KING KOHR WINNER

"Oregon Frank" Also Wins
Over "Princess"

IN TODAY'S RACING EVENTS

Fine Trotting Exhibition Also Enjoyed
by the Large Crowd Which
Was Present

This afternoon's big racing event at the District Fair grounds opened with a five-eighths mile dash between C. H. Brown's "Oregon Frank" and J. R. Chapman's "Princess," the former proving an easy winner. Time 1:08.

Judges were H. T. McCallister, E. R. Hanan, G. W. Staley, S. J. J. M. Hansbrough, F. L. Calhoun. The owner's son, Herbert Brown, rode "Oregon Frank," and Fordham McDonald, of Portland, piloted "Princess." After repeated efforts a good start was finally made, with "Oregon Frank" at the pole. At the first eighth he led by a length and this was increased to several lengths at the finish, most of which was gained in the last quarter. This race was for a purse of \$1000, and there were numerous side bets.

The second event was an exhibition trot, the starters being F. H. Alley's blooded stallion, "Sonoma

Boy," driven by W. L. Duncan, and "Major B," a fine stallion, owned by J. H. Condon, of Crescent City, Cal., and driven by the owner. It was a beautiful contest to the three-eighths turn where Sonoma Boy "broke." He almost regained his position but "broke" again in the home stretch and Major B. finished a length ahead. Time not officially stated, it being merely an exhibition trot and not a speed contest. By-standers gave the time as 1:12 for the half mile.

The big race of the afternoon was the mile dash for a purse of \$1800, between "King Kohr," owned by W. W. Cardwell, and "Lady Beach," owned by S. T. Smith. Both, Wilson, of Marshfield, piloted King Kohr to an easy victory. For Lady Beach, Herbert Brown was up. The horses got off easily, with but little backing, and a finer contest rarely ever was seen on this track for the first three-eighths. At the turn King Kohr gained the lead by a length although Lady Beach had the pole. At the first half King Kohr led by about four lengths and then Lady Beach practically dropped out. Both galloped around the track a second time, King Kohr winning in 1:54 1/2, with his opponent just turning into the home stretch.

Taking into account the side bets, it is probable that not much more money changed hands on this race than on the first, although the purse was materially larger. The attendance was in the neighborhood of 1,000 persons, a considerable number coming from Oakland, the home of Mr. Brown, and the former home of Mr. Smith, owners of two of the horses in the big races.

In connection with these races it may be noted that the best five-eighths record yet made on this track was 1:05, as against the 1:06 made today.

TRYING TO "RECALL" HIM.

Medford "Drys" Would Unseat Councilman John D. Olwell.

Medford (Or.) Tribune: The first recall petition in Oregon under the new amendment to the constitution adopted at the June election is being circulated in the First ward by prohibitionists for the recall of John D. Olwell, councilman. The alleged cause of the recall is that Mr. Olwell does not now reside in the ward. The real cause is that he voted to license the Hotel Nash bar, and it is hoped by getting Olwell out to elect a prohibitionist in his place and make the city dry.

The recall law requires that there must be required 25 per cent, but not more, of the voters of the district who voted at the preceding election for supreme court justice to sign the recall petition. As the state election did not recognize the ward boundaries as precincts, it is impossible to segregate the votes and determine who in North Medford precinct voted from the First ward, and the probability is therefore that the recall will be ineffective in this instance.

BUSINESS SECTION IN ASHES.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 14.—The business section of Daguerre, a small town on the Mojave Desert, was practically destroyed by fire last night. The blaze, which is supposed to have started in a barber shop, quickly burned the main business block, there being a scarcity of water. Among the buildings destroyed were the postoffice, Hart's hotel and Meade's cafe. The loss is about \$50,000.

The unusual lateness of today's issue of the Review is due to the injury to a generator at the power station at Winchester, which forced the typesetting machine, operated by electricity, to remain idle all forenoon, pending the substitution of an emergency water motor.

The inundation enveloping the wire cut of the generator burned away in several places at an early hour this morning. This was due to the influence of the electrical storm of the preceding morning. Repair was made and the machines started about four o'clock this afternoon.

The Three Great Issues Today Are Tariff, Trusts and the New Federalism.

HERE ARE THREE GREAT ISSUES TODAY. FIRST AND MOST IMPORTANT IS THE TARIFF. SECOND AND CLOSELY ALLIED TO IT IS THE TRUST QUESTION. THIRD IS THE NEW FEDERALISM WHICH HAS BEEN FORCED UPON US WITHIN THE PAST FEW MONTHS.

Our tariff system has reached a point where its apologists are AT EXTREMES TO DEFEND IT. It pretends to be for the man who works, but experience has proved that he is not the real beneficiary and, if at all, in such a remote and contingent degree as to be almost a nullity. The leaders of the opposition have now publicly admitted that the schedules should be revised, but this is not their first public declaration, and their continuation in power has brought no change.

We are now confronted with the same old declaration of the necessity for a change, but with no evidence that revision will be accomplished within a reasonable period. The country is provided with a spectacle of A HELPLESS MAJORITY held firmly in control by a coterie of leaders in the house and one strong man in the senate.

The time may come when absolute free trade will be beneficial to the whole people, but until our country becomes as thickly populated as are the European countries I believe some tariff schedules for other than revenue purposes are necessary. There is practically no difference of opinion between the great parties of the wisdom of a revision that will revise downward and that will mean a more equitable division of the fruits of labor, but in the light of past experience I fear we cannot trust our Republican friends to make these changes.

