MAKES BIG GROWTH

P. O. Receipts Increase 27 Per Cent in Two Years

ROSEBURG'S FINE SHOWING

Will Grow Still Faster as Soon as Street Paving is Commenced—Free Delivery

That Roseburg and Douglas county are growing faster than ever is again demonstrated in an unmistakable manner. That is to say, the evidence which we herewith present is from official sources and cannot be questioned. This is from the records of Postmaster C. W. Parks, of this city, and shows the totals of the gross receipts of the Roseburg post office for each quarter for the past three years. Here is the official statement for each three months ending as follows:

To Sept. 30, 1905 \$2,074.28
To Dec. 31, 1905 2,762.41
To March 31, 1906 2,807.98

This shows an increase for the fiscal year 1907-08 of 9.4 per cent over the previous year, and from that figure the increase for the year 1907-08 is 13.3 per cent. In other words, the total for the year ending June 30, 1908, shows an increase of more than 27 per cent over the year ending June 30, 1906. This will doubtless astonish those who have not observed how fast our town and county is growing, but these are facts that cannot be denied.

We have been in the free delivery class for two years, but that service has not yet been established and it will not be until the streets are properly marked with their names at the crossings, and the houses properly numbered. Let's get busy before our growth gets too far ahead to be overtaken, as we are now only getting fairly started in the march of progress. With the advent of street paving, which should begin at the earliest possible moment, our splendid record of growth in the past two years will be completely overshadowed, for we then will very soon have a modern city in all particulars.

HERMANN TRIAL IN OCTOBER.

PORTLAND, Or., July 7.—Dingler Hermann, ex-Congressman and ex-Commissioner of the general land office, will be tried in Portland in October. Hermann will be prosecuted by Francis Joseph Heney in person.

Hermann will have two lawyers to defend him, former United States Senator John M. Gearin being one and a Washington attorney being the other. Heney will leave California temporarily and come to Portland to conduct the prosecution himself. T. C. Becker, special assistant to the attorney-general, may be associated with Heney in the Hermann trial, as the United States District Attorney John McCourt and Mr. Neuhausen. Dingler Hermann was indicted with a number of other prominent politicians, all of whom have been tried with the exception of Hermann. He asked for and received a separation and this has been dragging on now for years. Heney is taking a particular interest in the Hermann case as this and the case of ex-Congressman J. N. Williamson are the only two of the remaining land fraud cases which have not been turned over by Heney to Becker for prosecution.

EACH BAGS HIS MAN.

Sheriff Fenton and Marshal Norman Do Prompt Work.

Two men travelling in opposite directions and in no way connected with each other were arrested in Roseburg yesterday, pursuant to instructions wired from other cities. One is R. A. Johnson, a young musician, and the other S. Shoman, a transient junk buyer. Coincidentally, both are wanted on the same charge—that of obtaining money under false pretenses. Sheriff Fenton landed Johnson—his first arrest since assuming office three days ago—and Marshal Norman apprehended Shoman.

From Chico, Calif., came the request for Johnson's arrest, coupled with the information that he was a passenger on last night's northbound overland train, due at 11:29 o'clock. Sheriff Fenton did not get the telegram until a few minutes before the arrival of the train, when he had retired for the night. With the rapidity of a metropolitan fireman answering an alarm, the sheriff hustled into his clothes, however, and down to the depot in time to meet the incoming train and arrest his man, who submitted quietly.

Eugene authorities asked for Shoman's arrest. Shoman travels from place to place in a wagon, and was on his way south when arrested. Marshal Norman found him and his outfit near the river bank last evening.

Both Johnson and Shoman are detained here, awaiting arrival of officers from the cities whence came the requisitions for them.

TRIPLETS FROM A COW.

What is perhaps the first case of its kind ever known in Douglas county, is the birth of three calves—two helpers and a bull—at one time to a cow owned by Mrs. Susan Jones, at Galesville, this week. The calves were born separately and they are reported to be in a healthy condition.

