LOSS REACHES \$300,000

Six Firemen Injured, one Fatally, by
Collapse of Upper Story
During Blaze.

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 13.—Fire this morning destroyed the wholesale grocery of Wadhams and Kerr Bros., in this city, entailing a loss of \$300,000, partially covered by insurance. During the progress of the fire, the upper floor collapsed, injuring six firemen, one of them, Chris Houston, probably fatally.

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 13.—The district court of appeals today decided that the ballot boxes containing the votes cast at the recent election in New York City, cannot be reopened, as petitioned for by Wm. R. Hearst, who demanded a recount of the votes cast for himself and Geo. B. McClellan for mayor. The probable result of this decision is that McClellan will be seated on January 1, 1906, as mayor of New York City. The count of the vote after the election gave him a majority of over 3,000 votes.

The collection speech by Lillie Reuter was well rendered and the response was generous. The amount was sent to Mrs. Graves to help defray her expenses at the Sanitarium. Dainty refreshments were served and a pleasant social hour enjoyed.

Friday morning, after the appointment of a secretary, committees and reporters, Mrs. Carrie Gregory gave some excellent methods of teaching temperance in the Sunday Schools. In her talk and the discussion, workers were urged to get the teachers interested and furnish help on temperance Sunday.

Mr. Willis, of the Umpqua Valley News, was introduced and spoke encouragingly of his faith in the work of the W. C. T. U. He believes women are the greatest moulders of character.

Rev. Marsters made a good plea for temperance, and practices what he preaches by voting for prohibition.

Mrs. Ferguson emphasized the need of special training of children, and thought the Loyal Temperance Legion the best place to get it.

From facts stated one could not doubt that a flourishing W. C. T. U. is a great help to the church.

Mrs. Marsters led in the discussion of the question of the "Relation of Physical Culture to the Temperance Cause," and gave good reasons why a well poised body is a great help in all we undertake.

Mrs. Barzee gave excellent physical exercises. Noonday prayer was led by Mrs. Bishop.

At 2 p. m., Mrs. Armitage and others gave facts to prove that the distribution of temperance literature does pay.

Mrs. Barzee conducted a Mothers' Meeting, the subject being, "Purity in the Home." The devotions consisted of scripture reading by Mrs. Armitage, prayer by Mrs. Ferguson and a vocal solo by Mrs. Owen. Mrs. Henry Booth sang a beautiful solo.

In debating the question, "Resolved: That the Women of Oregon Should be Given the Ballot at the June Election" Mesdames Bartram, Black and Barzee gave a multitude of good reasons why they should and successfully proved that the argument brought forth by the negative, Mesdames Bishop, Owen, and Ferguson, such as "good women wouldn't vote," "they would have to work the roads, wouldn't improve matters politically, wouldn't cause family disagreements," and other things which anti-suffragists say, is not true, as has been proven in four states of the Union and in several countries of the world. The judges decided in favor of the affirmative.

The Matrons' Contest in the Evening was not attended as it should have been but the audience was attentive and seemed well pleased with the program. Those contesting were: Mrs. Palm, Mrs. Rogers, Roseburg; Mrs. Armitage, Myrtle Creek; Mrs. Stark, Drain, and Mrs. Bishop, Yoncalla. The judges, to the entire satisfaction of all present, awarded the medal to Mrs. Armitage. The institute closed and all interested felt that it had been a success.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Senator Fulton, of Oregon, today interviewed Chairman Barton, of the rivers and harbors committee, in regard to an appropriation for improving the Columbia River. Senator Burton intimated that the Columbia would be provided for in an emergency bill.

Senator Fulton today secured unanimous consent of the senate to the passage of a bill authorizing the Portland-Seattle Railroad Co. to construct a bridge over the Columbia River, near Vancouver. A similar bill passed the house.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 13.—Attorney A. T. Lewis, representing Wade Richardson, postmaster at Milwaukee, Wis., today appeared before the state land board with a bundle of certificates of sale of Oregon school land, for which Richardson paid S. A. D. Puter \$18,000. Upon examination all of the certificates proved forgeries.

Attorney W. W. Cardwell, who went to Salem today, will petition the supreme court for a stay of execution in the case of John G. Barnes, sentenced to be hanged next Friday, for the murder of Wm. Graham, near Glendale. The petition will be asked for in order to present an appeal for a new trial. Petitions of this kind are generally granted, and Barnes' case will probably not prove an exception.
