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ACQUITTAL OF BOOTH.

Editorially the Eugene Guard says: The acquittal of Senator Booth and his brother, Henry, would naturally be a matter of gratification to their many friends throughout the state, under any circumstances, and it is especially so since the cases were so one-sided that the publicity given the government's evidence has amounted to a complete vindication of the defendants. In neither trial was any evidence introduced to offset that of the government witnesses and yet the jury had no difficulty in arriving at a verdict of acquittal. In fact, the whole affair seems to have been the outgrowth of a political controversy involving the Mitchell and anti-Mitchell factions, the indictments against the Booths not having been brought in good faith, so that Judge Wolverton would have done himself credit to have granted the motions made for non-suit in both cases. As it is the senator and his brother will be held in higher public esteem than ever, since their public and private records have been thoroughly investigated by the secret service agents, backed by the relentless prosecutors, and the result of the promised exposure has been as rank a farce as was ever aired in court. The records of few public officials could have undergone the same searching investigation without bringing to light any actions of a questionable character, and therein lies the vindication of the defendants, who have been the objects, not of a legal prosecution, but of persecution carried in vindictively and relentlessly for years with all its attendant worry of suspense and apprehension.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 4.—A public reception was given Hon. R. A. Booth and wife at the Commercial Club parlors here tonight. Scores of their friends were in attendance and the evening spent was a most enjoyable one.

GREATEST NATIONAL SHORTAGE Government Report Shows Deficit of \$24,868,000 for July.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—The monthly statement of government receipts and expenditures shows that for July, 1908, the total receipts were \$32,370,000, and the expenditures \$57,238,000, leaving a deficit for the month of \$24,868,000, or against a deficit for July, 1907, of \$10,901,534. This month's deficit would have been over \$30,000,000 but for the payment of discharges of the Central Pacific Railroad's indebtedness to the government, which during July amounted to about \$5,500,000.

During July, 1908, the receipts from customs aggregated over \$8,000,000 less than for July, 1907, and internal revenues about \$1,000,000 less.

As to expenditures, those on account of civil and miscellaneous items were \$20,600,000, or over \$2,000,000 greater than for July, 1907. On account of war, the payments aggregated \$18,074,000, or nearly \$1,000,000 in excess of July last year. The navy payments were about the same as for July, 1907, being about \$9,273,000. Public works showed a falling off of something over \$1,000,000.

BRYAN IS A PRINTER.

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 3.—Wm. J. Bryan is a member of the Lincoln Typographical union today, having been voted honorary member by the printers here yesterday. There was some discussion, when Bryan's name was suggested, of the suggestion that his adoption by the union might be construed as having political significance. This was overcome by the election of Governor Sheldon a republican, to membership in the same union.

MARRIED SCOTTSBURG GIRL.

Rogue River War Veteran and 48er Dies in Aberdeen.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 4.—James M. Merrick, aged 53 years, died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. W. L. Helling, on Saturday, of dropsy. Mr. Merrick was born in Staten Island, N. Y., and was a pilot in New York harbor for 15 years. At the time of the gold excitement of '49 in California, he came around the Horn, and has since lived on the Pacific coast, principally in Oregon. He was married to Miss Nancy Scott at Scottsburg, Or., in 1853, and was father of 11 children, but two of whom, his daughter, Mrs. Helling, and son, Frank W. Merrick, survive him. He was a lieutenant in the Rogue River Indian war and his funeral was under the auspices of the G. A. R.

THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

We look for better times, says Goodwin's Weekly, of Salt Lake. We look to see in every morning's dispatch where some great manufacturing plant has resumed work, where more and more men are obtaining employment. We think it will extend to the railroads, that the trains which have been lying idle all winter will all be running again in a month. We rather expect that the stock exchange in New York will suddenly start up with irrepressible enthusiasm, because it will be the interest of the men of money to have times prosperous from sea to sea on election day. Then again, the crops will begin to yield their returns in a few weeks and the men who deal in money and who have been quiet for the last eight months will pick up the tangled ends of their business and begin anew. All the signs look hopeful, and when business is resumed in the east we look for metals to begin to rise, especially copper, because there are a thousand electric power and railroad companies waiting an auspicious time to begin operation. August, generally a dull month on both sides of the continent, we believe that before this August is over there will be extreme activity all along the line.

There is a double motive behind all this. The republicans will want to employ their men and say to them: "The troubles of last year are passed. If Mr. Taft is elected, your places will be secure for an indefinite time in the future; if he is not, we shall have to close down just so soon as we can work off our surplus stock." The democrats will want good times so that they can tell their men that the republicans, after years of prosperity, precipitated a panic on the country last fall which was ruinous to tens of thousands of people; that it was all due to their extravagance, whereas, if they will elect a democratic president the old economy of the party will assert itself, business will be held on conservative lines and the fear in the hearts of working men that they will lose their places will be taken away.

BURNED OUT AGAIN.

Former Myrtle Creek Physician Was Just Ready to Move.

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 4.—Fire bugs destroyed four stores at Creston, on the Mount Scott line of the O. W. P., at an early hour this morning, causing a loss of approximately \$8000, partly covered by insurance.

Evidence that the fire was of incendiary origin is abundant, but there is no clue to the firebug.

The supposition is that the fire was started to destroy the drugstore of Dr. C. E. Bogue, by an opponent of the liquor interest. The reason is suspected to be because W. J. Armistage, the former partner of Dr. Bogue, conducted a drugstore at Arleta, which was destroyed recently by an incendiary. A month later the drug store across the street from the one formerly owned by him, and in which he was clerking was burned. The three drugstores did not find favor with some people in the vicinity of Creston and Arleta, and this may have inspired the firebug.

The greater part of the stock of the Creston pharmacy was saved. Dr. Bogue was preparing to move back to Arleta and had a portion of his goods out of the building at the time of the fire.
