TAFT LEAVES CABINET.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—By the terms of his resignation, presented to President Roosevelt on June 18, William H. Taft today retires from the cabinet and is succeeded, as secretary of war, by Luke E. Wright, of Tennessee. Mr. Taft will immediately begin the organization of his campaign forces, and will meet here tomorrow with the sub-committee of the Republican national committee to decide upon a chairman.

Luke Wright, the new secretary of war, is a Confederate veteran and a Democrat in his political views. His selection is looked upon as a clever piece of diplomacy which may result in gaining many Taft votes in the south.

Leaving the service of the wrecked Confederacy at 21, Wright secured a legal education and began the practice of law in Memphis. In 1879 he was elected to his first important political office, that of attorney general for Shelby county, in which Memphis is located.

Since then his career has been such as to admirably fit him for the high office to which he has been elected by President Roosevelt. As a member of the Philippine Commission, later vice-governor and then governor of Uncle Sam's islands in the Far East, and afterward ambassador to Japan, he made a record for fidelity and ability that gave him an international reputation.

Few men are more popular in the army than Luke Wright, and, despite the fact that he was a Confederate, his appointment has been universally commended by the leaders of the Grand Army of the Republic and by Union veterans generally.

WAR OF ANARCHIST PAPERS.

Postmaster General Begins Crusade to Chase Mails.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—A crusade which will probably result in the suppression of all anarchist papers and periodicals, with the exception of those devoted to purely philosophical anarchism, will be commenced tomorrow by Postmaster General Meyer. A thorough investigation of all papers suspected of violent tendencies will be made by postal officials and it is possible that a few scurrilous sheets may fall under the ban of official displeasure.

Following his order denying the use of the mails to a Patterson anarchist paper, Mr. Meyer instructed the Third Assistant Postmaster General to formulate an order providing that papers of an anarchistic or socialist character, printed in a foreign language, would be required to print with it an American translation of any matter that was incendiary or advocated anarchy. An examination of the law, however, disclosed that such an order could not be based on it, and accordingly Mr. Meyer suggested to the post office commissioners of Congress an amendment to section 3823 of the Revised Statutes, which prohibits the carrying in the mails of indecent matter. The amendment which was inserted and upon which will be based the forthcoming order of the postmaster-general is as follows:

"And the term 'indecent' within the intent of this section shall include matter of a character inciting to the crime of murder and assassination."

This amendment will become active tomorrow, and at that time it is the intention of the postmaster-general to detail law officers of the department to examine carefully a score or more of papers, some of which are printed in the English language, to see if they are violating the new order.

MUST MARK SHIPMENTS.

Hieroglyphics on Freight Consignments Discontinued.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 30.—All railroads east of the Mississippi, in the territory covered by the "official classification" will after today refuse to accept for transportation all shipments in less than carload lots which are not plainly marked with the name of the consignee and the station, city and state of destination.

For many years it has been customary for a large number of shippers to mark their packages with an initial or some hieroglyphic, the key to which would be on the bill of lading. It was the theory that this saved time and also prevented competitors from observing the names of a shipper's customers on the outside of packages.

Railroad officials claim that great abuses have resulted from this practice. When a large number of packages are intended for the same consignee shippers often mark only one or two, the others having no marks at all. If the shipments become mixed with others at transfer points there is no way of identifying them.

Figures prepared by the Trunk Line association for 17 principal lines in the official classification territory show that the total freight earnings for these companies in 1907 were \$641,725,712, an increase over 1906 of 19.2 per cent. Nevertheless the total payment for loss and damage by these lines in 1907 was \$5,596,794, fully 1 per cent of the total freight earnings and an increase over 1906 of 22.4 per cent.

It is estimated that about 45 per cent of loss and damage claims are due to losses in transit, which means that in 1907 the losses on this score of the lines mentioned were about \$2,500,000. Of this amount, probably over \$1,250,000 was caused by the improper marking of the less-than-carload shipments. It is the design of the railroads now to stop losses from this cause.

DR. ROLLER VS. GOTCH.

Wrestling Championship Will be Decided Wednesday.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 30.—Seattle sports are agog with excitement on the eve of the wrestling match for the championship of the world, between Frank Gotch, the Iowa farmer who now holds the title, and Dr. B. F. Roller, of this city. While Gotch is naturally a favorite, there are many who believe that Roller has a good chance to win the belt and a few are backing this opinion with real money. Gotch himself admits that he has tackled a hard proposition in the Seattle man and will have to do some of his niftiest work to win.

Roller is 31 years of age and as fine a specimen of physical manhood as could be found anywhere. He is six feet in height, weighs 195 pounds, has a reach of seventy-six inches and a chest measurement of forty-seven inches.

In Seattle, Dr. Roller has participated in many wrestling matches and has always come out a winner. His first professional match was with Jack Carkeek, then champion heavyweight of England, Canada and Australia, and who was for several years champion of the world. He brought Carkeek to the mat twice in 10 minutes.

Gotch then challenged Roller and undertook to throw him twice in an hour for \$1000. The match was made for \$500, the winner to take 75 per cent of the gate receipts. Gotch failed to throw him and never even got him to a bridge.

His next match was with Emil Klank, the bout lasted but 20 minutes, two falls in favor of Roller being recorded in that time.

Victor McLagan, of South Africa, was Roller's next opponent. He was the most powerfully built man Roller had ever met. Again Roller won in less than 40 minutes. Farmer Burns then threw down the gauntlet, and the Seattle man had two falls.

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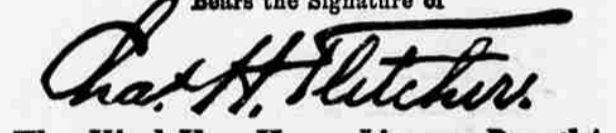
