HARRIMAN APPEALS.

Protests Ordered Reduction in Rate on Oregon Lumber.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 23.—Dissatisfied with the reduction in lumber rates from the Willamette Valley in Oregon to San Francisco and adjacent points, ordered by the interstate commerce commission, Harriman is preparing today to fight the decision in the federal court.

On complaint of the Western Oregon Lumber Manufacturers' association, the interstate commerce commission recently decided that the Hill and Harriman roads must make sweeping reductions in overland rates on lumber shipments from Pacific coast points to many eastern cities.

At the same time the tariff schedule on Oregon-California shipments was cut. It is to this reduction that Harriman objects.

Before the Harriman roads adopted their new schedule, a year and a half ago, \$3.10 a ton was charged by the Southern Pacific on lumber shipped to San Francisco from points on the east side of the Willamette Valley. Shipments from the west side of the valley were accepted at \$3.30 a ton, the difference being caused by the longer haul, via Corvallis and Albany.

When the new schedule was adopted the rate was advanced to \$5 from either side of the valley.

Because the complaint against this increase was considered well founded, the commission ordered that the rate be reduced to \$3.40 from the east side points and \$3.65 from west side points.

Although this is 30 cents a ton higher than the old rate the railroad objects to any reduction in the new flat rate and the case will be carried into the federal courts.

HOW STREET PAVING PAYS.

Eugene is undoubtedly making greater strides cityward than any town in Oregon. It is growing at a pace that even a year ago would not have seemed possible, surpassing the most sanguine predictions of the advocates of the plan of street paving and other public improvements. All that is necessary for a continuation of this growth is to keep up the same policy of progressiveness—and the western trend of immigration will do the rest.

F. E. Dunn and F. W. Wilkins who intend to erect a business block on their properties on West Eighth street, Mr. Dunn having only a few days ago bought 53 feet frontage from Mr. Wilkins between Olive street and the alley west of there, have changed their plans and decided instead of a two-story concrete building, to erect a three-story brick building with pressed brick front. This will put the cost up to something like \$40,000. Architect John Hunziker has been engaged to draw the plan and furnish the specifications for the building.—Eugene Guard.

LAND FRAUDS RECALLED.

Innocent Purchaser in East Asks for \$80,000 Damages.

CHICAGO, July 23.—L. Coggins, an Oregonian, said to be prominent politically, and others, are accused of having sold 16,000 acres of land wrongfully taken from the government, in a suit begun in the circuit court today by Fabe Ringoldius to collect \$80,000 damages. Clifford C. Coggins, Mary E. Coggins and the firm of Coggins Brothers & Co. are co-defendants.

This suit is an echo of the famous land-frauds perpetrated in the government some time ago which caused a widespread investigation to be made into the assets of certain wealthy westerners. Specifically Ringoldius asks that he be given judgment for \$80,000, the amount of profit he declares he lost because the defendants could not give him a clear title to 16,000 acres of land in Oregon and California.

He alleges that no title could be given, as the government held that the land had been wrongfully obtained.