OREGON ANARCHIST FINED.

TILLAMOOK, Or., July 8.—William Wolf, the anarchist, who flaunted a red flag above the stars and stripes over his business house here July 4, was tried today on a charge of desecration of the flag, found guilty and fined \$50, which he paid.

Wolf's trial was held before a jury, and the verdict was reached almost immediately.

W. J. BRYAN TO BE NAMED THIS EVENING

Platform Will be Agreed on at Same Time

CHEER CLEVELAND'S NAME

Lincoln, Nebraska, Preparing to Make Demonstration When Her Idol is Nominated

Special to the Evening Review.

DENVER, Colo., July 9.—The national Democratic convention opened its session this morning with a prayer by Rabbi Koch, of Seattle. Chairman Clayton was escorted to the platform, where he kissed three little girls who presented him with flowers. During his speech, Clayton mentioned Cleveland's name in eulogistic language and tremendous applause followed. When the speaker concluded, the band struck up "Dixie," while the delegates stood. Marching clubs then entered the auditorium and for an hour all business ceased in deference to demonstrations.

Ollie James, of Kentucky, one of the leaders of the Bryan faction, announced that the platform would be adopted and Bryan nominated this evening. The convention then adjourned until 7 o'clock.

Lincoln Preparing.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 9.—Lincoln is preparing to hold a big demonstration as soon as Bryan is nominated.

THE BRYAN PERSONALITY.

Portland Telegram (Rep.): It is announced that Mr. Bryan will be nominated by acclamation at Denver, and there really seems to be no doubt about it. It might have been said when Mr. Bryan returned from his world-enriching trip, and before he made that famous Madison Square Garden speech, that were it then convention time, there would have been nothing to it but the formality of naming the Nebraska; accepting what he advanced as campaign gospel, and after the incidental shouting and other manifestations of enthusiasm, adjourn, and go home. Subsequent to that New York speech, however, there developed what appeared to be a considerable change in sentiment. The national ownership of railroads idea, as put forward in the New York address was seized upon by the anti-Bryan forces and for some weeks—perhaps we should say months—there was great activity to get some other available Democrat into line against the time when the national convention should actually be held. Mr. Bryan backed a little on the railroad question—that is to say, he explained that his views on that subject, as expressed at Madison Square Garden were academic and tentative, and were not intended to be of practical political use. Nevertheless, it was considered that Mr. Bryan had made a serious mistake; and the best was made of it to accomplish his defeat.

But with all that, and with reactionary forces doing their best to discredit the Bryan leadership, the eminent Nebraskan keeps on the even tenor of his way, making addresses here and there, holding political council at this point, that or the other; saying little that is directly antagonistic to those who assail him, and who regard his possible or probable success with such bitterness. All sorts of combinations are sought in the hope that at least Mr. Bryan might not have the requisite two-thirds vote at a candidate and many who are not available, came in for mention and for more or less reactionary boasting. Mr. Bryan's former unsuccessful campaign have been thrust forward as the most telling anti-Bryan capital; and there has been much in the nature of stout boasting that when the time came to nominate a Democratic standard-bearer, it would be found that Mr. Bryan and his friends would not be the whole show. But Mr. Bryan is the whole show, and his friends comprise an overwhelming majority of those in the convention, plus the Democracy which those delegates represent. There's a fact, whatever we may think of Mr. Bryan or however we may agree or disagree with him upon matters of political import, and the fact is, wonderful one

It rests entirely upon the personality of one man—a most phenomenal man. This aspect of the Bryan character and personality does not carry with it either endorsement or condemnation of his political views. It is a fact in psychology rather than politics. Here is a private citizen sprung directly from the ranks of the people; brought into the limelight by a happy rhetorical turn, apt to the situation in which it was used; developing, and holding political leadership, first, as an idol, and later in the face of most bitter opposition; leading his party twice to defeat and never to victory; yet, he becomes the most famous private citizen in all the world, honored by the great of all nations, as representing the highest type of American. Where, but a few years ago, nearly every leader in his party disdained him; now, without the power of patronage to control, without outward manifestation of vigorous fighting by sheer force of his personality, Mr. Bryan calmly brushes aside all opposition; and is about to receive the nomination of his party—not as a grudging gift, but as an honor which the party is almost unanimously willing to confer. It is a situation that has few, if any, parallels in all political history.

