was drowned in the Grand Ronde River, about one mile above this city, Monday afternoon. Freshman, who is about 19 years of age, went to the river with a younger brother and a number of boys for a bath, and in wading out in the stream, the brothers, neither of whom could swim, stepped into a deep hole, and before assistance could reach them, Henry had drowned, and the younger one was insensible when taken from the water.

"HOG TYPE" ENGINES

Extra Machines Put on in Cow Creek Canyon.

GRANTS PASS, Or., July 13.—About 15 additional locomotives, of the "hog" type, have been placed on the mountain division of the Southern Pacific to assist in transporting the many extra trains from Grant's Pass to Roseburg. Sunday each northbound passenger was divided into four sections of 11 cars each, and the railroad men say this number of coaches will be demanded from this time on until the Fair closes, the heavy passenger traffic being due entirely to the Lewis and Clark Exposition. Additional crews and extra men are pressed into service in every department because of the rush. To avoid accident every precaution is taken, and trains are run on slow time over the mountains and through Cow Creek Canyon, north of Grant's Pass. The sections are run about 20 minutes apart, and each is preceded by a track-walker or road-inspector over the more dangerous part of the line.

The mountain division here is in charge of G. W. Donnell, whose several years of actual service has acquainted him with every foot of the line over which he has supervision. He has reserve crews, with construction and wrecking trains, placed at sidings in the mountains, ready to respond to a "hurry-up" call at any moment of day or night. Thus far no wrecks or accidents of any nature have occurred, which may be considered remarkable, as a continual stream of trains is passing through Cow Creek Canyon. Work of laying 80-pound steel rails is now completed over the entire Southern Oregon division, and heavy locomotives and coaches are now run with much greater degree of safety over the road.