ORGANIZATION OF CAPITAL IS NOT TO BE CONDEMNED SO LONG AS THE RIGHTS OF THE INDIVIDUAL ARE NOT INVADED. BUT WHEN A CORPORATION OR A COMBINATION OF CORPORATIONS CRUSHES COMPETITION OR WHEN IT DEVELOPS POWER, COMMERCIAL, FINANCIAL OR POLITICAL, THAT SETS AT DEFIANCE THE WILL OF THE PEOPLE AS EXPRESSED IN LAW IT IS A MENACE ALIKE TO INDIVIDUAL FREEDOM AND TO OUR NATIONAL EXISTENCE.

Onslaughts on the trusts, inaugurated and prosecuted by the present national administration, have been spectacular in the extreme, but their concrete results are hard to discover. There can be no effective control until THE TARIFF QUESTION OF THE WHOLE TRUST SYSTEM IS SOLVED.

PROHIBITION CONVENTIONS.

National Session at Columbus—State Meet in Maine.

COLUMBUS, O., July 15.—With over 1500 delegates present, many antislavery leaders occupying places of honor on the platform and the galleries filled with alternates and visitors, the Prohibition party's national convention was formally opened in Memorial hall this morning. The assemblage is by all odds the most enthusiastic in the history of the party. Since the last convention several states, including Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, North Carolina and Oklahoma, have joined the prohibition ranks, and the delegations from those states were given a great ovation. In the number of delegates, Illinois leads the list with 178, with Pennsylvania a close second. The latter state, however, with New York and New Jersey are admitted to be the most hopeless in the union, from a prohibition standpoint.

Representation in the convention gives each state and territory four delegates at large and an additional delegate for every 200,000 souls and for Dr. Silas C. Saelow for president in 1914.

It is declared by the party leaders that the prohibitionists will cast nearly a million votes at the coming election. In 1904 Saelow received only 258,295 votes, but it is alleged that prohibition sentiment has increased by leaps and bounds since that time. The failure of Tennessee Democrats to nominate General C. J. Davis, who ran on a prohibition platform for governor of that state, and the defeat of Duke Snider in Illinois are declared to be testimony to this.

The platform will be "justified from recent years and will demand the complete repeal of the liquor business."

The prohibitionists will carry on the most active campaign for the repeal of the liquor business, and will have abundant funds for that purpose. Maine will be a strong center during the campaign, with the attempt to secure re-election of the prohibition amendment to the constitution.

HANDLER, Mr. July 15.—When a candidate for governor, standing for the nomination of Jonathan G. Cook, of Rockland, the governor, given a platform demanding the repeal of the prohibition statute, it is the

constitution to a popular vote, the democrats of Maine began their state convention in City hall at 1:30 this afternoon.

The republicans recently nominated Earl H. Fernald, of Portland, for governor, on a platform meaning re-submission. Several holders that it will be unwise to support prohibition, which has been on the state books for more than half a century, by submitting it to decision of the voters.

The campaign will be fought out on this narrow issue and the moderate leaders in attendance at today's convention declare that it will mean a democratic victory. They allege that public sentiment favors re-submission and point out that the republican majority have been down from 18,000 in 1894 to the last few years by the liquor question.

The republican platform will assert that under a republican form of government the majority should decide the question, and that a party stand will be taken either for or against prohibition.

Democratic politicians declare that the prohibition law has become a farce and a source of strife and corruption and that, if the people should be permitted to decide, the statute should be strictly enforced.

Some of the most noted temperance orators of the country will come to the assistance of the Maine republicans during the campaign. Maine was the first state in the union to adopt a prohibition law and the temperance leaders realize that it should be repealed after the long trial it has been given, the effect would be disastrous to the prohibition movement throughout the United States.

Democrats declare that their state will have the support of the ranks of republican voters who are dissatisfied with the present prohibition statute and will aid in electing a democratic governor and legislature in order to get a chance to express their opinion of prohibition at the polls.

There is little doubt that the coming campaign will be one of the hottest in the history of the state, and that the republicans have the strongest odds on their side.

MARYSVILLE, Calif., July 15.—Sheriff Shubbuck and three posses are searching the woods for Gus Adolph, an Italian, who last night murdered two men and tried to kill a third man. The tragedy occurred in a Western Pacific railway camp near Oroville, and resulted from a band of Italian workmen, of which Adolph was one, being driven away on account of their repeated quarrels with other crews.

A Colliery Horror.
PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 15.—Eight men were killed outright by an explosion in a colliery at Williamsburg today. Eight others were rescued, terribly burned, while several others are still in the shaft and it is feared they may perish also. Roseburg are now fighting the fire resulting from the explosion.

Cruiser Hits a Barge.
LONDON, July 15.—The new cruiser Indomitable, the "mystery ship," carrying the Prince of Wales to Canada, collided with a barge off Portsmouth this morning. The extent of the damage has not yet been learned.

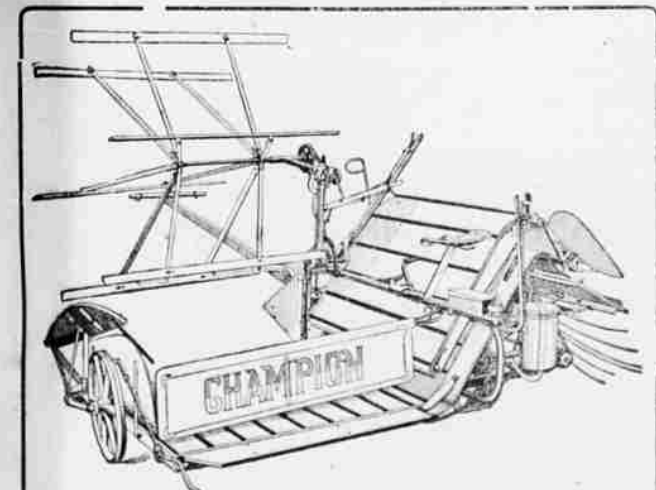
Steve Adams Acquitted.
