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SLATED FOR REMOVAL

Neuhausen Said to Have Failed to Make Good in Land Cases.

WASHINGTON, July 11.—T. B. Neuhausen, until lately an inspector of the Interior Department, and recently made Special agent and attorney of the general land office, is soon to be dropped from the government service, according to information obtained here today. It is also learned that Neuhausen's recent appointment is only temporary, and that his commission will expire October 1, when, in all probability, he will quit the service.

Neuhausen is to be let out, it is said, because his work has been unsatisfactory to officials of the Interior department and general land office. It is maintained that he has not "made good." Moreover, while assisting in the prosecution of land fraud cases, it is alleged that Neuhausen has continually blocked the regular work of the inspectors and special agents in Oregon, has disregarded instruction from Washington and is believed to have inspired criticisms and attacks upon Secretary Garfield, Commissioner Bennett and ex-Commissioner Ballinger.

If the land-fraud trials drag along through August, and it is imperative that Neuhausen be retained to assist Prosecutor Becker, it is possible that upon appeal from the department of justice, he may have another temporary appointment of three months, but it is the present plan to let him go October 1. Before that date he will be expected to clear up all his regular work which has not already been turned over to Mr. Clavis.

CLEVELAND'S ESTATE.

PRINCETON, N. J., July 11.—Grover Cleveland's will, filed here, is one of the briefest ever made by a prominent man. It provides for burial whenever he should die and the erection of a "moderately expensive" monument. The body may be removed only to be placed beside that of his widow if she so directs. No inventory is stated, but the estate is believed to be worth nearly half a million. There are no charitable bequests. The will bequeaths each of the children \$10,000, the income of these legacies to be used for their maintenance and education by their mother until each reaches maturity. The residue of the estate is bequeathed to Mrs. Cleveland.

HINTS FROM MISSOURI.

How to Use the King Drag and Have an Ideal Road.

In Missouri the roads are really bad, and improvement by the King road drag has been taken up systematically. The following suggestions are from a bulletin by the Missouri board of agriculture:

Don't drive too fast.
 Don't walk. Get on the drag and ride.
 Don't wait for your neighbors to take hold. They may be waiting on you.
 Don't wait for the big grader to come and shape up your road. All you can do first will help to make the work of the grader permanent.
 Don't try to drag with one piece; use two. One will scoop out the hollows in the road and deepen them. When two are used the one keeps the other up, and soon the hollows will have filled and become level like the balance of the road.
 Don't wait for good roads until the city folks begin to talk about macadam at public expense. This will cost from \$3,000 to \$5,000 a mile, and for country purposes, where there is no heavy hauling, it is no better than, not is easily maintained as, a road properly made with the drag. Five dollars a mile with a proper use of the road drag will keep the ordinary country road that is properly drained, graded and bridged or culverted in first class condition nine months in the year and make it a fairly decent road the other three months. But this cannot be done in one year or two. The longer the drag is used intelligently the better the road will become until finally it is oval and smooth and hard and elastic. This is the ideal road, and nothing but a road properly made with the drag or an asphalt road meets all these requirements.

The Cheapest Roadmaker.

The "good roads without money" movement that has by means of King's split log road drag converted the sough holes of the "corn belt" roads into model turnpikes is extending to the eastern states, where most roads are either very good or very bad, says Garden Magazine. Mr. King is arranging with the various state boards of agriculture to give a series of practical demonstrations of the use of his device on eastern roads where the success of road dragging is more doubtful because of sand and rocks.
