Peabody Heads Mutual.

New York, Dec. 12.—The World today says that agreement has been reached to elect Chas. A. Peabody president of the Mutual Life Insurance Company.

This makes the second of the "big three" that has passed into the hands of the Rockefeller-Morgan-Ryan combination since the upheaval in the life insurance business. When the time is ripe for sweeping out the McCall crowd in the New York life, it is expected the same combination will swing that company into the hands of the great triumvirate.

Armed by the fact that Chas. E. Hughes would become president of the Mutual Life, H. H. Rogers, head of the Standard Oil forces, turned down his war dogs on the trustees of that company with the result that a majority has pledged to vote for Peabody.

RUGBY GAME ADOPTED.

Stanford and Berkeley Lead Off in Revising Football.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 12.—Yesterday afternoon the faculty athletic committee of the Stanford University and the University of California adopted a resolution declaring the evils of the present system of football playing in America. It recommends that the Rugby game be introduced as a substitute.

In the same resolution this committee recommends that intercollegiate football contests shall no longer be held, under the direction of the present rules committee, which sit in the East each year and revise the methods of playing the college game. This means an absolute break with this committee, which has governed the game for many years, and the naming of a Western rules committee, which shall have full power to act.

Following are some of the features of the Rugby game.

No interference ahead of the runner. Frequent passing from runner to some other player to prevent being tackled.

Much drop kicking from field. Individual play and open and spectacular work results.

No mass plays, as ball goes into scrimmage on every down.

RECORD TIMBER DEAL.

Weyerhaeuser Lumber Company Invests \$1,500,000 in a Lump.

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 12.—For a consideration said to exceed \$1,500,000, although the exact sum is not stated, the Weyerhaeuser Lumber Company, rated at \$45,000,000 and the largest lumber manufacturing corporation in the United States, yesterday concluded the purchase of the largest body of standing pine timber ever sold, comprising many thousands of acres on the Jenny Creek Plateau, on the Oregon-California boundary and extending almost to Klamath Lake Railroad, 30 miles in length, connecting with the Southern Pacific at Tiller. The timber land was obtained under the one ownership and the railroad owned by Harry Lindley, of Los Angeles, who began his operations in that vicinity nine years ago and now retires from the field. It is understood to be the intention of the new partnership to extend the railroad either to Klamath Falls or to the navigable portion of the river at Keno, in order to serve the rapidly growing Klamath County section.

Conclusion of this purchase extends the lumber industries of the Weyerhaeuser Lumber Company on the Coast from Puget Sound to Northern California, and gives control, not only of the timber area of fir, spruce, red cedar and hemlock, but also the largest single body of yellow and sugar pine, extending from 1,000,000 to 10,000,000 feet in blocks of quarter-sections. From east to west the tract extends through more than four townships, and an equal area north and south, including the most desirable timber lands of vast territory.

KING OF FORGERS.

G. G. Brown discovered that Pater not only printed blank forms of land-sale certificates, but printed blank forms of land office receipts, upon "safety" paper exactly like that used in the state land office. He also had letterheads lithographed in exact duplicate of the letterheads of the land office, and procured rubber stamps to fill in the blanks in receipts.

In other words, Pater provided himself with a complete outfit for running a State Land Office, seal and all. His plan of procedure was as complete as he could make it. He would issue forged certificates exactly like the genuine ones in date, names and land described. He would then issue receipts showing that the purchase price had been paid. He would write letters to himself, signing the name of the present clerk, G. G. Brown, stating that the certificates are valid and in good standing, that payments have been made as shown by receipts, and that deeds will be issued when final payment has been made and the certificates returned.

A few days ago dispatches from Los Angeles, Wis., announced that H. Goddard was victimized by the Pater-McKinley gang to the extent of \$200,000. It is believed in Land Office circles that this estimate is too high, for some of the certificates held by Goddard lost \$200,000, the total amount realized by the forgers will approach \$300,000, for the certificates were disposed of in all parts of the East.

Goddard had known McKinley's father and knew McKinley since he was a boy. The wealthy Wisconsin lumberman trusted McKinley implicitly, and when he asked for money, advanced it to him without much inquiry as to the security.

McKinley got the money from Goddard in four installments. When he went East from Seattle, after leaving his wife here, he went direct to Goddard, and secured from him \$1,000. That was the last of a series of "loans" Goddard had made to him and for which he took the fraudulent certificates as security.

WISE PATS \$5,526,000.

The Bunker Hill & Sullivan's Huge December Profits.

KALAMAZOO, Idaho, Dec. 12.—The great Bunker Hill & Sullivan mine of Warburton, Idaho, famous all over the world as the mine which was judicially found to have been discovered by a Japanese, is paying a December dividend of \$500,000. This makes a total of \$3,275,000 paid since January 1, and a total of \$1,250,000 paid since the discovery of the property by "Old Mac" Kellogg, Phil O'Rourke and the celebrated burro away back in 1905.

The property is now the greatest silver lead producer in the world and in its deepest veins it has a deposit of galena, which is probably unrivaled anywhere. It is owned by D. O. Mills, interests of New York and San Francisco, and Fred Bradley, of San Francisco, is president. The American Smelting & Refining Company recently got a hold in the corporation through a purchase of the stock held by the widow of the late Victor Clement, the distinguished mining engineer, who formerly managed the property. The Clement sale was made for nearly \$500,000.

The Bunker Hill is free from the sinister trust influence, except through the possession of the Clement interests.

Would Abolish Receivers.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—In his annual report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1935, the commissioner of the general land office recommends that the office of receivers of public moneys in the 197 local land offices be abolished, as it is deemed unnecessary to have two offices of co-ordinate office. The proposed action, it is stated, would result in an estimated saving of \$250,000 per annum, and an improvement in the handling of public business in the local land offices.

Lane Logger Killed.

ASHE, Or., Dec. 12.—James Ray, a logger in the Nichols camp on Union creek, fell under a rolling log and was crushed to death today. He leaves a wife and four children.

Alice Roosevelt to Wed.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Miss Alice Roosevelt and Congressman Nicholas Longworth, of Ohio, will be married, either late this winter or early in the spring. Announcement of this fact was made today, although the date has not yet been decided upon.
