OREGON'S SHARE \$32,000.

Apportionment of Receipts From National Forests.

A forestry bulletin says: Announcement has just been made of the amounts which each state containing national forests will receive under the new law giving 25 per cent of the gross receipts from forests to these states. The total amount to go to the states, from the receipts of the fiscal year which ended June 30, is \$447,063.79.

The amounts to go to each state or territory are: Alaska, \$2,684.78; Arizona, \$42,610.44; Arkansas, \$313.68; California, \$52,437.78; Colorado, \$50,955.67; Idaho, \$56,307.84; Kansas, \$643.55; Montana, \$75,807.41; Nebraska, \$2,349.77; Nevada, \$4,577.95; New Mexico, \$25,464.12; Oklahoma, \$554.48; Oregon, \$32,313.52; South Dakota, \$8,456.00; Utah, \$32,151.02 (including Uinta Indian refund of \$5,348.07); Washington, \$18,032.79; and Wyoming, \$41,402.38.

The law requires that this money be expended upon public roads and schools by the counties which contain national forest land. In this way the counties are compensated for the reduction of taxable area brought about by the existence of the forests.

Before this year the states have received 10 per cent of the gross receipts, but congress voted last winter to increase the amount to 25 per cent.

Portland Telegram: Dr. J. C. Twitcheil, occupying offices in the Swetland building, reports to the police that bicycle which he recently purchased, was stolen Saturday from the lobby of the Marquam building.

Portland Journal: Oregon national guard riflemen will go in style to the national meeting and rifle practice to be held near Toledo, O., this month. They will leave Portland next Saturday night in the Pullman private car Sunset, which has fortunately been secured for their entire trip.

Eugene Guard: A deal has just been consummated wherein C. P. Barnard, the liveryman, transfers to Mrs. R. H. Dearborn, of this city, the corner property at West Eighth and Charnelton streets, at present occupied by the Gulliford livery stable building which is occupied by the Eugene Grocery Company and Haskell & Ludford's paint shop. The consideration given in the deed is \$4000, but it is known that considerably more than that was paid for the property.

Medford Tribune: There are in the city at the present time five contractors who are already at work figuring on the specifications prepared by Engineer Roberts for the pipeline for a gravity water supply from the fork of Little Butte creek, on Wasson canyon. These contractors have come from various parts of the Pacific Coast and more are expected and are arriving on every train. At the present time Los Angeles, San Francisco, Tacoma, Portland and Seattle are represented.

Medford Mail: J. S. Pardee, of Gold Ray, met with a serious accident Sunday. While working a horse of his the animal suddenly kicked him in the face and knocked him down. When assistance arrived it was found necessary to bring him to the Medford hospital. Mr. Pardee was wearing glasses at the time and they were smashed, the broken glass badly cutting his face. Dr. Conroy was called to attend him and found that in addition to his other injuries his nose was broken. He is getting along nicely, but it will be several days before he will be around again.

Portland Oregonian: Suit to recover \$3000 from the Continental Gold Mining Company, Alex Sweek, its secretary, and W. B. Stewart, the president of the concern, has been filed in the circuit court. The plaintiff is Thomas Devlin, receiver of the defunct Oregon Trust & Savings bank. It is alleged that a promissory note, payable on demand, was made out March 15, 1907, by Sweek and Stewart, in favor of the bank. It was to draw 8 per cent interest. The complaint alleges that only \$31.71 has been paid on the note.

TO "BUST" PAVING TRUST.

Portland Concern Ready to Fight Big Monopoly.

Introduction into Portland of a new street pavement on the order of bituminous macadam will shortly be made, which will revolutionize the paving business and also reduce the cost of hard-surface pavement nearly one-half, says the Telegram. It may also be the death blow to the old paving concerns such as Warren Construction Company, which from all indications have ceased fighting and formed a combination for the purpose of boosting prices.

One great feature about the new pavement is that anybody can lay it. The Pacific Bridge Company will introduce it to the city, is prepared with its large equipment to place it on the streets at a cost much below what any other contractor can furnish it. The pavement will not be protected by any patent or copyright and if at any time the city finds that the contracting firm is charging the city too much for its improvements it can go into the paving business itself.

The Pacific Bridge Company will secure the material for its new pavement largely from the bed of the river. The gravel which will be raised by its large dredge will be used for the base of the pavement, and the top dressing will be a combination of bitumen or coal tar mixed with the crushed gravel. It is believed that a far better street can be laid of this material than is now being constructed for this city by any of the large paving concerns.

It is said that the cost of this pavement will be between \$1.25 and \$1.50 a square yard, as against \$2.00 and \$2.20, charged by the other companies for a hard surface improvement. In addition to this the new paving will be guaranteed for 10 years without cost, while all the old companies exact 2 1/2 cents a year for each yard of pavement laid, for maintaining it.

Manager George Simons, of the Pacific Bridge Company, said this morning that he was preparing to put his pavement on the market by January 1.

FIRE PERMIT SEASON.

State Board and Not County Clerk Must be Applied to.

Residents of Douglas county have commenced to apply for fire permits from the county clerk to burn slashings, though not in such large numbers as last year. The legislature at its last session passed a law whereby the old law authorizing county clerks to issue fire permits was repealed, and creating a state board of forestry, which has supervision over matters of this kind. Many people do not know that the county clerk does not have the power to issue permits as of old, as is attested by the applications made for fire permits.

The board of forestry appoints the deputy fire wardens throughout the state upon recommendation of the property owners in the different sections. Expenses incurred by the deputy fire wardens are borne by the sections over which they have jurisdiction. Before the present board was created county clerks had authority to issue fire permits and as a result conditions were very unsatisfactory. In many cases the county clerk did not know the conditions when he issued the fire permit, and in a number of cases permission to build fires was allowed ill-advised. The closed season for setting fires is from June 1 to October 1.
