The defendants will be arraigned for pleas probably tomorrow morning.

Denning and A. E. Kent in ownership of the Monogram Cigar Store. He is at present engaged in the general merchandise business at Brooks, a small town near Salem.

Laborer's liens aggregating a total of over \$745 were filed with the county clerk today against Fredlund and Clarence Cornutt and the Sterling Lumber Company, jointly operating a sawmill near Doe Creek, southwest of Riddle. The liens, 11 in number, cover the sawmill, a flume therefrom to the railroad station at Doe Creek and a large quantity of manufactured lumber and railroad ties. ## ISLAND CITY IN ASHES.

LA GRANDE, Or., Aug. 1.—The suburb of Island City, four miles distant from La Grande, with a population of 300, is practically in ashes today. A conflagration last night, from an origin unknown, gutted the business section, leaving but one store building, and took five residences up in smoke.

The Pioneer Flouring Mill, with all its contents was ruined, at a loss of \$100,000; the Island City M. & M. Company's implement warehouse and contents are in ashes, representing a loss of \$50,000; a hotel, blacksmith shop, store, bank building then empty, and five residences were crumbling embers, totalling a loss that will bring the grand total up to \$175,000. The amount of insurance carried not be ascertained.  
In all, 15 structures were consumed.

## DECIDES IT HAS POWER.

County Court Acts on One Phase of School Boundary Matter.

In adjourned session today, county court decided that as a school boundary board it had powers to act. The question was raised by B. J. Howland, the Myrtle Creek lawyer and banker, representing the remonstrators to a petition filed with the board one week ago by Edward Weaver and others, asking for the establishment of a new school district, involving the southern portion of the district in which the town of Myrtle Creek is situated. Interpreting the law exactly as it read, Mr. Howland argued that the board was entirely without power to act because the law failed to specify its duties. Against this, District Attorney Brown, representing the county, contended that though the existing law contained no such specifications, yet the board was given necessary power by a previous act. This act, however, Howland maintains is wholly annulled, and he has given notice that he will petition for a writ of review in the circuit court.

The decision of the board that it has power to act does not carry the granting of Weaver's petition. This matter is now under consideration and will probably be acted on tomorrow. The remonstrance against the petition is based on the allegations that if granted it would deprive the Myrtle Creek district of approximately one-third of its taxable property, which cannot be dispensed with at the present time owing to the fact that the town recently voted \$12,500 with which to construct a new school house and to pay off an indebtedness of \$3,000.

## K. OF P. IN BOSTON.

One-Seventh of the Order Gathers for Convention.

BOSTON, Aug. 3.—Thousands of knights in brilliant uniforms and glittering regalia and tens of thousands of the rank and file of the Pythian army invaded the city of baked beans and culture today to take part in the glorious program arranged for the twenty-fifth biennial convention of the Knights of Pythias and the encampment of the Uniformed Rank. Never before in the history of Boston has a fraternal gathering attracted so large an attendance, and the program for the week is in a fair way to be fulfilled. It is estimated that before the great convocation closes Saturday a million dollars will have been expended by the entertainment committee and visiting members, breaking all records for a convention of a fraternal order.

Addresses of welcome by Boston city officials, the formal opening of the Uniformed Rank encampment and a magnificent electrical display are the features of today's program. Two great parades will be held during the week, in which Pythians from every state of the union and many from Canada will participate.

Legislation of importance to the order will be enacted at this convention, and in addition there will be a new supreme chancellor elected to succeed the present efficient chief executive of the order, Judge Charles A. Barnes, of Illinois. It is customary for the supreme lodge officers to advance in rotation, but it is not certain that all the present line will be promoted.

The order now has a membership of nearly 700,000, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois leading in numbers.

## EUGENE TO VOTE ON BONDS.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 1.—The Eugene city council tonight passed a resolution providing for an amendment to the charter, by vote of the people, granting the council power to issue water bonds in the sum of \$500,000, providing for the levying of a tax of one mill per year, and the establishing of a water board after the plan is completed.

The resolution also provides for the voting on the \$50,000 sewer bonds. The charter already has been amended to issue \$200,000 bonds to build a gravity water system from McKenzie river, but that sum is insufficient to build the system, and it is deemed best to have more money for the purpose. The ordinance provides for a special election to be held on October 1 to vote upon the amendment passed.
