

With the manuscripts of seven pupils of the Kellogg district yet to be marked, the result of the 8th Grade Final examinations held in the public schools of Douglas county on June 11 and 12 is that 45 pupils out of a total of 61 who submitted manuscripts were successful. This was announced today by County School Superintendent F. B. Hamlin. The papers from the Kellogg district will be checked over some time this afternoon, and the result will be made public tomorrow.

Of the number of pupils who have just passed, some took the June examination in its entirety, while others simply tried to obtain a certificate in which they failed at the May examination. Noteworthy among the results is that the entire class of 29 pupils under Rev. C. A. Rexroad, principal of the Lane school of this city, have passed, 11 at the examination in May and the remaining 18 at the examination held this month. Number of pupils considered, this is a record perhaps never before equalled by any other teacher in this county.

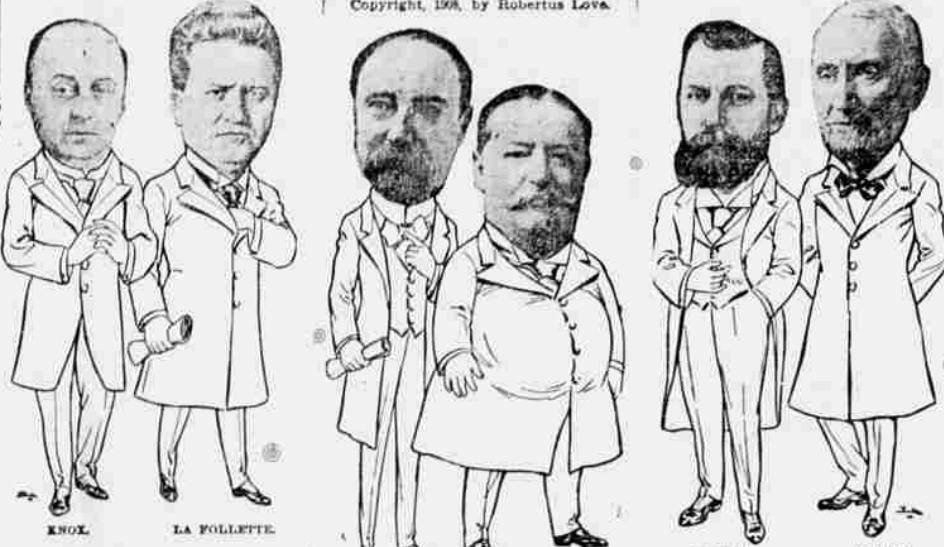

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Republican National Convention

THE COLISEUM By ROBERTUS LOVE CHICAGO, JUNE 16

THE FOURTEENTH national convention of the Republican party met on June 16 in the Coliseum at Chicago to nominate candidates for president and vice president of the United States.

At the convention of 1872, held in Philadelphia, President Grant again received a unanimous nomination. An effort was made to renominate Vice President Colfax, but Senator Henry Wilson of Massachusetts was declared the nominee.

Cincinnati entertained the convention of 1876. Theodore M. Pomeroy of New York presided temporarily, yielding the gavel to Edward McPherson of Pennsylvania.

On the 18th of June the famous "Pathfinder of the Rockies," John C. Fremont, then of California, was named for vice president on the first ballot.

For vice president William L. Dayton of New Jersey was nominated. Dayton received all but thirty-one votes of the first ballot.

In 1880 the Republican convention first met in Chicago, which has come to be its favorite meeting place. May 18 the body was called to order in a structure known as "the Wigwam."

William H. Seward of New York was the leading candidate prior to the convention and also on the first ballot. His name was placed before the convention by William M. Everts of New York.

Abraham Lincoln in nomination amid tremendous applause and some hisses. Carl Schurz, then of Wisconsin, seconded Seward's nomination.

I desire to second the nomination of the man who can split rails and mail Democrats, Abraham Lincoln." Lincoln passed Seward on the second ballot and was nominated for president on the third ballot, receiving 54 votes to 110 for Seward.

Roscoe Conkling of New York placed Grant in nomination. Conkling was described by one who saw him at this convention as a man who "has the physique of a gladiator and the manner of a man who would enjoy being a king."

Senator Thurston of Nebraska was permanent chairman. For six weeks McKinley's nomination had been a foregone conclusion.
