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RECORD STILL STANDS.

Salem Winners Fail to Equal Score Made by Roseburg in 1906.

Company M., of Salem, which on Tuesday won the company team shoot of the Oregon National Guard on the state range near that city, made a total score of 446. This is 11 points higher than the score made by the Roseburg company, which finished in second place, but 29 less than Roseburg's winning score of two years ago, which stands as the record.

Tuesday also saw the finish of the individual medal match, which was captured by Sgt. R. L. White, of Salem. Second place, as well, went to a Salem rifleman, Sgt. C. Abrams. White and Abrams made 120 apiece out of 150 at three targets, but White won, because of making the highest total at rapid fire at 200 yards. Sgt. A. A. Schwarz, of Portland, got third place, with a score of 117, winning over Private Ben Shields, of Roseburg, who had 117, but who fell short at rapid fire. Shields got fourth place. He won the medal two years ago with a higher score than that made by White this year.

In the individual match, for which there are 95 entries, Captain George E. Houck, of this city, held first place Tuesday night at the completion of the first event, a skirmish run. Captain Houck leads by a dozen points, but there are all the ranges yet to be heard from. However, there are few better riflemen in the country, and he is a likely winner.

For Regimental Supremacy.

At this time the Third Infantry has something of a lead in the struggle for honors, but regimental supremacy for 1908 will be decided ones and for all in the governor's trophy match. This match will be taken up Thursday. Teams of eight men will represent each command, and the line-up has not yet been settled on. It is contended by the Southern Oregon rifleman that when it comes to selecting so large a number of marksmen they have the Third Regiment at a disadvantage, but no one has been discovered hunting for bets on the Fourth or on the Third for that matter. One thing sure, the match will be the most important, the most interesting and the hardest fought rifle competition ever held in Oregon.

Friday or Saturday at the latest, will bring the 1908 shoot to an end. The final event will be the revolver competition, open to officers.

Cause of Lower Scores.

That the new Springfield rifle, with its high velocity explosive and sharp-nosed bullet, has the sharpshooters of the Oregon militia "on its hip" for the time being is shown by the scores made yesterday and today in the state trophy match, when the marksmen of the several teams fell many points behind their scores of previous years' contests with the old Krag-Jorgensen 25-30 and its "blunt-nosed" ball.

One of the complaints generally made against the new Springfield among the riflemen is its strong kick, which is so severe as to cause them to resort to shoulder pads, but the principal complaint is the substitution of the "A" or bullseye target for the "K" or silhouette target, upon the latter of which the majority of the teams took their preliminary practice.

DEFUNCT BANK PAYS OFF.

65 Per Cent of Claims Liquidated in Less Than 3 Months.

PORTLAND, Or., July 21.—Although Thomas C. Devlin, as receiver of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, has two years in which to wind up his affairs, he has, according to his official report, in the first four and a half months, liquidated more than 65 per cent of the claims against the institution. From the liabilities listed January 15, 1908, at \$2,298,455.15, Receiver Devlin has reduced the outstanding indebtedness to \$628,985.06. The assets were listed January 15 at \$2,135,594.88 and there are now \$719,951.24. This showing is made in the report of the receiver filed today with Circuit Judge Gantenbein and dated at the close of business June 30, 1908. Since the date the report was prepared Receiver Devlin has had subscribed \$89,000 more of the bonds listed in the assets which will reduce the liabilities to \$548,985.

Telephone bonds, which were credited with having swamped the bank, a little over a year ago because of the apparently childlike faith of the bank's managers in the security until they bought a total of \$1,106,600 have happily been reduced to about \$324,000.

Louisiana Forbids Tipping From One's Flask on Trains. NEW ORLEANS, July 20.—Drinking even out of one's own flask in passenger trains in Louisiana constitutes a misdemeanor punishable by a fine or imprisonment, or both, according to a new state law which went into effect today.
