CAMPAIGN MANAGER

Bryan and Committee Will Make Selection Tomorrow.

CHICAGO, July 24.—A manager of the democratic national campaign will be selected at a meeting to be held at the Auditorium Annex tomorrow by a sub-committee of the democratic national committee. Mr. Bryan will take part in the deliberations and his decision as to a national chairman and other officers will likely be accepted as final.

It is generally believed that John H. Atwood of Leavenworth, Kan., will be chosen as national chairman. Ollie James, of Kentucky, is also prominently mentioned. Mr. Bryan is understood to take the view that a man whose reputation is not national will be a better choice for chairman than some widely known politician. It will be in harmony with the action taken about campaign contributions, and will serve to emphasize the fact that the party has broken with its old traditions. Atwood is a lawyer and was formerly attorney-general of Kansas.

Coincident with tomorrow's meeting of the sub-committee, delegates to the national convention of Hearst's Independence Party will begin to arrive in Chicago. It has been suggested that Mr. Bryan may have hopes of affecting a reconciliation with the New York editor, but this is denied by prominent democrats here today. They declare that the break between Bryan and Hearst is final and irreconcilable and that the Nebraskaan has no desire for a coalition with the handful of Hearst men. Mr. Bryan has no speech-making date until Labor Day. After that it is planned for him to make a tour that will include New England and New York, with an invasion of Pat's state and the Mississippi Valley.

The fact that Mr. Bryan tentatively has determined to make an early invasion of New York is interpreted here as indicating his purpose to wage a fierce battle in that state. He believes from the representation made to him that, in spite of his failure to get an Eastern running mate, New York is a debatable ground. This belief has been strengthened within the last twenty-four hours by the tone of several editorial utterances by New York city newspapers, which Mr. Bryan had counted against him. The fact that the Denver platform has not met wholesale denunciation by the eastern papers appears to have convinced Mr. Bryan that his cause is stronger in what he once characterized as "the enemy's country," than even has been represented to him by politicians. His advisers say that he will sound his first appeal in New York for the labor vote and that

he will depend for success upon enlisting the solid support of that element of the electorate in New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

TEXAS TO GO DRY—MAYBE.

Republicans Join With Wet in Hope of Turning the State.

AUSTIN, Tex., July 24.—Imagine a "dry" Texas—an arid desert stretching from Texarkana to El Paso and from Beaumont to the Panhandle—265,000 square miles of un-irrigated koom, with never an oasis on all its dreary wastes—a Texas given over to the polite ministrations of the soda fountain "scurit," with the white-robed dispenser of good "red heker," guaranteed to kill at forty rods, banished from its confines forever.

Yet it is this staggering proposition on which the democratic voters of Texas will vote at a state-wide primary tomorrow and if the question carries, as appears likely, the legislature must frame up a constitutional amendment in favor of state-wide prohibition to be voted on next year. And state-wide prohibition in Texas means something, since it will banish liquor from a territory extending 760 miles in extreme breadth and 620 miles in extreme length.

It has been twenty years since a prohibition amendment was submitted to the people by the legislature. That was in 1888, and it was defeated by 100,000 at the polls.

The prohibition fight, following the warfare that was waged between the Butler and anti-Butler factions and which has not yet ended, has led to many interesting dimensions in the democratic party, and the republicans are preparing to take advantage of it to the fullest extent. For the first time the followers of the G. O. P. have what looks like a fighting chance to line up against the plowman. With prohibition saddled on its back it is admitted that the democratic donkey will have to do some rapid traveling this year in its race with the elephant. The republicans are looking to the liquor element for aid and substance, and they will hardly look in vain. Under the local option law 167 of the 240 counties of the state are already dry.
