GIVES \$1,500,000 MILE.

Abe Ruef Released From Jail, Where He Spent 7 Months.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—Abraham Ruef was released from the county jail tonight on bonds aggregating \$1,500,000, the largest amount ever given in a criminal case in this state. This sum is the aggregate bail upon 78 indictments, returned by the Oliver grand jury, charging Ruef with bribing the former board of supervisors in connection with the granting of franchises to public service corporations and upon which he was taken in custody by the prosecution as a sort of "prisoner of state," in charge of an escort appointed by Judge Frank H. Deane and a half a dozen private guards at an expense of about \$1000 a month.

In Jail 7 Months.

Since January 16, when the new administration went into office, Ruef has been languishing in the county jail.

Twenty sureties, including Ruef's father and sister, and himself, signed the bonds. It developed today during the examination of his sureties before Superior Judge Frank J. Murasky, that Ruef owned real estate in this city which he recently transferred to his father and sister, upon which a real estate expert, on the witness stand, placed a value of \$1,095,566.

Ruef's annual income from this property was \$76,900. His father and sister went his bonds to the amount of \$699,000, while other sureties qualified for \$870,000.

Ruef's next trial has been set for July 15 on one of the indictments charging him with bribery in connection with the granting of a trolley franchise to the United Rail roads. Although he has been in custody for 15 months, he has been tried but once, the jury disagreeing after being out 44 hours.

LATE TRAIN SAVES TREASURE.

California Stage Robbers Got But Little Booty.

YREKA, Cal., July 6.—The Scott Valley stage, running between Yreka and Etna was robbed this afternoon on Forest House mountains at Robber's Rock, by one white man and a quarter breed Indian. The Indian covered the passengers from behind a rock, the other man, who wore a mask and gaiters on his feet, took watches and money amounting to \$389. The Wells-Fargo box was smashed with an ax, but the amount taken is unknown.

Sheriff Howard and Deputy Sheriff Geary are on the road, and two other parties are out. Escape is impossible.

A big shipment of treasure was to have been made on the Etna stage today by the Wells-Fargo company, but the train was late and missed connections with the stage. It is supposed the robbers knew of this shipment and held up the stage to secure it.

TWENTY ACRES WILL GIVE A \$7,000 PROFIT.

This Will be the Yield From One Oregon Fruit Ranch.

W. C. Harding, has returned from Roseburg, Or., where he has been operating a few days looking after his property there, says the Aberdeen, Wash. World.

Mr. Harding is enthusiastic over prospects in southern Oregon, and over the outlook for diversified fruit raising. He brought with him a box of 500 cherries from the ranch of Geo. B. Hayes, near Roseburg. These cherries are of the Royal Ann and Hyac varieties and hang on the branches in such thick clusters as hardly to leave room for another one. The striking difference in their color makes them a pleasing contrast to each other.

Mr. Hayes has a 20-acre farm set to fruit, and also has a number of English walnut trees. He has 2400 trees of all varieties, and will net \$7,000 from his place this year. He is very proud of his ranch, although he has lived there only since last December, having come from Kansas.

There is a flourishing fruit association of 63 members in Roseburg, which is proving of great assistance in marketing the products of the orchards.

This section has long been famed as an agricultural country, but it is only recently that its capabilities for fruit as a money-making proposition have been demonstrated. Mr. Harding will soon open an office in Portland, and will care for the business pertaining to his Roseburg property from that city.
