Congressman Ignored.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—President Roosevelt today gave the Washington delegation a slight touch of the treatment he recently accorded Senator Fulton on patronage matters. Without consulting or even notifying any member of the Washington delegation, he sent in the nomination of Miles Cannon to be Register of the North Yakima Land Office, succeeding Register Heneman, deceased. Mr. Cannon is now Receiver and, it appears, in view of the possible abolition of the office of Land Receiver, the General Land Office deemed it advisable to transfer him to a position which will remain permanent. This was recommended because Mr. Cannon is a tried and efficient officer familiar with work at North Yakima.

Election Officers Sentenced.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 13.—Thomas H. Hartman, jr., William Regan and Charles Judge, election officers in the Twelfth Precinct of the Fourteenth Ward, were today fined \$500 each and sentenced to two years imprisonment. They were convicted of padding the Assessor's list and conspiracy to make fraudulent returns of the election held last February. Benjamin Williams, another officer of the same precinct, was fined \$250 and sentenced to one year in prison.

New Laws Petitioned For.

OREGON CITY, Or., Dec. 13.—Initiative petitions, originating with an executive committee of the State Grange, and proposing the enactment of laws licensing various corporations, are being circulated in this county under the direction of Wm. Griseathwaite, of this county, who is superintending this work in the state under the direction of the members of the executive committee.

One of the petitions seems to create laws imposing a license of 3 per cent on the gross receipts of sleeping cars, refrigerator car and oil companies. Another asks that a law be enacted exacting a license of 3 per cent of the gross earnings of express companies and a license of 2 per cent on the same basis from telegraph and telephone companies.
