SANE CELEBRATION

Fourth in Roseburg Passes Off Without Incident

BIG CROWD ENTERTAINED

Canyonville, Myrtle Creek and Glendale Also Observe Nation's Birth In Good Style

Special to Evening Review. NEW YORK, July 6.—Returns from all over the country show that this year's 4th of July celebration cost 72 lives. The number of seriously injured is placed at 2736. The death record is the greatest since 1899 and exceeds last year's total by thirteen.

Roseburg's 4th of July passed off without adding to the large list of deaths or seriously injured which the nation at large sustains on that day. This gratifying showing was made without the sacrifice of a good time, either at the fair grounds, where a patriotic and sporting program entertained an immense crowd, or in the city proper where fireworks were discharged from early morning until late at night.

The people of Myrtle Creek and Glendale practically celebrated together in the former town. The Glendale Band furnished music for the affair and the feature of the sporting portion of the day's program was a baseball game between teams of the two towns.

FOREST FIRE PROTECTION.

Douglas, Coos, Curry and Josephine Counties Better Patrolled. GRANTS PASS, Ore., July 5.—To guard against forest fires in the big fir and pine reserves of southern Oregon, the national forest service, through its southern Oregon division, is taking extra precautions and placing larger crews in the woods.

Supervisor M. J. Anderson has established camps of rangers in every district of the reserves of Douglas, Coos, Curry and Josephine counties. More men are on guard this year than ever before, and it is believed that the breaking out of fires can be prevented.

Once started it is impossible to stop the forest fires, and the men employed by the service will arrest every spark of the forest service fires. Only one fire has occurred thus far this season, and this was a comparatively small blaze in the fir timber near West Fork, southern Douglas county. Rangers put it out before it spread.

At Canyonville. Among the other towns throughout the county that held celebrations was Canyonville, which engaged for the occasion a band from this city, headed by Prof. F. H. Appelfhoff. Hon. Wm. M. Colvig, of Grants Pass, delivered the oration during the morning's program, which also included a prayer by Rev. F. H. Reeves, reading of the Declaration of Independence by Miss Grace Boyle and inspiring selections by the band, all of which was preceded by a parade.

BOOTH ACQUITTED

Evidence of Bridges and Kribs Discredited by Jury

NO TESTIMONY BY DEFENSE

Result Gratifying Here—Case of R. A. Booth et al, is Set for Trial July 16th

Portland Oregonian, July 5: By a verdict reported in the United States court yesterday, James Henry Booth, ex-Receiver of the Roseburg land office, was acquitted of the charge of accepting unlawful compensation while serving as an official of the government. Booth was indicted for furnishing information to Frederick A. Kribs, a timber land speculator of Portland, regarding the final cancellation of lieu land selections, and for which it was alleged he received \$800 on October 3, 1903.

CONVENTION TUESDAY

OREGON NEWS.

Mormons are going to erect a \$1,000,000 temple at La Grande. After plotting a loaded revolver at her two sisters and a young man in turn, Stella McCoy, aged 15 years, a Grande Ronde Indian girl, turned the weapon toward herself and tried to take the cartridges out. She was struck in the right eye. The bullet went through to the brain and the Indian maid died almost instantly.

CHICAGO IN AGONY

CHICAGO, July 6.—Seven sudden deaths and five suicides in Chicago today are attributed to the heat, which at noon registered 90 degrees in the shade. Of six of the deaths, three were accidental, two were due to asphyxiation and one a murder by a heat-crazed person.

CIRCUIT COURT IN SESSION.

With Judge J. W. Hamilton presiding, circuit court is in adjourned session in Roseburg today for the consideration of two civil cases. One is J. Harding, a Glendale merchant, vs. the Oregon-Idaho Co., and the other is C. B. Patrick against Edmund McGee.

Harding is suing for the sum of about \$2000, of which sum \$600 is alleged to be due for provisions sold by him to the Oregon-Idaho Co. through its president, L. R. Ferbrache. The remainder is asked on bills for provisions sold to several parties in the employ of the defendant company, and for which Ferbrache is alleged to have assumed payment, holding the necessary amounts out of the men's wages.

The Patrick-McGee case involves the uneven termination of lower Oak street, in Roseburg. The last two blocks of the street swerves 11 feet to the south out of a straight line. McGee owns property on both sides and Patrick has property adjoining one of the tracts. It is the purpose of Patrick's suit to force McGee to adjust his property lines in order to straighten the street and at the same time give him 11 feet more of ground. This matter has been a thorn in the side of city councils for years past, but no steps were taken to straighten the street for fear of litigation. Now that it has reached the courts a decision will be awaited with interest.
