WEALTH IN GARDENS.

Truck Farmers Who Ride In Automobiles and Are Magnates.

Probably the busiest and most prosperous truck farming area in the United States is the section of Long Island which sends its cauliflower crop over half the continent. The cauliflower has been, almost since the beginning of the history of cooking, a highly esteemed delicacy. Although closely related to the lovely cabbage, it is an aristocrat among garden products, for it is the blossom and not the fruit which is eaten. There are only two or three cauliflower growing districts in the whole country, districts which raise a sufficient quantity to ship beyond merely their local markets, and that on Long Island is much the largest and most important.

The farmers of this region are far from being struggling tillers of the soil. They are keen witted business men who apply the most recent theories of science and devices of ingenuity to their work and the most up to date methods to the management of their affairs. They support five large banks, own a private telephone system and ride about their big gardens or run across to New York in their automobiles as independently as any Wall Street magnate.

This year's Long Island cauliflower crop is estimated to be about 100,000 barrels, or, in round figures, 5,700,000 heads. In order to protect the blossom from sunburn the leaves are allowed to grow long and are tied up over its creamy white face like a hood. When the flower is sent to market these protecting leaves are generally cut off. The "long cut," as the untriumphed head is called, brings \$1 to \$1.25 a barrel, while the "short cut," which has the leaves cut off, is worth about 50 cents a barrel more to trim.

The crop is distributed as far west as Minneapolis and as far south as New Orleans, while New York city, only about seventy miles away by the Long Island railroad, demands 5,000 barrels a day during the season. The growers have other very profitable crops, too, this same section of Long Island being the greatest potato district in the country, with four times the acreage of potatoes that it has of cauliflowers.

Most Costly Camera.

Although it is strictly against Mohammedan law to photograph or make any picture of a human being, the prohibition does not extend to landscapes, and the sultan of Turkey is the owner of the most expensive photographic camera ever manufactured.

Every bit of metal work is of solid gold, while the parts usually made of wood are of ivory, and the bellows is of white morocco lined with black plush. This is carried in a white morocco case mounted with a lock of solid gold. The entire outfit cost \$8,000, although the camera takes a picture only 4 by 5 inches.

Although he is accompanied by a professional photographer, the sultan does not profit by the advice of his instructor, and, while his camera is a recent addition to his vast collection of costly toys, he is already growing tired of it, since he has been unable to obtain a good photograph.

DIED IN HIS 85TH YEAR.

Nathaniel Cockelrease, Who Came to This State in 1852.

Nathaniel Cockelrease, an Oregon pioneer of 1852, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. B. B. Brockway, at Brookway, this morning, Nov. 22, 1905, at the age of 85 years. Infirmities attending his advanced years was the cause of death. The surviving children, besides Mrs. Brockway, are Mrs. Sarah Hedgepeth, of California, and Edward and John Cockelrease, of this county.

The funeral will be held from Brookway tomorrow. Interment will occur in the Bart cemetery, five miles east of here, beside the grave of Mr. Cockelrease's wife, who died a number of years ago. She was a sister of John S. Bonebrake, another well known pioneer of this county.
An obituary of Mr. Cockelrease will be published later.

THE VETERINARY

Nodular disease in sheep is due to a worm that cannot be killed by medicine, says Breeder's Gazette. In the absence of generous feeding this disease (commonly known as "knots") badly affects sheep, but where nutritious food is freely given from weaning time until sheep are ready for market it seems to do little harm. Feed generously upon a mixture of equal parts whole oats and bran, adding a little flaxseed meal or cake; also change pasture, allow free access to salt and supply some succulent food.

Indigestion in Horses.

Horses will sometimes eat large quantities of food, but grow thinner in flesh and be dull at work. This condition is usually caused by indigestion. Boil one teacup of flaxseed into a pulp with water and while hot pour it on half a pail of bran and make a mash of it. Give a mash of this kind once a day for a month with one of the following powders in it: Mix four ounces each of sulphate of iron and nitrate of potassium and divide into twenty-four doses.

Box Spavin.

For puffs on hock joints of a horse mix two drams of biniodide of mercury with two ounces of lard, says American Agriculturist. Rub on a little with the fingers. Let it remain on for twenty-four hours, then wash off. Repeat the blister in the same way every third week until the puffs disappear. Keep the animal in the stable with its head tied up, so that it cannot get its mouth to the blistered part. After the blister is washed off the animal can be turned out to pasture.

Brittle Hoofs.

Brittle hoofs are usually the result of standing too much on a dry floor. Soak the feet in a clay puddle two or three times a week, or you may pack the feet with moist sponge or old cake meal two or three nights in the week. In addition mix four fluid ounces each of whale oil and pine tar and once a day rub a little well into the coronet and upper part of the hoof. If possible turn to pasture daily. At least give daily exercise and reduce the feed if not in service.—Atlanta Constitution.
