DO YOUR OWN THINKING.

Days of the political spellbinder and the impassioned political writer are at hand. Voters will be told that if they vote one way, they will starve to death and the nation will be lost, and in the next minute they will be told by someone else that if they do not vote the other way the same starvation will face them and the same fate overtake the nation.

The truth of the matter is, politicians have been permitted to exaggerate the importance of their calling and to exaggerate the importance of the political position they assume. The only thing for voters to do is to do some thinking for themselves. Voters should read and listen patiently but act cautiously, remembering that no politician is more of an angel, to say the least of it, than other men, and is no more inclined to work for the glory of humanity than the rest of us. Each of them has an axe to grind, and each is asking the common voter to turn the grindstone.

The voter must weigh what he hears and think and act for himself, if he hopes to act in the best way. He should remember that in the race for life, he has to take his chances along with others many of them with more time and opportunity to look out for the soft snare than he has, while earning his daily bread at the sweat of his brow, and if special favors are granted, he must take his chances with all those fellows who do nothing but lie awake nights to find out the best way to get most of the benefit. If the common voter thinks he has an equal show with those fellows, he will cast his vote accordingly, certain of the fact that the other fellow, even if he should get the best of it, is no going to kill the "goose that laid the golden egg."

If he believes that looking after the welfare of the high financier and seeing that they get all they want, assists him in getting along better, he certainly would vote for the party that experience and judgment tells him would look after the financier. If he believes that the financier already has advantages sufficient over him and, rather than having those advantages increased by law should have some that he removed, he would certainly vote for that party which he believes would act accordingly.

CUMMINS WANTS SENATORSHIP

LAKE FOREST, Ill., Aug. 4.—Governor Albert R. Cummins, of Iowa, tonight announced himself as a candidate to succeed the late Senator Allison in congress. The governor paid a tribute to his late political adversary's services to Iowa and the country at large, then frankly declared his ambition to be elected to the upper house by the legislature of his state. He also announced that "someone will be appointed at once to occupy Senator Allison's seat for the coming months of his unexpired term."

PRES. CAMPBELL TO WED.

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 4.—P. I. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon, has gone east to receive new instructors, the limits of his journey being Chicago and Indianapolis. It is known to intimates of his family that on his return he will remain for a short time in Colorado, and there marry Mrs. S. C. Church.

Mrs. Church, accompanied by her little son, came to Eugene a few years ago, having accepted the position of dean of the men's dormitory. The comfort of dormitory life greatly increased under her management, and the young men found in her a valued adviser and a devoted friend. Later, resigning the superintendency of the dormitory, she assisted in the work of the university library.

Mrs. Church's maiden name was Campbell, and her family is related to that of President Campbell. Her father was a clergyman of the Christian church, and was educated by his uncle, Alexander Campbell, of Kentucky, founder of the Christian church.

President Campbell and his wife will return here early in September.
