FOR STREET PAVING.

Ordinances Pass Final Reading Tonight—Bids to be Asked For.

Final passage of the street paving ordinance is to be made by the Roseburg city council at their regular meeting tonight. This will be followed by instructions to the city recorder to immediately advertise for bids for doing the paving of the 18 blocks of streets as specified, and also for the construction of the new concrete and steel bridge over Deer Creek, at the foot of Jackson street.

It is very probable that the council will hold a special meeting some time next week to consider the bids offered on the work of paving, etc., and the actual work should begin before the end of the present month. It is understood that the proposed paving can be completed in about 46 days from the time the necessary working plan is in place, and as we can always count on good weather during September and October there is now no apparent reason why Roseburg will not have nearly a mile of solid modern pavement before the coming winter season comes on. As the people are practically unanimous in favor of this movement, and the councilmen are likewise in favor of it, there is no apparent reason to doubt that Roseburg will now have some fine paved streets just as soon as it is possible to build them. Hurry the work along.

SUES FOR \$30,000 DAMAGES.

Billy Cox, through his attorneys T. S. Minot and C. F. McKnight, has brought suit against the local rail road company for \$30,000 damage which he alleges he sustained by injuries on the company's road in March last. Cox at the time was engineer on locomotive No. 5 and in going to extinguish the fire light the stop gave way and he fell sustaining serious and permanent injuries. To reimburse him he asks the company to pay him the above amount. The case will come up to a hearing at the next term of circuit court.—Marshallfield Sun.

TWELVE NEW CARDINALS.

ROME, Aug. 1.—At the Vatican tonight it was considered certain that Pope Pius will hold a consistory either before November, when the reform of the congregations become effective, or in December, at the close of his jubilee year. In either instance, it is asserted, his holiness will create ten new cardinals, because the sacred college is now reduced to a membership of 53, there being 12 red hats to be bestowed. The presence of Cardinal Gibbons in Rome, it is expected, will result in a decision being reached as to whether or not a new American cardinal will be chosen this year. Cardinal Gibbons had an audience with the Pope today, which lasted one hour. The pontiff expressed great satisfaction with the condition of the church in America.

ALBANY HAS COSTLY FIRE.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 1.—An over heated furnace caused the destruction of the Albany Iron works here last night. Sparks blown by a strong wind ignited the roofs of three adjoining houses. The buildings were saved, however, by prompt action. The loss to the iron works is \$10,000, with insurance of \$9,000.

REED—At the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Reed, in this city, August 2, 1908, Eberly Reed, aged 12 years, of purpura. The funeral was held from the family residence this afternoon at 2 o'clock, with services conducted by Rev. B. W. Bass, of the Christian church. Interment followed in Masonic cemetery. The young lad conducted a shoe blacking stand at Thos. Weatherford's barber shop. He was taken ill only last Wednesday. Besides his parents, he is survived by a brother and two sisters.

How Centralization of Power Imperils the Republic.

By Governor JOSEPH W. FOLK of Missouri.

THERE are many men in America today who advocate centralizing all power at Washington in the hands of the president. I am EMPHATICALLY OPPOSED to this programme. Destroy the dignity of the states and place in the hands of a president control over all the corporations of the land, for instance, and there is given a power that sooner or later will endanger the republic.

There are two ships at sea. One has water tight compartments; the other is all in one. If an accident happens to this first, one compartment fills with water, while the remainder of the ship is safe. If an accident befalls the second, the ship sinks. THIS REPUBLIC OF STATES IS SECURE SO LONG AS THE STATES ARE INDEPENDENT. If something goes wrong with one, the others keep the ship of state afloat. Let the integrity of states be taken away, the government centralized at Washington, and the republic will be in constant danger.

IT IS BUT A LITTLE WAY FROM REPUBLIC TO EMPIRE. EACH STEP MEANS BUT THE TAKING OF ANOTHER. WITH A CENTRALIZED GOVERNMENT IT WOULD NOT BE DIFFICULT TO FORESEE THE ELECTION OF A PRESIDENT FIRST FOR A LONGER TERM OF YEARS, THEN FOR LIFE, THEN THE OFFICE MADE HEREDITARY. HISTORY TELLS US THAT MANY ANOTHER REPUBLIC HAS GONE THIS WAY.

As long as our republic is composed of independent states, with a central government which is MERELY THE AGENT OF THESE STATES, the rocks on which other republics have gone down will be avoided. Republics have not, as a rule, become empires suddenly. The development has been by degrees. THE FIRST STEP with us will be to take away the independence of the states. And anything which tends in that direction just to that extent is dangerous.

KETCHELL WHIPS KELLY.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—Stanley Ketchell, of Grand Rapids, clinched his title to the middleweight championship last night, when three rounds of fast fighting gave him the victory over Hugo Kelly. The end came suddenly and unexpected, for Kelly had made a good showing in the first and second. Ketchell simply delivered three swift ones to the jaw

so quickly that Kelly did not have time to gather himself for action. It was a clean knockout.
