Salem Statesman: John A. Pierce, an all-around would-be bad man, especially when under the influence of liquor, was yesterday morning presented with a tie pass and floated from the city by Recorder W. A. Moores. Pierce was taken in by Marshal Cornelius on Tuesday afternoon and assigned to a cell in the city jail. He was intoxicated at the time and had been making himself disagreeable to everyone who happened to be near him. His departure is a good riddance to the city, according to the opinion of the officers.

(Pierce served a term in jail at Roseburg for stealing a barber equipment from Glenn Woodruff. After being released he went to Eugene, where he was again jailed for vagrancy and drunkenness, his chief characteristics.)

Dr. E. V. Hoover returned Thursday night from the headwaters of West Fork, where he and Atty. Chas. L. Hamilton had been looking after their mining interests for several days. They have done considerable development work and had a number of assays made. These tests show that the ore has an average value of \$20 per ton, all of which is practically from surface rock. The Martindale mine on the same ledge, upon which nearly 300 feet of tunnelling has been done, has shown values of over \$100 per ton. Numerous other claims have been located in the same vicinity and considerable development work is being done. One mine in that district was bonded a few weeks ago for over \$30,000, and Dr. Hoover believes several valuable mines will soon be developed there.

NATURAL GAS ON FARM.

T. J. Brown, Formerly of Roseburg, Makes Valuable Discovery.

Natural gas has been discovered on the farm of T. J. Brown, near Portland. Mr. Brown is a former railroad man of this city and a son-in-law of M. F. Rapp, a former Roseburg druggist. Concerning the discovery on Mr. Brown's farm, the Portland Journal of Aug. 10, says:

Natural gas has been discovered on Johnson creek near Lents Junction, and unless all the signs fall, not only is it there in paying quantities, but there is plenty of oil as well.

The discovery was made a couple of days ago by T. J. Brown, on whose place of 11 acres the gas is, in a peculiar manner. While searching for crawfish along the stream Mr. Brown noticed that oily globules rose to the surface and exploded. Mr. Brown held a lighted match to one of these bubbles and it shot up a tiny flame. Somewhat surprised, Mr. Brown secured a box of matches and spent the afternoon testing the bubbles and found that for 100 yards the stream's surface was covered with gaseous globules that ignited at the touch of flame.

Another and more convincing experiment occurred to Mr. Brown, and he applied the ground test. A long stick was cut and plunged into the mud of the creek's bank for several feet, and a match held to the mouth of this hole the instant the stick was withdrawn caused a flame to shoot out, sometimes as long as a man's arm.

Yesterday afternoon exhaustive tests were made and it was discovered that in many places enough gas was released by plunging a stick in the mud to burn for several seconds, with a blaze so intense that nearby green vegetation was consumed in the fierce heat and several holes released enough gas to cause a small explosion. The fire rushed to the river mud and blazed for half a minute.

The location of the gas along the stream is sharply defined, and 10 feet either side of where no bubbles form on the stream's surface not the slightest indication of gas exists.

That the surrounding district is permeated with gas veins is, however, indicated by the fact that when the well was dug on the Brown property, several hundred yards from the stream, a strange odor drove the workmen from the well and for a time it was impossible to work in the excavation. That was two years ago, and at that time nothing was thought of the incident.