HAVE SPENT \$102 TO DATE.

Roseburg's Lady Boosters Have Been Very Active.

The refusal of the city council at regular meeting last Monday night to pay one-half of the \$52 worth of tramcar's bills contracted by the lady "boosters" on clean-up day in June, has been met by the ladies in a dignified manner. They have rejected the insignificant sum of \$12 voted by the council toward meeting the bill and have decided to stand the entire amount themselves. This action was determined upon at a meeting held by the ladies last evening. The meeting was also the occasion for a general auditing of bills to date, the total being \$102.75, showing that the ladies' club has been very active in civic improvement work since the comparatively brief space of its existence. GARFIELD PASSES THROUGH.

Exterior Secretary Passed With Ease and Pleasure.

Mrs. James B. Garfield, secretary of the Interior, passed through Roseburg last night on his way to Portland. He has just returned from a trip to Hawaiian Islands. Mr. Garfield was in bed at the late hour at which the train passed through this city, but he did not go by unnoticed. "Booster" Zurcher left a box of the finest Royal Anne cherries, two beautiful bouquets of sweet peas and carnations and some descriptive literature in the Secretary's private car, together with a card bearing the inscription: "Compliments of the Roseburg Commercial Club."

Mr. Garfield, after spending several days in Portland, will go to Herndon to inspect the Umatilla irrigation project. He will probably also look over other districts in eastern Oregon where the government is contemplating expending millions of dollars for water improvements.

There is a possibility that Mr. Garfield, who has been a member of President Roosevelt's cabinet since March, last year, will stop in southern Oregon several days to go over the Klamath irrigation task which has been undertaken by the government and which comes under the direction of the secretary of the Interior.

This is certainly remarkable, after 12 years of service in that capacity, his first two terms having been of two years each, and other two, just closed, being four years each. The term he is now entering upon is for four years, rounding out a period of 16 years in the capacity of public prosecutor. Many interesting and a number of them thrilling—reminiscences might be related in connection with Mr. Brown's official labors during the past 12 years. Some of the most desperate criminals in the state have come before him for prosecution. Of these, some have expiated their crimes on the gallows and others are serving long terms in the state's prison. Be it said to Mr. Brown's credit that long since the criminal element learned to fear him and the law-abiding citizens to trust him. The dread of the former, as well as the confidence of the latter, continues unabated, and this will doubtless prevail during the coming four years.

STARVED AND THEN SLAIN BY SHAH'S SOLDIERS

Hundreds Die in Tabriz for Crossing Bread Line

MASSACRE WORST ONE YET

One Thousand Lives Lost in a Flood—Woman Explorer Falls 1,000 Feet Over Precipice

ODESSA, July 9.—Several hundred more people were massacred today in the captured city of Tabriz by the troops. Starving inhabitants started for the bread line and were slain right and left. The scenes of slaughter were worse than when the city was captured several days ago.

1,000 Die in Flood.

CANSTANTINOPLE, July 9.—One thousand persons were drowned today by a flood which wiped out the town of Tekal, on the Irnak river in Asia Minor.

Falls 1000 Feet.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., July 9.—While exploring with a party of friends a few days ago, Miss Helen Latch, of Lethbridge, Alberta, fell 1000 feet over a precipice on Mt. Evelyn, Canada. Her mangled remains have been recovered in the canyon below. The occurrence was due to a snow-slide.
