ALLEY SELLS BOOTH FARM.

Purchasers Will Cut it up and Put it on the Market.

Although these tracts will not be placed on the market before July 1, the purchasers have been advertising them for a week past in the newspapers of the three Washington cities aforementioned. The Booth farm is one of the best tracts of land adapted to fruit and vegetable growing in the west and under the business-like handling of its new owners it is bound to be settled rapidly. The deal does not include any of Mr. Alley's livestock, the disposition of which cannot be learned until Mr. Alley returns from Portland, where he will be detained for several days. It is quite probable, however, that Mr. Alley will locate his stock on some other suitable land near this city. The price at which Mr. Alley sold the farm is not made public.

The purchase of the Booth farm is merely a beginning of the intended operation of Harding & Engen in this county. Mr. Beale states that the firm is negotiating for many other tracts of valuable land near Roseburg and expects that before long they will add several thousand acres to their holdings. lucky's characteristic hospitality, Mayor James F. Grimstead and Governor Augustus E. Willson today gave a hearty greeting to the Sunday school hosts of the world. The exercises marked the formal opening of the twelfth convention of the International Sunday School Association, and the president of the organization, Justice J. J. McLaren, of Toronto, Ont., responded to the welcome of the chief executive of Louisiana and Kentucky.

Never before has such a noteworthy assemblage of religious workers gathered at the metropolis of the Blue Grass State as that which filled the big First Regiment armory this afternoon. Every state and territory in the Union had its representatives in the throng, and not a province of Canada is without its delegation. Mexico and the islands of the West Indies and many far distant lands in Europe and Asia have also sent delegates.

Aside from the welcome exercises, the principal feature of the afternoon's program is a memorial service in honor of Dr. John Potts, of Canada, at which many men of prominence will pay tribute to the services as Chairman of the International Lesson Committee.

Among the important events of the convention will be a great Temperance mass meeting next Sunday, and an address by Dr. Booker T. Washington on "Sunday School Work Among the Negroes."

The last convention was held in Toronto, Ont., in 1895, and it is likely that Los Angeles, Cal., will be selected for the session three years hence, in 1911.
