**NOMINATION OF TAFT.**

Following is the leading editorial in "Friday's" Oregonian, and is given herewith as a republican view of the nomination of Mr. Taft for the presidency:

Mr. Taft is nominated, and his platform is before the country. He is a man of good ability and sound judgment, and if elected the government will be in safe and conservative hands. But we regard his election as very problematical, since the public mind is much agitated and disturbed, and the affairs of today present no great or even distinct principle on which earnest appeal may be made. There is much discontent, no end of loose thought and undefined desire, and many who can't think out anything clearly are ready to give their votes simply for a "change."

In such a situation Mr. Bryan is an ideal candidate. He has a power of making appeal to imaginations that never can be fulfilled; he is sentimental and erratic, and never thinks closely enough on anything to give trouble or fatigue to the minds of his hearers. He is a rapid and pleasing speaker, and impresses all who hear him with a sure belief that he is an amiable, benevolent and honest man. His qualities as an orator make him a campaigner of the first order. As an apostle of discontent he goes far enough to secure the support of the general mass who are dissatisfied with existing conditions, but don't know how to change them, yet not far enough to alarm very much the business and conservative classes, who are not likely now to be so strenuous in their opposition to him as heretofore. Against Taft he will be a more formidable candidate than he was against McKinley, for the ground on which the tremendous argument against him in 1896, and again in 1900, was made is now wanting. The argument for Taft will be of more general character, presenting no central principle on which to fix attention. Taft will be opposed by all who for any reason, or for no rea-

son, by next November, will be shouting, "Give us a change!" The platform is of little importance. The history of parties, and the attitude of parties in relation to current affairs, as conceived in the general mind, is the actual platform, no matter what the convention may say or declare. It must be said that the outcome of the contention over the injunction or court procedure plank is disproportionate to the trouble taken in pressing it upon the convention. The declaration is a reasonable one indeed; but it does not go far enough to meet the wishes of those whom it is designed to satisfy, for it falls far below the Gompers demand. It will not bring organized labor to the support of Mr. Taft; for the larger portion of it was sure to be against him, in any event. Mr. Bryan is and always has been its special attraction.

Of the platform it must be said, however, that it is a comprehensive document, smoothly and gracefully written; it is long—three columns ago; and it touches nearly all matters of current political interest. But platforms, in ordinary times, like those, are little read. People move with the current of events, and will make up their minds by November what Taft stands for on one side and Bryan on the other.

part in a concerted plan to save the lives of the thousands of infants and children who would otherwise certainly perish during the summer. In past years, this relief work has been carried on in a desultory and unorganized manner, with the result that the slaughter of the innocents had been appalling. For the first time in any American city a systematized effort is to be made to save the little ones.

To put this plan into execution, the city has been divided into districts, with fifty agencies prepared to give instructions to mothers in the care of their children, or to nurse and care for the little ones when the mothers find it impossible to do so in a proper manner.

It is the first time any American city has undertaken to care for 100 per cent of the babies needing care. Plans are being made to learn what is being done in every part of the city. The health board has appealed to private agencies to unite in aiding the work and to keep the city officials posted where private aid is not sufficient. Dispensaries, physicians, hospitals, dry nurseries and individuals have agreed to unite in giving instructions to mothers during the hot weather.

Physicians interested in the work declare that it will be absolutely necessary to save the lives of many women and children, that they be sent out of the city during the hottest part of the summer, and the Seaside Reef, for which today's benefit is given, will accommodate a large number of these.

**WOMEN TO STRIKE.**

LONDON, June 20.—"The Strike of a Sex," described in Miller's novel, will become a partial reality tomorrow, when thousands of women in all parts of England will desert home and husband and children, in order to attend a monster mass meeting in Hyde park. It is declared that nearly 300,000 women will take part in the strike, which is scheduled to last two weeks. Leaders in the movement have urged the strikers, when they "walk out" tomorrow, to solemnly resolve not to perform a single household duty for fourteen days. By that time, it is hoped, the men of England will be starved into submission, and will be ready and willing to accede to the demands of the women for the ballot.

The suffragettes from the provinces will be met at the railroad stations by delegations from the London organizations, and seven processions, each headed by a military band, will march on the park from different points of the compass.

Twenty speakers, all women, will harangue the assembled masses until a given time buglers will announce that the resolution to parliament demanding the vote is about to be put.

An ancient law prohibits demonstrations from approaching within a mile of the house of commons. The police will have a strong force on hand to prevent the house from being besieged.
