ONE NORMAL LESS

Adverse Recommendation Hits School at Drain

ACT OF BOARD OF REGENTS

Agree to Supervise but Refuse Cash Aid—Fight May Erupt in the Legislature

SALEM, Or., July 1.—The board of regents of Oregon normal schools has voted to recommend to the legislature that Drain Normal School be abandoned and that appropriations be made for Monmouth, Ashland and Weston only.

The Drain school may decide not to reopen next fall. There is a possibility that the people of Drain will continue to maintain the school.

The board agreed to give the Drain school district free use of the normal building for a public school.

Superintendent Ackerman argued that the state is naturally divided into three parts, Eastern, Western and Southern Oregon.

Presidents Ressler and French were re-elected at Monmouth and Weston, respectively, and Henry M. Schaefer, formerly president of Washington State Normal, was elected president at Ashland.

It was ordered that the entrance requirement be advanced one year, making the normal course a five-year course as compared with what it has been in the past.

The board will recommend to the next legislature that all state educational institutions be placed under a board of regents consisting of five members to be appointed by the governor and to include the superintendent of public instruction.

The proposed measure will abolish the board of regents for the normal schools, University of Oregon and the Agricultural college.

Indignation at Drain. DRAIN, Or., July 1.—Great indignation exists here over the recommendation by the State Board of Normal Regents that the Drain Normal school be lopped off, while Weston, Ashland and Monmouth be allowed to remain.

FOR GOOD STATE SCHOOLS.

To the discredit of themselves and to our state, the board of State Normal School regents have voted to abolish the Normal School at Drain.

Since the institution at Drain was established as a State Normal school over 250 graduates have been turned out there, and nearly all of the time the school has been without state aid.

With but two Normal schools, as some of the board wants, the annual expense to the state will not be less than \$50,000, while for three schools it will perhaps be a little more.

Wolverton Leaves Booth Case to Jury to Decide

MORE ROSEBURGERS TESTIFY

Defense Submitting its Case Without Introduction of Evidence—To Jury Tomorrow

PORTLAND, Or., July 2.—Convinced that the evidence submitted by the government cannot convict their client, the attorneys for J. H. Booth today introduced no testimony for the defense.

Wednesday's Proceedings. Portland Oregonian, July 2: United States Judge Wolverton yesterday denied the motion of the defense for an instructed verdict of acquittal in the James Henry Booth bribery trial.

Judge Wolverton ruled that the agreement alleged by Bridges to have been made among the three was relevant and should go to the jury as corroborating and leading up to the subsequent agreement alleged to have been formed between Kribs and Booth.
