U. OF O. REGENTS MEET.

Buy More Land, and Send Campbell East for Instructions.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 27.—The annual meeting of the Board of Regents was held on Saturday in the President's office, in Villard Hall, with all members but one present. Additional land was purchased for the campus and committees appointed to investigate and arrange for the purchase of other tracts. \$10,000 was appropriated for library books, to be purchased as soon as possible. L. R. Alderman, a graduate of the University of Oregon, and at present city superintendent of the schools of Eugene, was elected an infant professor of Education; Dr. Hugo Koehler was elected instructor in German; Mrs. James Curtis, instructor in Chemistry; Mrs. Ellen M. Penne, instructor in English, and assistant dean of women; Miss Mary Healy, assistant instructor in English literature; and Miss Mabel Cooper, assistant in the Correspondence school.

President Campbell was authorized to make a trip east at once in order, through personal investigation, to secure the best possible men for the following positions: A head for the department of Geology, a librarian, a professor of Political Science, an associate professor of Civil Engineering, and an assistant professor of Psychology.

The president of the board was authorized to construct at once a new building to be completed by the opening of the fall semester. The plans have already been drawn for one that will contain about fifteen rooms, and work will begin on it at once. It will greatly relieve the overcrowded condition of the other buildings. Several other new buildings will be constructed as soon as possible, but probably no work can be done until spring.

The addition of the new instructors to the teaching force will mean much for the work of the University. The rapid growth in the number of students has greatly crowded many departments and some, like the department of Geology, have been without a head for some time. The Correspondence School will be much stronger than last year and the new man in the department of Political Science will greatly strengthen the course preparatory to Law. The work of the library will be greatly expanded.

"It will be the policy of the University to secure the best possible men for these and all other positions," President Campbell said today, "for the real success of any school is measured by the worth of its teaching force. No college on the Coast has a better instructional force than the University of Oregon and every effort will be made to keep the standard at the highest. I have a large number of applications for each position to be filled and during my trip east shall select the men who are best qualified for the work."

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INDEPENDENTS CONVENE.

Hearst Wants Someone Else to be the Goat First Time.

CHICAGO, July 28.—With nearly a dozen active candidates for the presidential nomination in the field, the Independence Party national convention will resume its session this afternoon and before midnight, according to plans, will have made a choice of its standard bearers, adopted a platform and concluded its business.

This morning the state delegations held meetings to elect new national committeemen and chairmen of delegations and to agree as to planks in the platform to be supported and candidates for president and vice-president.

Although many delegations have joined in a demand that William Randolph Hearst accept the presidential nomination, he is apparently determined that the honor go elsewhere and his wishes will probably be respected. Among those mentioned for the first place on the ticket are Thomas L. Higon, of Massachusetts; John Temple Graves, of Georgia, and M. W. Edward of Alabama.

HARRIMAN REACHING TOP.

CHICAGO, July 27.—Wall street and the railroad and financial world are wrought up to the highest pitch over the extreme possibility of the

elimination of George J. Gould from the galaxy of railroad magnates and the substitution of Edward H. Harriman in his stead. The matter became acute today, when it was stated that Mr. Gould would return from

Europe Tuesday and seek aid of Kuhn, Loeb & Co. in the refinancing and reorganization of his railroad properties. There are strong intimations that the banking interests will insist that Mr. Harriman be given control.

The deal will make Mr. Harriman the greatest railroad king in history. He will be in absolute control of vast systems from ocean to ocean and from the Great Lakes to the Gulf. He will have power to dominate rates and other conditions. His only competitor will be James J. Hill in the Northwest.

NEW BRITISH PATENT LAW

Foreigners Must Manufacture Goods on English Soil.

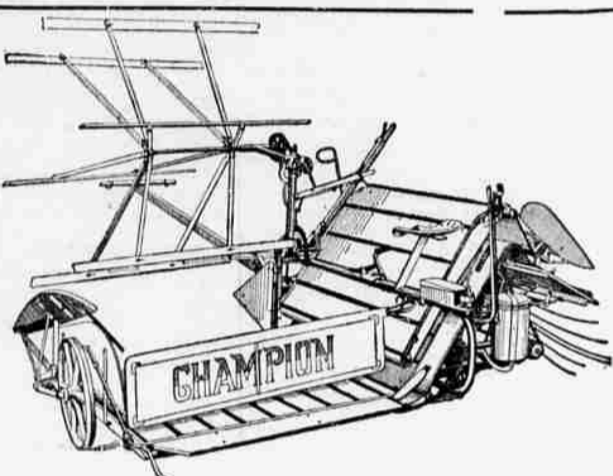
LONDON, July 28.—Many American and German manufacturers are hard hit by the new British patent law, which became fully effective today. The law requires foreigners who obtain patents from the British government to manufacture their goods on British soil. As a result of the act, many German and American firms are either opening factories in Great Britain or are overcoming the difficulty by means of royalty agreements with British manufacturers.

The law is hitting the Germans so hard that the union of industrialists is now petitioning the German government to adopt retaliatory measures. Several English authorities are convinced that the new law will confer greater commercial and industrial benefits on Great Britain than any law that has been passed in the last half century. It has already resulted in the employment of many thousand British work people and the introduction of an enormous amount of capital from foreign countries.

It appears not improbable that the recent prophecy of Sir Alfred Jones to the effect that the new law will cause the investment of \$125,000,000 of foreign—largely German—capital in manufactures in this country will be fully realized. All

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ready a large number of foreign firms have secured factory sites. Over 20,000 British patents have been granted to foreigners within the last three years, and not one of the processes for which the patents were taken out has been carried on to any great extent in the United Kingdom.

Hurts American Trade. WASHINGTON, July 28.—It is feared here that the enforcement today of the new British patent law will result in a considerable reduction in the exports of this country to Great Britain. After today any patents granted to American manufacturers by the British patent office may be instantly revoked, unless the goods patented are manufactured in Great Britain. British concerns will be at liberty to manufacture the same goods, and the American owners of the patent, if they have failed to establish a factory on British soil,

will have on recourse. Patent attorneys here say that a large number of their clients will be affected, although many have complied with the law by starting British factories.

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
