REFORMS IN RURAL SECTIONS

Value of Beautifying the Country

Districts.

In many of the smaller cities of this country efforts are now being made to beautify them. The movements for the abolition of the billboard and mud-bill nuisance, the cutting of the weeds and grass about public and private places, are all in the right direction, says the Washington (Pa.) Observer. Well kept lawns, clean streets and alleys, vacant lots well delivered of weeds, are all part of the work of making a city clean and beautiful. These things help any town. They attract residents and draw capitalists. But while these efforts are being made by the residents of our towns, why should not the residents of the country districts also make reforms along this line? Any one passing through some sections of the country—in the country districts—is struck by the ill kept farmhouses, the surroundings in many instances being anything but beautiful. The fields show an abundant harvest, the sheep and cattle are grazing over the meadows, the corn is prolific, and there is everything to indicate that the farmer is prosperous.

But about the house and scattered over the farm are evidences of neglect in making the premises attractive. The lawn is ill kept, the steps almost worn out, while about the fences weeds have grown up so as to almost obscure the view. Over the farm there are dead trees, others which are in sad need of trimming, and the whole farm indicating that no effort is given toward making it look beautiful. Beauty will add to the value of any farm, and those who would make the country more attractive and their properties worth more money should give some attention to these things. The building of good roads will do more than any other one thing to bring about improved conditions in our country districts, and it is already in evidence. We should have beautiful country districts along smooth and well improved highways as well as beautiful trees, towns and cities. They are all important in the life of our people.

FIGHTING THE BILLBOARD.

Why Some Regard It as Permanently Evil to Towns.

The agitation against the billboard as a municipal disfigurement has already reached goodly proportions, and the campaign is as yet in its infancy, says American Homes and Gardening. Some efforts, and well meant efforts, have been made to improve it, partly by designing the billboard itself and partly by improving the designs of the signs. Nothing has, however, yet been accomplished that amounts to definite and general improvement, and hence it is pertinent to inquire if the billboard is to go.

One of the most obvious steps in municipal betterment is to do away with unnecessary, unsightly objects. The billboard has been unsightly so long that many people regard it as permanently evil. At all events, it is clear that if it is to remain it can only do so under much better conditions than now obtain, and it must be supported on broader grounds than the fact that a handsome advertising business has grown up through its promotion. No business can be successfully promoted by improper means. The billboard, glaring and staring at every point, approaches the limit beyond which business should not go. Its misfortune has been injudicious use.

How to Better the Home Town.

One enterprising farmer writing to an agricultural paper states that he has found that he could sell his honey for better prices in his home town than in the large cities. He advises every producer of honey living near a town of 1000 people or more to cultivate the market and claims that in a place of that size a ton of honey should be sold each year. He says that if every producer of honey should rush his crop to the big cities as soon as gathered the price to the producer would go down to bed rock and the home market be bare unless returned by commission men to local dealers. He advises also the following of the same plan with other products of the farm. His advice is worth careful consideration, says Home Trade Advocate. It is evident that the better the home town can be made, the better will be the market for such products of the nearby farms.

Matter of Town Pride.

At Temple, Tex., the streets are now well shaded, though the town was originally located on a bald prairie. The planting of trees has been made a matter of town pride for a number of years.

Arrangements for furnishing the four cottages recently built at the Soldiers' Home, in West Roseburg, were completed last Saturday at a conference held at the home by Commandant W. W. Elder, Governor Gen. E. Chamberlain, State G. A. R. Commander Hills, of Ashland, and State President of the W. R. C. Mrs. Jennie Harding, of Oregon City. The four cottages were built with the appropriation of \$2000 made by the legislature. The W. R. C. has contributed \$500 toward furnishing the cottages and the G. A. R. will contribute whatever additional funds is necessary. Woodsheds for the cottages and a water pipe line to connect them with the supply at the home will be constructed at once. The furnishings for the cottages will be installed by January 1st.
