TREASURY DEFICIT LARGE.

Adverse Balance the Largest Uncle Sam has Had in Many Years.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The forthcoming reports of the Treasury receipts and expenditures for the year ending June 30, 1908, will show a marked increase in the expenditures. The excess of expenditures over receipts for the year will approximate about \$60,000,000, which has been exceeded only twice since the Civil War. In 1894 there was a deficit and in 1899, there was another of a little over \$89,000,000, and in each of the four intervening years the receipts fell considerably below the disbursements. Again in 1904 and 1905 there were shortages of \$4,177,000 and \$23,000,000 respectively.

The total receipts this year will show to have been about \$599,000,000 or \$54,000,000 less than for the fiscal year 1907. Customs receipts will be shown to have fallen off about \$46,000,000 from those of 1907, while receipts from internal revenue sources will be short nearly \$19,000,000.

Miscellaneous receipts will show a slight gain. The disbursements for the year will be shown to have aggregated about \$659,000,000, or \$80,000,000 more than for any year since 1865, not excepting the Spanish War period. Although these increased disbursements are very general and are shown in nearly every account except that of interest on the public debt, some of the heaviest of them were for permanent improvements.

The Panama Canal during the closing year will have cost the government \$38,000,000, as against \$27,000,000 for 1907, and the work this year in connection with the reclamation of the public lands will be shown to have cost about \$13,000,000, which is not far from last year's figures.

The deficiency in the postal revenues for the present year will probably reach \$13,500,000, as against \$7,500,000 for 1907, making a difference of \$6,000,000. This is the largest postal deficit in the history of the government, except in 1905 when it reached nearly \$16,000,000. The records show that there has been a postal deficiency every year since the establishment of the service, with the exception of 12 when small surpluses were shown. The expenses of the rural free delivery this year are not expected to fall below \$25,000,000.

GOTCH DEFEATS ROLLER.

Champion Thorough Saddle Horse Wins in Less Time as Honor.

SEATTLE, July 1.—Frank Gotch, of Humboldt, Iowa, maintained his right to the world's catch-as-catch-can wrestling championship tonight when he out-classed Dr. B. F. Roller, of Seattle, winning two consecutive falls in 15 minutes and 25 seconds, and 25 minutes and 54 seconds, respectively.

The men entered the ring weighing close to 200 pounds each. Roller may have been a pound or two the heavier.

They went at it like bulls from the very start and Gotch was soon forcing matters. He worked his notorious toe hold six times in succession in the first bout. Roller broke away each time, but it wore on him and finally Gotch downed him with a crotch and half Nelson.

Roller did better work in the second bout, but Gotch was like a terrier after a rat, and went from hold to hold with startling rapidity. Roller's best work in this round was to break a half Nelson and a crotch, after being seemingly lost. He was finally picked up and dumped to his shoulders from the same hold. It is doubtful if he was really downed, but it was only a question of minutes anyway, as he was at Gotch's mercy.

Owing to the high prices, the crowd was not more than 2000.

TERRIBLE FAMINE IN INDIA.

10,000,000 People Face Charity or Slow Starvation

CALCUTTA, July 2.—Despite the declaration of the British officials that they have the situation under control and that sufficient relief supplies have been provided to prevent any desperate suffering, reports from the interior state that the famine conditions are daily growing worse. Over a million natives are declared to be on the verge of starvation, thousands are said to have succumbed within the last few weeks and gloomy prophecies are made that no less than ten millions will be forced to subsist on charity or die miserably during the summer and autumn. While all of these statements cannot be verified, owing to the secrecy of the government, which fears a widespread insurrectionary movement, there is little doubt that India is facing a grave crisis.

The recurrence of these terrible famines is due to several causes, mostly attributable to the influence of the British government. Four-fifths of the population are now entirely dependent on capricious crops for their sustenance, and although great irrigation works have been carried out, the state of agriculture is still very unstable. Each peasant cultivates a little patch of land, which supplies the bare living of himself and his family. When the crop fails they are faced with starvation. The British regime provides regular employment for only a fraction of the natives, while it has killed a great deal of the native industry, and has imposed other conditions against the prosperity of the natives. The taxes are high, and the economic system imposed by British rule is unadapted to the conditions of native life.

Besides the millions of peasants who are liable to starvation at the slightest failure of the crops, there is an enormous population of beggars and workless people whose condition is entirely hopeless during the famine. Many thousands of these are doomed to a lingering death from inanition.

The condition of the poor creatures affected by the famine is pitiful beyond words. Those who are forced to apply for government relief have been already living for months on half or a quarter of their usual allowances of food. Long experience has shown that living on next to nothing. Many families have been living on a daily handful of dried peas, occasionally varied by wild fruit and roots, or even less palatable food.

The famine being spread over a vast territory, thousands of the natives are miles from a government relief depot, and many of them die because they cannot drag their weak bodies to the depots. For every thousand persons who get relief, there must be as many who are left to starve, or perhaps too proud, to apply for it.
