Good roads throughout Douglas county will prove the greatest aid in the development of our numerous and almost boundless natural resources.

With nearly \$6,000 changing hands on two horse races here yesterday, there is evidently no occasion for any talk about financial stringency in this vicinity.

Business is reported as rapidly improving in the east since the national conventions are over. Our country is too big to be affected much by electric anyway as everybody realizes that the country will be safe with either Bryan or Taft in the White House. Neither would do anything revolutionary.

Roseburg is the banner city. Eighteen blocks of hard surface street paving to be done this year and not a single protest was filed against it. Everybody boasts in Roseburg and our 27 per cent of increased growth in the past two years will be far exceeded in the next two. A mile of paving this year will certainly look good to everybody.

EXHIBITS ARE WANTED.

For the District Fair at Marshfield on August 26 to 29.

Coos Bay people are anxious that Douglas county be well represented in the way of exhibits at the fair to be held in Marshfield next month. A. E. Guyton, a newspaper man from Marshfield, who is in the city on business, is furthering the interests of the big meeting. Regarding the preparations for the fair he says:

"The committee having in charge the arrangements for the Southern Oregon District Fair to be held at Marshfield Aug. 25 to 29, and the people of Coos Bay in general, are anxious that the Douglas county farmers exhibit their fine products. I understand that heretofore there has not been much competition among the various counties of the district but that is just what the fair managers want this time. They are making plans for a big crowd and for many exhibits.

"Coos county has some fine dairy and agriculture products to show and will exhibit blooded stock of all kinds, but the fair will not be complete as a district gathering without the unsurpassed fruit of Douglas county. The farmers and fruit growers here can show orchard and agricultural exhibits which will be of great interest to the Coos county people and also to the visitors in general. The attendance will be large and whatever effort the Douglas county people make in the way of exhibiting will be repaid at least by a splendid advertisement of their district. Besides some good prizes are offered.

"No expense is being spared by the Coos Bay people in preparing for the event. The old fair grounds at

Marshfield has not been used for fair purposes for a number of years, so it was necessary to make extensive improvements. For this purpose something over \$3000 was raised by subscription from the merchants for the exclusive use of building and improving. A large pavilion is being constructed in which to show the exhibits. The grand stand has been enlarged so that it will seat 2,000 persons, and new stalls for the horses and sheds for the live stock have been built. The race track has been used every year, and one meet was held July 4, last, and as horses have been training there all summer it will be found to be in fine condition.

The fact that there will be a county fair here immediately following the Marshfield event will make it easier for the exhibitors as the same preparations will do for both places, and the fair here really ought to help the district gathering rather than to detract from it.

"The dates are also convenient for the race horse men and it is expected that some fast horses will be at Marshfield. The managers promise the best sport in this line that has ever been enjoyed on Coos Bay and there has been some good racing there.

"After seeing the beautiful ranches in the vicinity of Roseburg, the kind of fruit you raise here and the races and the fine live stock it is more evident than ever that Coos Bay must have the co-operation of the Douglas county people in the way of exhibits. The fruit growers' association and similar organizations here will be asked to take up the matter of urging the farmers to exhibit.

"Those from the outside will find the Marshfield fair officials ready to assist them in any way and the visitors to the fair will be given a good time. Music by bands and other entertainment will be provided and it will be a lively week on the flag."

WILL TAKE NO SLUSH FUNDS.

Democrats Will Publish Lists of Campaign Contributions.

LINCOLN, Nebr., July 14.—The Democratic national committee has adopted a motion in outline as follows: "No contributions shall be accepted from corporations nor shall contributions of \$10,000 be accepted. All gifts of \$100 shall be made public by October 15, and thereafter immediate publication will be given. Contributions under \$100 will not be published. No money will be received after November 1."

CARRIES HATRED TO DEATH.

Slayer of Priest Dies With Curses on His Lips.

CANON CITY, Colo., July 13.—Calling down maledictions on the most high upon the Roman priesthood, and shouting in Italian "Long live Italy; long live the Protestants!" Giuseppe Alla, the murderer of Father Leo Heinrichs, was carried to the death-trap tonight, and paid the extreme penalty of his crime. Alla said he found no fault with the law, but that the priest did wrong in breaking up his family. Alla's crime was the murder of Father Leo Heinrichs, of the order of Franciscan monks, at the altar rail in St. Elizabeth's church in Denver, while the priest was administering the sacrament of the Eucharist.

CIRCUIT COURT DECISIONS.

Decisions in three civil cases were made in the circuit court this morning by Judge J. W. Hamilton.

Two of the cases were petitions for writs of review from proceedings of the county court of Douglas county and the third involves the home of Geo. W. Bennett, a blind and decrepit old soldier of this city. One of the decisions sustains the county court and another reverses it.

The victor over the county court is the Alliance Trust Co., a Scotch concern, of which Wm. McMaster, of Portland, is agent. Upon petition of A. E. Davison, a farmer, living 6 miles northwest of Oakland, the county court, on January 3, of this year, established a road of public easement through a tract of land owned by the Alliance Trust Co. From this action the trust company appealed, alleging that Davison's petition was defective, that it did not confer the jurisdiction assumed by the county court and furthermore it (the company) had not been served with a copy of the order issued to the board of viewers directing them to locate the proposed road. In his decision, Judge Hamilton holds that "error was committed by the county court as alleged" and sets aside the order establishing the road. The plaintiff is also awarded costs.

The other case against the county court was instituted by H. Wollenberg, as admr. of the estate of S. Marks & Co., and like the first arose out of the establishment by the court of a road of public easement. The land involved is what is known as the J. J. Chadwick place, between Canyonville and Myrtle Creek. Plaintiff alleged various irregularities not only on part of the court, but on part of the board of viewers, as well, but Judge Hamilton holds that no error was committed and accordingly dismisses Wollenberg's petition, at the same time awarding the county its costs from the plaintiff.

In the third case decided, Judge Hamilton confirms the sale of Geo. W. Bennett's residence property in order to satisfy a judgment for \$600, awarded to Mrs. Phoebe Ketchell for nursing and lodging and for her services as a nurse. The property is situated in Chadwick's addition. Atty. J. A. Buchanan, Bennett's guardian, stated today that the case would probably be appealed.
