OPINION ON VACCINATION.

Not Compulsory Declares Attorney-General Crawford.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 12.—In answer to an inquiry Attorney-General Crawford has rendered a decision holding that the State Board of Health has no authority to require that children shall be vaccinated before gaining admission to the public schools.

The Attorney-General quotes from the law creating the Board of Health, showing that the board has general supervision of the health of the state and power to establish quarantines. The vaccination rule would not be in the nature of a quarantine; hence the board cannot find its authority in that provision.

Neither does Mr. Crawford think the clause giving the board general supervision will authorize them to establish a new qualification for admission to the public schools unless there is apparent danger of an epidemic of smallpox.

Ocean Pouring into Salton.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 12.—Through great underground fissures, rent by earthquake shocks, the waters of the Gulf of California are pouring into the old Salton Basin and resistlessly forcing the new Salton Sea to sea level.

Doubt no longer exists as to the origin of this vast inland sea which now skirts the main line of the Southern Pacific for nearly 100 miles and stretches away on either side of the track 25 miles to the foothills.

Human Stone Quarry.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—A dispatch to the Tribune from St. Cloud, Minn., says: John Janski, of this city, aged 22, is a human stone quarry. Fourteen months ago he was the victim of an explosion in a stone quarry, and ever since then the doctors have been prospecting, every time with good results. Four thousand pieces of stone have been removed from various parts of Janski's anatomy. A piece of granite weighing an ounce came out of his arm in an op-

eration yesterday, and another of half an ounce weight was removed from the socket of his eye, which was lost in the explosion. Four times a week Janski, without taking an anesthetic, submits to the knife.

EXPERT RIFLE SHOTS.

Entertain a Large Crowd at O. N. G. Range Sunday.

At the O. N. G. rifle range in Kinney's Addition yesterday, Messrs. Carter and Hillis, rifle experts, of the Peters Cartridge Co., of Cincinnati, Ohio, gave a most entertaining exhibition of their skill and demonstration of the superior qualities of the Peters ammunition. A large crowd was present. After explaining in detail the process of manufacture of ammunition, which by the way was very interesting to the lovers of shooting who were present, especially the game hunters, to show the waterproofing of the shot gun shells, a number of rapid shots were fired which brought out the paraffin on the paper. Then iron washers were sent buzzing through the air with a 32-20 rifle bullets. With the 22 rifle smaller washers went the same way with rapid regularity, then the smallest sized marbles were hit without a single miss.

The supposedly impossible feat of exploding 22-calibre cartridges, which were tossed in the air, was accomplished with the same ease by both Mr. Carter and Mr. Hillis as if they were the size of apples. This was done after firing several hundred shots without cleaning their rifles, which they claimed was unnecessary with the semi-smokeless powder used.

At all events, their work demonstrated accuracy of aim with reliable guns and ammunition.

A number of the Oregon National Guard rifle team, who attended the national event at Sea Girt, N. J., this year, were present and pronounced the work of Messrs. Carter and Hillis to be of the highest order. They are using for indoor practice the Stevens-Pope rifle and the Stevens-Pope cartridges, which cartridge was used by Mr. Carter, Mr. Hillis using the Short.

Indictments For Illegal Voting in New York.

MORE PERHAPS TO FOLLOW

Norwegians Favor Prince Charles of Denmark For King by Vote of Five to One.

NEW YORK CITY, Nov. 13.—The Grand Jury this afternoon returned indictments against eight persons, charging them with illegal voting, at last Tuesday's election. Six of the persons indicted are under arrest and warrants have been issued for the other two. It is understood that the Grand Jury has ordered indictments drawn against other persons.

John Kroup, one of the indicted persons under arrest, is reported to have confessed his guilt and implicated "one higher up."

NORWAY VOTES ON RULER.

CHRISTIANA, Nov. 13.—Returns to date from the election held throughout Norway, show 15,000 votes in favor of investing the title of King in Prince Charles of Denmark, and 3,000 votes against such action.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 13.—The state chairman of the democratic party today gave out the following statement:

Death of John Gillam.

John Gillam, employed at C. P. Barnard's livery stables, died suddenly at his home in this city Saturday evening, Nov. 11, 1905, of pneumonia. He lacked about one month of being 32 years of age. On the day of his death, Mr. Gillam had attended to his work as usual and upon returning home shortly after 6 o'clock in the evening made no complaint of being ill, although he mentioned at noon that he was not feeling very well. About eight o'clock, however, he was seized with a violent coughing spell which developed into a hemorrhage and an hour afterwards passed away. Mr. Gillam was unmarried. Surviving him are his aged mother, a pioneer of Douglas County, and cousin of J. C. Alken, of this city, and a brother and two sisters: J. Creed Gillam, Mrs. A. J. Chapman and Mrs. Dan Fisher, all of Portland. All of these were in attendance at the funeral, which was held at the former family home at Wilbur today, with services conducted by Rev. F. W. Leonard.

The remains of the deceased were laid to rest besides those of his father, who died about five years ago.

The deceased leaves to his mother a policy of \$2000 in the Modern Woodmen of America, of which order he was a member, and to his sister, Mrs. Dan Fisher, a policy of \$2,000 also in the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York.

He was a quiet, unassuming young man and well liked by all who knew him.
