APPLICANTS HIRE L.A.WYER.

To Appeal From Rejections at Roseburg Land Office.

MEDFORD, Or., July 5.—Attorney F. J. Newman has been engaged to prosecute several appeals by parties who tendered their applications to file on Feb. 8, 1908, at Roseburg, Or., at the opening of fractional township 41 S., range 1 E., and who had their applications rejected on a technical point.

The land was re-advertised for opening April 30, 1908, at which latter opening several other parties applied to enter portions of land now involved in Attorney Newman's appeal.

At the opening of Township 34 S., range 5 W., April last, at Roseburg, a great many applications arose, and it appears that a considerable portion of that land was claimed under the mining laws, also on a great deal of the land squatters had placed their improvements, in some cases as many as three on one quarter-section, and that still other claimants and applicants placed script and timber and stone applications covering practically all the land claimed by homesteaders and miners. Attorney Newman has been employed by several of the last named applicants to look after their interests, and is now in possession of a large number of photographic views showing the vast timber resources, also the topography of the country, the improvements of the squatters and mining camps on the land claimed by the clients of Mr. Newman, which photographs were taken under his especial supervision, he having spent several days in company with a photographer and cruiser.

Mr. Newman is also defending A. L. Cusick, who has been arrested on the charge of perjury in connection with some of the above described land. Mr. Newman stated to a representative of the Medford Mail that in his opinion there is no case against Cusick.
