FIVE YEARS OF POPE PIUS.

ROME, Aug. 4.—Pope Pius X. to-
day completed the fifth year of his
reign as the head of the Roman Cath-
olic church and the day was marked
with universal rejoicing throughout
Rome and Italy. At the Vatican the
anniversary was observed with great
solemnity. His Holiness received
the College of Cardinals in collect
ive audience, the dean reading an ad-
dress of congratulation in which he
wished the pope many more years of
pontificate. Greetings were also ex-
changed by the several colleges of
prelates and all the military and la-
ical officials of the Vatican. Many Euro-
pean sovereigns also expressed
through their representatives, their
best wishes and sent handsome gifts.
Thousands of prominent churchmen
and laymen from all over the world
are in Rome, including Cardinal
Gibbons of Baltimore, to take part in
the celebration of the golden jubilee
of the pope's ordination to the priest-
hood, and participated in today's ob-
servances.

Preaching services have been sus-
pended at the Presbyterian church in
Roseburg during the month of Aug-
ust. Dr. Townsend, the pastor
leaves next week for a vacation.
Other services will continue regu-
larly, as usual.

H. C. Stearns, C. M. Moody and
Marion Thornton have been ap-
pointed appraisers of that portion of
the estate of Susan Smith, deceased, at-
tated in Douglas county. A portion
of the estate is situated in Unadilla
county, where an additional set of
appraisers has been appointed.

On petition of creditors, the Gra-
ham Co., and the Elk Creek Lumber
Co., Judge Hamilton on Monday
issued an order directing the sale by
him of the property of Paul
J. Dimmick, a bankrupt, consisting
of a sawmill near Drain, a tract of
timberland and a quantity of sawed
lumber. The petitioners set forth
that owing to the slump in the lum-
ber market the plant was depreciated
in value daily, and that it could not
be operated without a loss. The or-
der of sale authorizes it either pub-
licly or privately.

Tillson & Co. are making consid-
erable improvement on their pump-
ing plant in North Roseburg.
They have installed a new 45-horse
power boiler, setting it further from
the building than where the old one
was stationed in order to lessen the
danger from fire. About 600 square
feet more of storage room will be
provided by an extension being built
on the southeast corner of the build-
ing, and the interior of the main
structure has been remodeled in or-
der to afford needed increase in stor-
age. A half floor for storing empty
boxes may be built later. These
improvements are made for handling
the big prune crops to come in next
month.

Geo. Baldwin, of Myrtle Creek
was in this city today attending to
business matters. He planted sev-
eral thousand strawberry plants in
his young orchard there last winter
and this season marketed over \$10
worth of berries, although they are
not usually expected to bear the first
season. The plants, as well as the
trees, are doing fine. Mr. Baldwin
expects to establish an irrigation sys-
tem for next year and will doubtless
harvest several crops from his straw-
berry vines during the season. Mr.
B. has visited all parts of the Pacific
coast during the past six years, from
Seattle to Los Angeles, and believes
Douglas county the best place to live
and prosper that he has ever found.
He formerly resided in Oklahoma.

EMPLOYEES NOT FREE MEN.

The following dispatch from La-
gansport, Ind., was recently pub-
lished:

An order has been received by the
Western Motor Works company for
\$100,000 worth of automobile en-
gines. A clause in the contract
submitted with the order provided
that in the event of the election of
Bryan the buyer has the privilege of
cancelling the order. The order is
from one of the big automobile con-
cerns of the east. The trades assem-
bly has called a meeting to consider
the order and to protest against what
some consider an effort to influ-
ence votes.

This species of coercing men may
be expected to continue, and to in-
crease in scope and vigor, through-
out the campaign. Employees in all
sorts of occupations will be threat-
ened with loss of work and wages if
Bryan is elected, and a great many of
them who it left to show their own
inclinations would vote for him may
be thus coerced into voting against
him. But not so large a proportion
of them, probably, as in 1896 and
1900.

This method of vote-getting may
be legitimate, at least cannot at pre-
sent be prevented; but it shows on the
face of it that those who resort to it
are no patriots. It is in effect a
threat that if they cannot have their
way, if their choice is not elected
president they will do what they can
to injure the country, and laboring
men in particular. This is the spirit
of it. If these threats are to avail,
then it is not a country of free suf-
frage at all. The employer practi-
cally casts not only his own vote but
the votes of his hundreds of thou-
sands of employees. Therefore the
employees are denied the highest at-
tribute of free men, and become in a
most essential particular slaves.

It is no answer to say that the
workmen suffer no absolute com-
pulsion, that they are still free to
vote as they please, for "you take my
life when you do take the means by
which I live." Most men will submit
to this species of slavery before they
will risk suffering prolonged hunger
and cold, especially if they have fam-
ilies; and many of them believe that
the employers have the power to car-
ry their threat into effect, and might
really do so.

Under these circumstances it is not
quite erroneous to say that this is a
free country and that each man is
equally a sovereign in the polling
booth? Whittier's poem on the poe-
man on election day becomes a travesty.
If it be argued that the em-
ployers, the capitalists, have the
greater interests at stake, and know
best, let us then change the system
and allow them to cast their em-
ployee's ballots, as the slaveholder
before the war cast three votes for
every five slaves. And let us cease
to false pretend that the working
man is an equal at the ballotbox.—
Portland Journal.
