TABRIZ POPULACE BUTCHERED BY SOLDIERS

Shah's Troops Slay 2,000 After Taking the City

BODIES BLOCK THE STREETS

Fireworks Commence Death Harvest—Columbia River Gives up a Murdered Man

Special to the Evening Review. ST. PETERSBURG, July 3.—Advices from Teheran, Persia, say that the Shah's troops, after a bloody battle, drove the revolutionists out of Tabriz and are now sacking the city. Drunken soldiers are killing men, women and children indiscriminately and running about the city carrying pikes bearing human heads. Huge piles of bodies block the streets, and from beneath them run large pools of blood.

It is estimated that 2000 people have been butchered since the troops entered the city. England is threatening to intervene.

Fireworks Begin Harvest. CLEVELAND, O., July 3.—Five women and one boy were burned to death today in a wild panic precipitated by fire following the explosion of fireworks in Kreges' novelty store. Twenty girls employed on the upper floor of the store were forced to jump to the pavement below in order to save their lives and several of them were fatally injured.

At the time of the explosion the store was crowded with shoppers and in the panic that followed upwards of 100 of them were hurt, some seriously.

Evidence of Murder. HOOD RIVER, Or., July 3.—A body, believed to be that of a man named Edwards, of Richland, Union county, was found at the bottom of the Columbia river, near Wyeth, today, with the hands and feet tied together and weighted down with stones. The authorities are investigating.

Los Angeles Shakes. LOS ANGELES, Calif., July 3.—Earthquake shocks awakened Los Angeles and Pasadena at 5 o'clock this morning, knocking down pictures and dishes.

The Eugene postoffice gained in its receipts during the quarter ending June 30, 1908, \$1735.57 over the corresponding quarter in 1907, from the reports of Postmaster Page. The total receipts for the quarter this year were \$6644.85, while those in 1907 were \$4809.28. This is a gain of 35 per cent on the 1907 total. The receipts were mostly from the sale of stamps, there being but slightly over \$300 from other sources. Something like \$3000 was transferred from the postal department to the money order department showing the profit approximately of the postoffice here to the government.
